



All policies dated after January 1, 1960 will be issued only upon a written application completely filled out and signed by the applicant for insurance. Your Insurance Agents listed below, members of the INDEPENDENT INSURANCE AGENTS ASSOCIATION of Iowa Park, will assist and cooperate with you in the preparation of these applications.

We endorse this policy as a further means of reducing traffic accidents, including injuries, loss of life and property damage.
