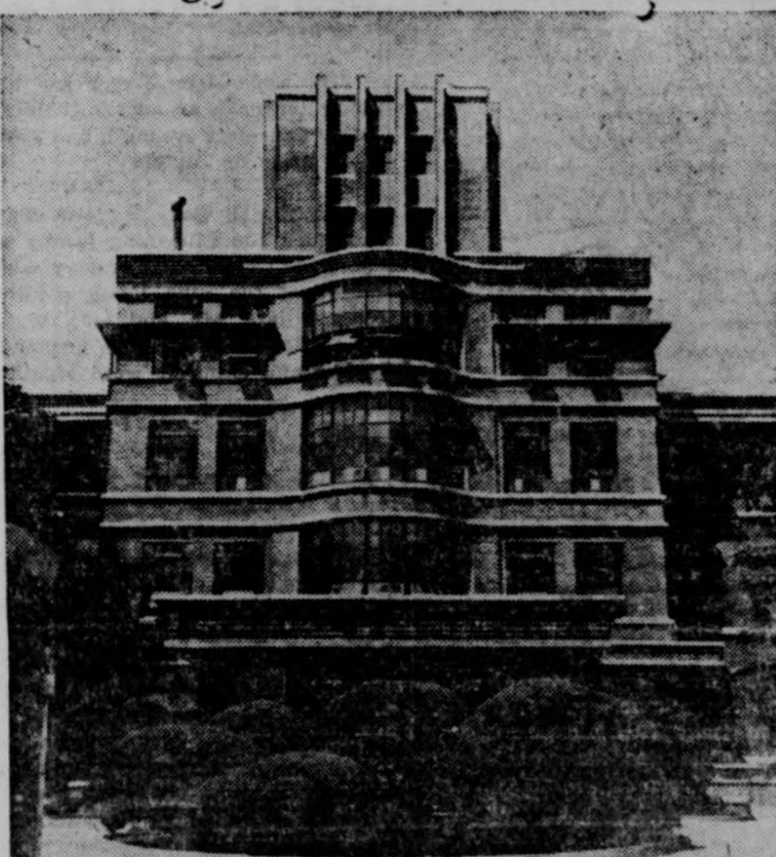

## Restoring Medical Services in Korea



The recently-completed building, above, marks a turning point in the training of Korean medical students. It is the medical college in Taegu, Korea—badly damaged during the war—which has been restored with funds from the United Nations Korean Reconstruction Agency. Together with a medical hospital, laboratories, and a nurses' home which were also rebuilt and equipped by UNKRA, it forms one of the major medical teaching centers in Korea. ## Evangelist Called to Mother's Bedside

Rev. Walter Skutar, evangelist from Pittsburgh, Penna., who began a series of revival services last Sunday night at the Church of God, was called home because of the serious illness of his mother. He was here for only two nights.

During the revival there will be fine music and preaching, and everyone is invited to all services which start at 7:45 each evening.

Iowa Park residents heard a loud explosion at noon Monday, but didn't realize what caused it.

An empty fuel tank fell from a jet plane 20,000 feet over the Iowa Park area and hit the ground close to the Lowrance hill east of town. Pieces of metal were scattered over a wide area. The largest segment of the tank landed about 1300 yards north of Gilchrist airport. A smaller piece landed in front of a pickup driving on the highway.

Calls were made to the air force base, sheriff's office and the state highway patrol by several persons who saw it and thought a plane had exploded in midair. Later it was determined that there were no injuries and the jet had landed safely at Tinker Field near Oklahoma City.

## "Call for the Living" To Urge Safety for Holiday Traffic

If the National Federation of Women's clubs had the say, the Fourth of July weekend coming soon would be the safest and sanest holiday of modern times.

And members of the federation and its member clubs are going to have their say—in an intensive telephone call campaign.

Beginning at 10:30 a.m. Wednesday, June 29, telephones all over the nation will start ringing, and the fellow who answers the phone will be reminded to have a family conference about highway safety and courtesy.

Then each person called will be asked to make at least four calls to friends and deliver the same message. By this means, every telephone in America should get at least one such call.

According to Mrs. James Sewell of Iowa Park's Modern Music club and 23 Study club, there will be no high pressure or hysteria connected with the calls. They will be simply reminders of the fact that last year's Independence Day traffic took 384 lives and left many thousands injured.

Sponsors of the project are convinced that courtesy on the highway is the strongest contribution to safety that any individual can make.

Mrs. Johnny Adams and Mrs. Paul Coppock have been named co-directors of the new Ceramics department of the Texas-Oklahoma Fair at Iowa Park. Birthdate of the new department in the Women's division will be the week beginning Sept. 26.

All persons in the area are invited to submit samples of their work for competition in the Fair.

In the ceramics display there will be 10 classes as follows: Lace applied figurine; exotic glaze; underglaze; underglaze-decoration; sgraffito; textured; stain; flowers-applied decoration; figurines, Chinese etc.; lusters.

Originals will also have their place in the spotlight, in three classes: free form, hand-thrown piece; and sculpture.

Porcelains will also be shown in three classes: lace figurines, bisque figurines; and decorated, flowers etc.

Children through 11 years of age will compete in two classes: hand molded, and glazed pieces.

The same two classes will be used for children 12 through 15 years of age.

And for those whose work does not fall into any of the categories named above, the Fair has a Miscellaneous class.

It will be a lecture course with no written requirements, and there will be a short intermission during each evening session for refreshments.

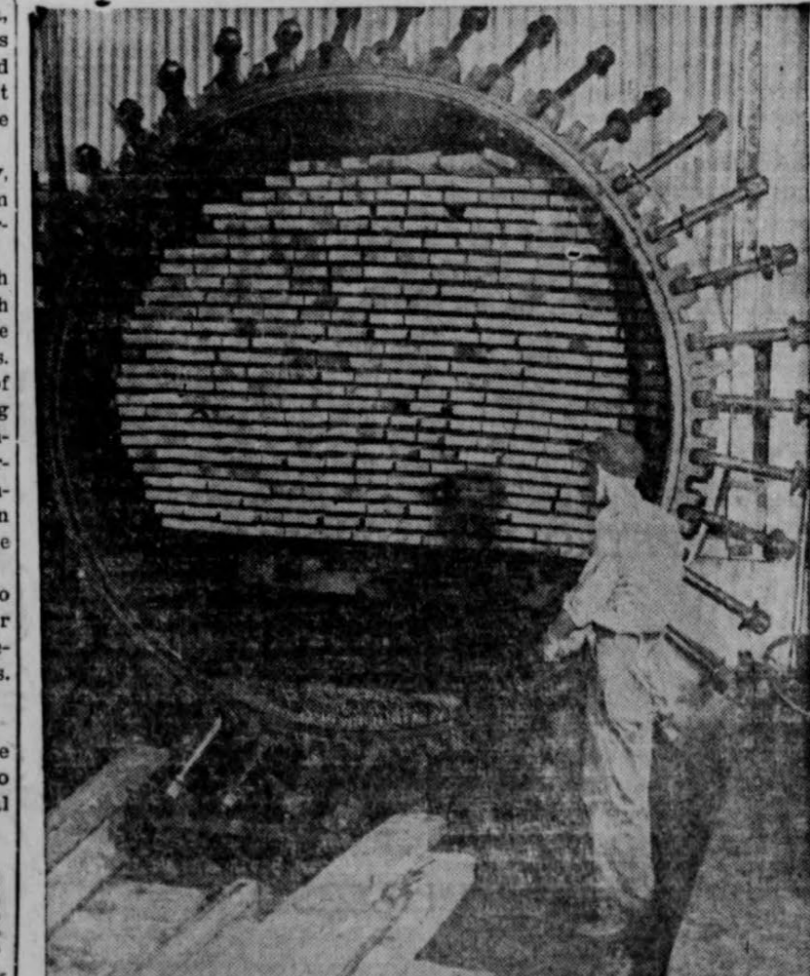
Enrollment blanks are available at the C of C office. There is a fee of \$2 for the course.

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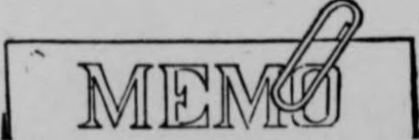

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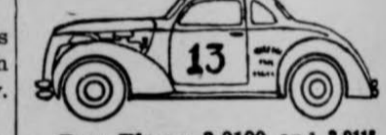

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# Supporting Your Town



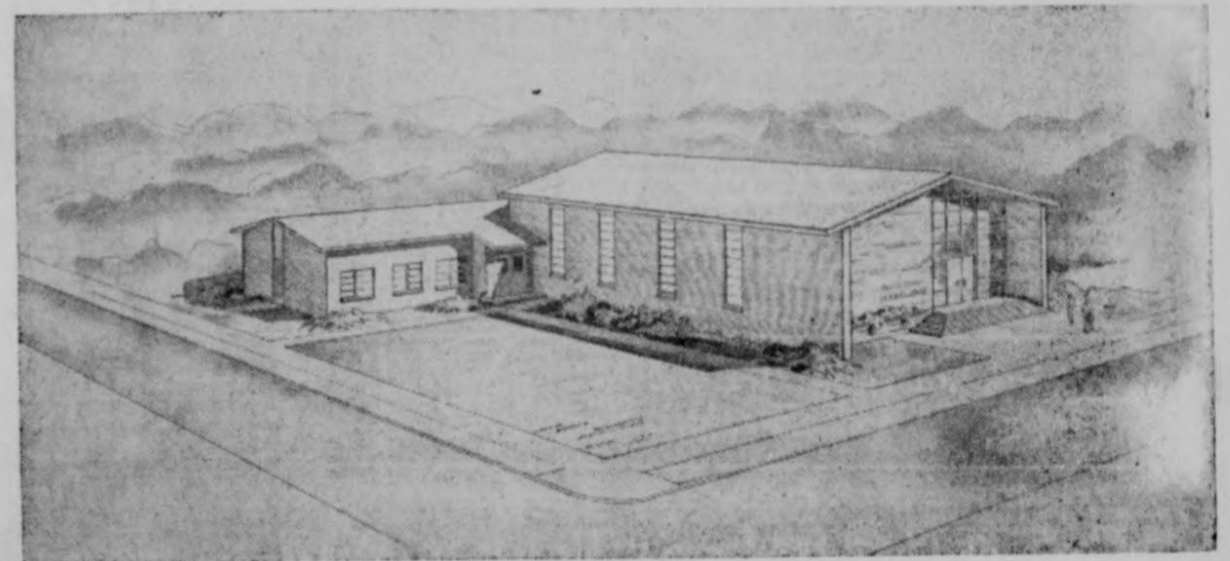
Businessmen are invited to read the following from the American Bankers Magazine. It should give you a new slant on your business, as well as on the matter of building your town:

Miss Ethyle Kidwell has as guest this week her young niece Elizabeth Harris of Winnsboro.

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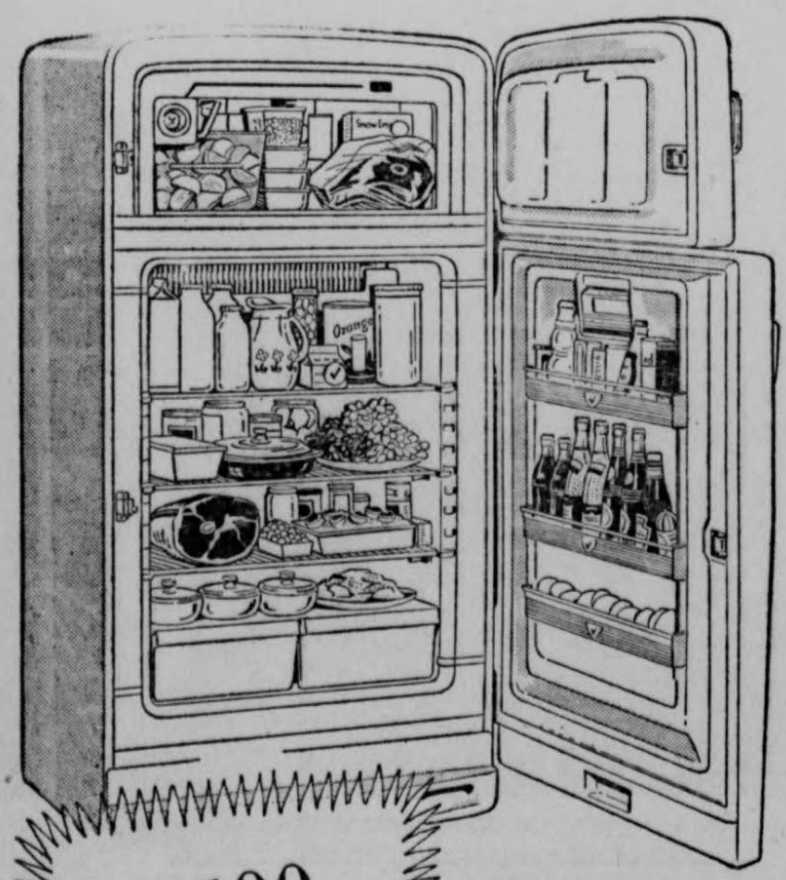
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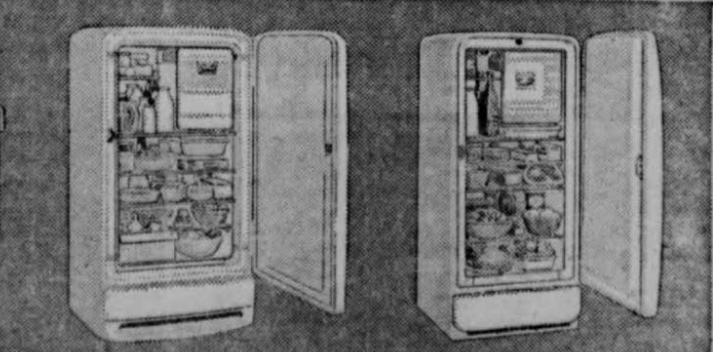
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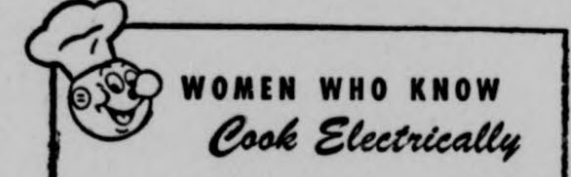
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
