We don't know enough municipal law to advise how to go about it, but the City Council can and should do something about this important expansion need-now.

Our second growth problem is expansion of the Water Control and Improvement District from which the City buys water. As originally developed and authorized, the Water District was described by metes and bounds. Expansion of the City Limits does not carry with it an equal expansion of the Water District. If we are wrong in this assumption-fine.

Anyhow, the City Council and the Water District board of directors should start kicking their individual obligations around and get something done-pronto.
