The Hartmangrubers charge \$15 an acre for harvesting and sodding when you furnish the sod. They average 12 to 15 acres a day.

"The sod harvester uses twin coulters, mounted seven inches apart, and a pointed knife to slice off and lift a ribbon of sod 11/2 inches thick. A chopping wheel with knives cuts the sod into squares, and a conveyor elevates the squares into a planter or truck.

"The sod planter uses a spiral conveyor at the front of the hopper to carry the sod squares out to each side and drop them into two


