USA Has High Electric Potential

Continued argument about whether the USA or USSR is predominant in production of guided missiles overlooks another important measure of a nation's strength—the production of electric power and its efficient distribution. The USA holds a wide margin of superiority in that field, according to J. B. Thomas, president of Texas Electric Service company.

At the end of 1959, America had more than three times the generating capacity for electrical power than Russia had, Thomas said this week. This is one of the greatest advantages this country possesses, he added.

A report on Russian electric power developments just released by Edison Electric Institute sets out the findings of two delegations of American electrical industry leaders who toured the Soviet Union at the request of the USA State Department, and makes clear that this country will continue to increase its lead during the next five years, Thomas stated.

The report estimates that the total capacity of USA in 1965 will be 245 million kilowatts, as compared with the USSR goal of 110-112 million kilowatts. This is a difference of 134 million kilowatts.

Information in the report tends to correct any impressions that Russia is in any way likely to outstrip America in the production of electric power.

Contract Let for Parsonage

George May of Wichita Falls has been awarded the contract to build a new parsonage for the Iowa Park Church of Christ. He expects to begin work this week.

The home will be located on North Park street just north of the new First Baptist church parsonage, on lots purchased from Earle Denny.

The parsonage will have three bedrooms, two baths, living room, dining room and kitchen. A double garage will be attached. The living and bed rooms will have wall to wall carpeting.

Red bricks will be used on the outside of the home, which will have the same general floor plan as that used in recent construction of the parsonage of the Iowa Park Christian church.

Lone Star Ready for Rate Increase

L. T. Potter, president of Lone Star Gas company, this week said that the Railroad Commission's reported order of Feb. 5 authorized Lone Star to raise its intra-company city gate charge for gas for residential and commercial customers by 5.4 cents per 1000 cu. ft.

"This order has the effect of increasing the cost to Lone Star's distribution division, but the level reached is still 4.6 cents below the cost in effect prior to 1941.

"Lone Star's transmission division will begin charging the company's distribution division this additional 5.4 cents on the effective date of the order. Although the increase is not as large as requested, the company is accepting the commission's order because of our transmission division's immediate need for additional funds with which to continue to obtain adequate gas supplies in today's market.

"On December 10, 1958, I wrote the mayors of cities served by Lone Star and informed them that we were asking the Railroad Commission to authorize the company to increase its city gate charge. In this letter I stated that Lone Star, in carrying out its public service obligation, may be required in the future to file an application for an increase in residential and commercial rates."

"It now appears that our distribution division will probably be required to seek authority from each council to increase the charge to our customers in an amount sufficient to offset this increased cost of gas. This will average slightly more than 1 cent per day per residential customer."

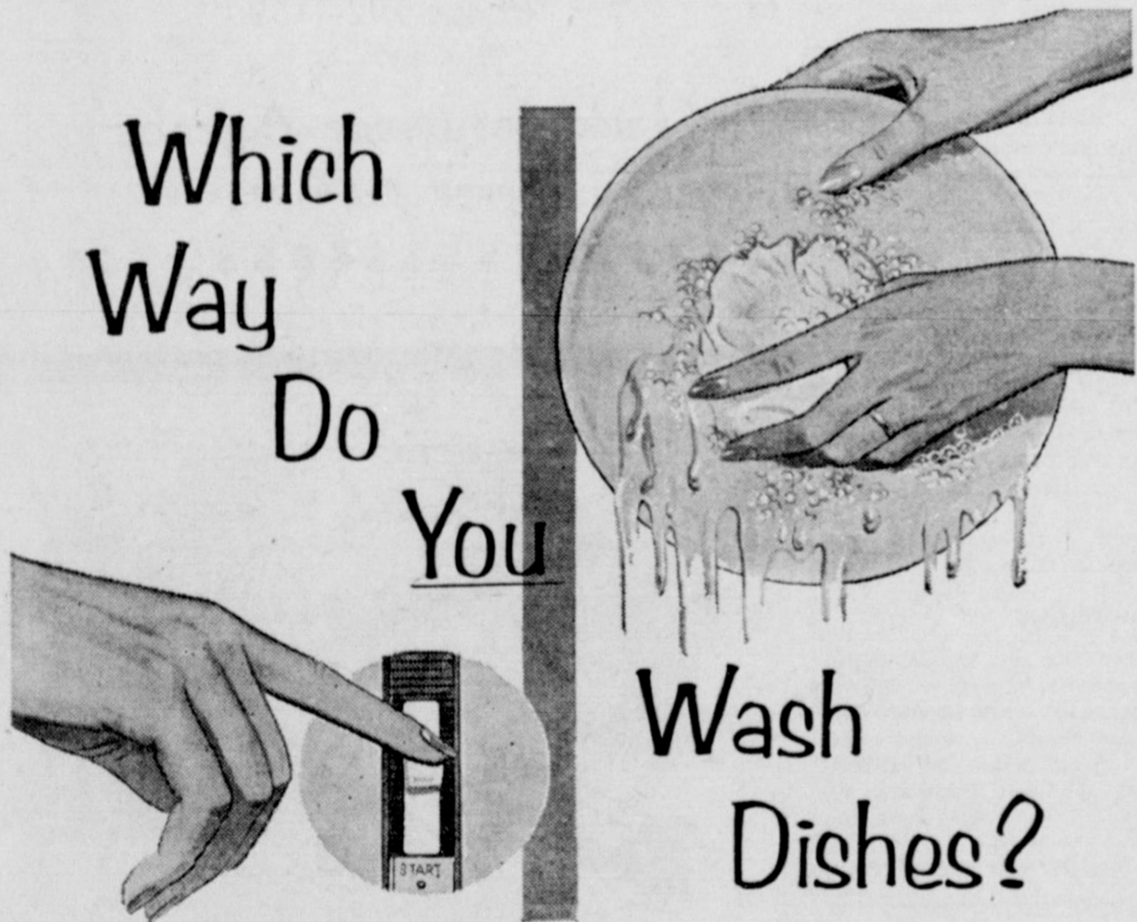

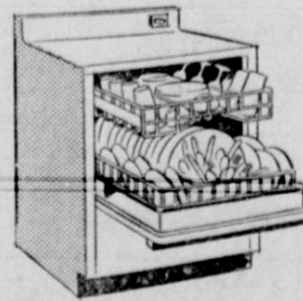

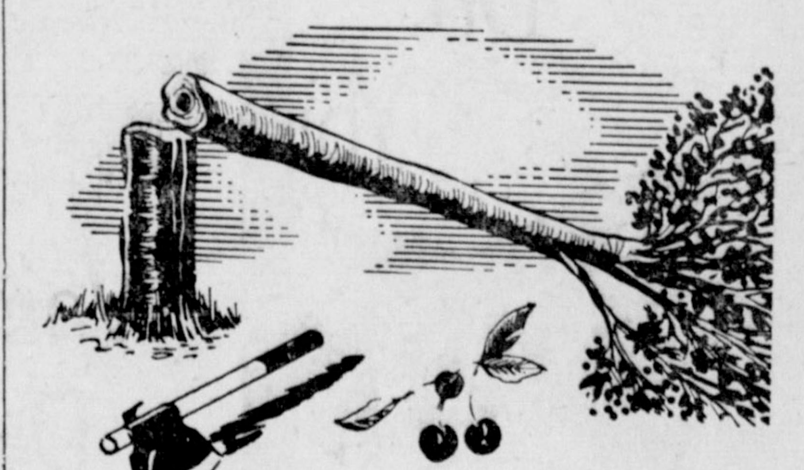
