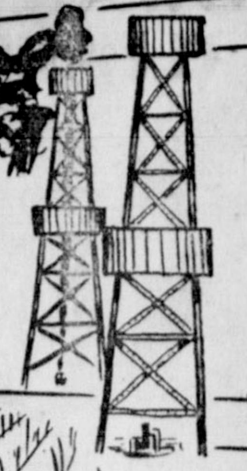

## Tankersley Offers Liquid Feed Service for Livestock

A. F. Tankersley has started a new business in Iowa Park. The farm name is Tank's Liquid Feed service, and the storage tank and office are at 808 East Highway.

Product offered for sale by Mr. Tankersley is known as Morea R Liquefeed. It is delivered to the ranch or farm by tank truck from the main tank in Iowa Park.

Morea R is a proved and tested nitrogen supplement for range and feedlot use, having been fed to many thousands of ruminants in the past three years both in the United States and abroad. Morea R is a formulation consisting of feeding molasses, ethanol, urea nitrogen, phosphoric acid, trace minerals, DL methionine, vitamin D. It is 30 per cent protein equivalent and contains no hormones, antibiotics nor tranquilizers. Ruminants synthesize their requirements of vitamins not included.

Morea R Liquefeed is fed on a free choice basis, being fed from a liquid holding container, wood or black iron, NOT galvanized, accessible to the livestock and left out the year around. It is a self-limiting feedstuff. Livestock will eat only what they need for the best balance with other feedstuff and roughage they are receiving on the range or in the feedlot.

The proteins or Nitrogen in these sources regulate intake. Floats should always be used for efficient feeding, in order that the livestock will lick and not drink Morea R.

Livestock winter extremely well on a surprisingly small amount of Morea R, their consumption depending on the type and quantity of roughage available. On the average range cattle will consume 1 to 1½ pounds per head per day through the hard winter and spring months, tapering off to no consumption with the arrival of new grass.

Storage tanks and troughs out on the range, plus the self-feeding intake, equal hours of hard labor saved. Savings in labor, wear and tear on ranch vehicles, and time consumed in feeding operations pay for the extra investment in equipments and part of the feed bill. The farmer saves his back—never lifts a sack.

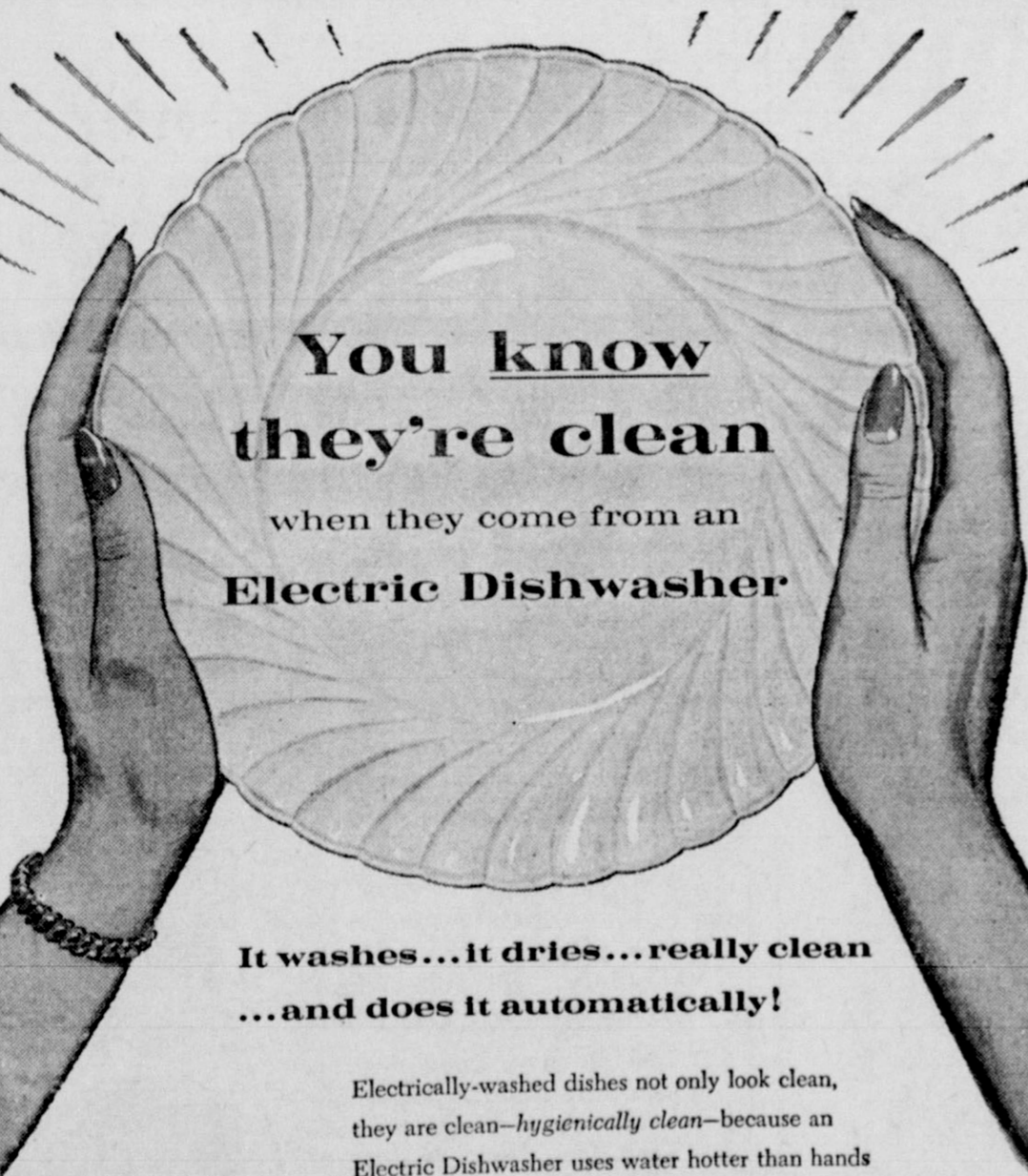

Plans were completed for serving the band banquet.

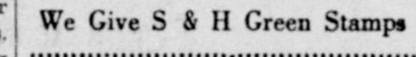

R. W. Briscoe of the highway patrol was speaker for a Traffic Safety program at a meeting of the 23 Study club Thursday afternoon of last week. The meeting was in the home of Mrs. Homer Thompson with Mrs. T. M. Thaxton sharing hostess duties.

Briscoe reminded club members that law and court were created by God and because man violated God's law he was punished. Some people have respect for and others fear law enforcement, he stated. 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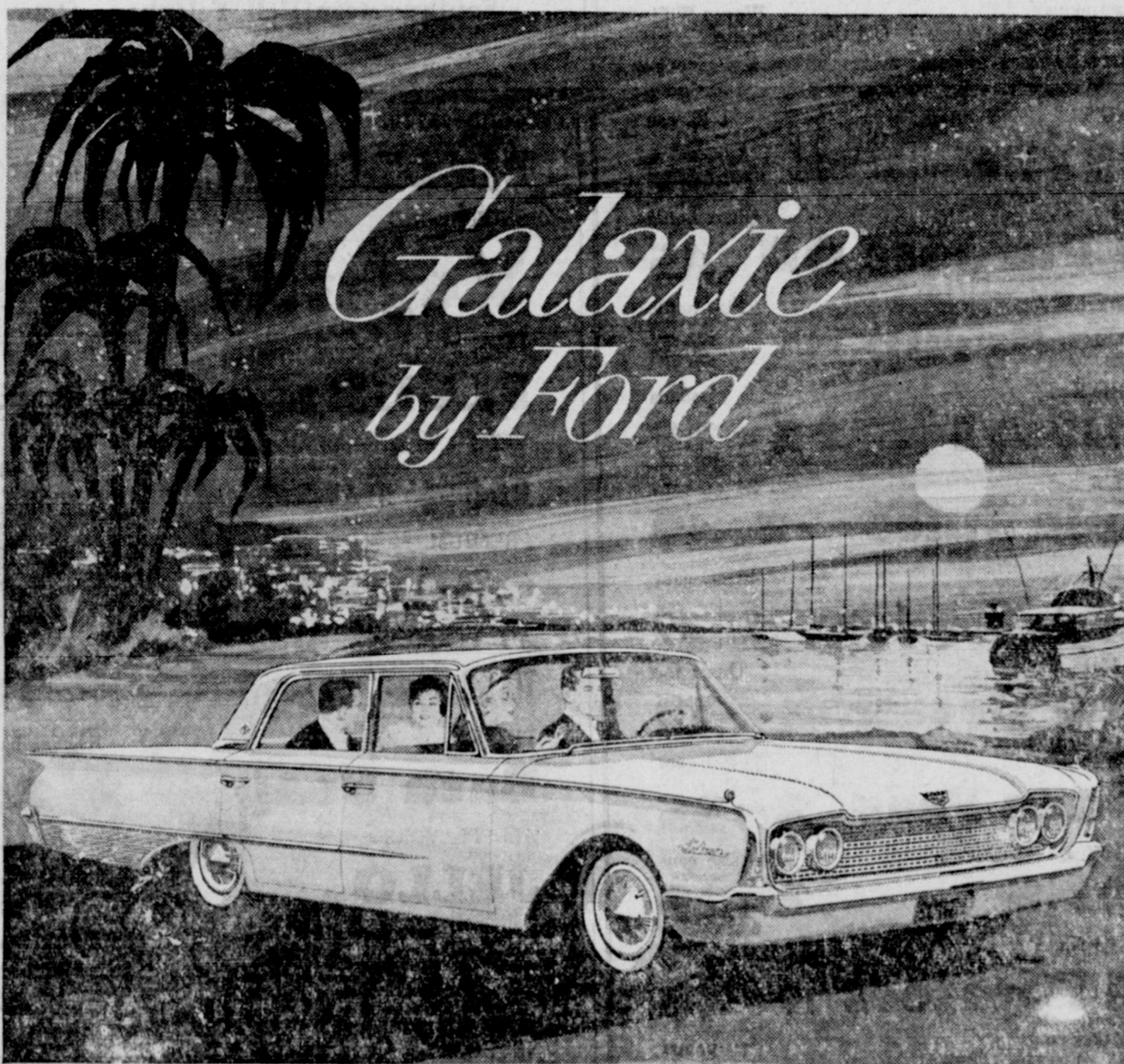
