# Yarborough Opposes Repeal of Connally World Court Amendment Opened Here

As many of you recall, in 1946 the Senate passed a resolution joining the International Court of Justice-the so-called World Court except that the court was not granted jurisdiction in domestic matters in the United States. Our beloved Senator Tom Connally amended the Court resolution to provide that the United States retain full auhority to decide for itself which cases were within its own domestic jurisdiction and which ones should go before the World Court.

Both the president and the vicepresident have urged the Senate to adopt a new resolution which would repeal Connally's reservation. They would give the World Court, instead of our nation, the Smith; junior girls, Georgia power to decide what matters were Trammell; senior boys, Creath our domestic matters and what matters were international and therefore within the jurisdiction of the World Court.

The American Bar association endorsed the Eisenhower-Nixon recommendation in their efforts to substitute a World Court and a rule of law for force or for diplomacy as a method of settling disputes between nations. I agree with their objectives but think the method of doing it now unsafe.

Under present world conditions, I agree, and I will vote to retain the Connally amendment. As a lawyer and a former judge, I too believe in the rule of the law in this world, but I favor without equivocation the United States retaining power over all its domestic affairs, and I will never vote to give up to another country country the running of our own local or domestic affairs. With this in mind, I am going to support the Connally amendment as it now stands and the position of Connally in this matter. We must retain America's authority to decide for itself what cases are its own domestic cases.

Under present world conditions, and as long as there is danger that the World Court would attempt to inject itself in America's domestic affairs. I think the Connally amendment must be retained. The Court's jurisdiction in international affairs could be assured without language giving up the U.S.'s exclusive jurisdiction over its own internal affairs, but that isn't done in the pending resolution. 

Jim Cunningham introduced Ben F. Van Pelt, who has served the past 10 years as fire marshal for Wichita Falls, At present, under his leadership, the Wichita Falls fire departmentt is making a door to door drive to inspect homes in that city. This is all voluntary.

Mr. Van Pelt emphasized that fires are started (or caused) by people. They don't just happen. He brought out that fire has to have fuel, heat and oxygen. And he demonstrated how easy it is to get those three elements to-

Since most killing fires are in homes, and since many fires are caused by defective electric systems, he cautioned all home owners about overloading their cir-
