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Green Seeks Sheriff Election

Veteran county peace officer W. W. (Jack) Green announced his candidacy here in the May 7 Democratic primary election.

Green, who had served as chief deputy for seven years prior to his resignation Oct. 15 last year, offered a three-point platform as a base for his candidacy:

"I feel my many years experience as a peace officer have thoroughly qualified me to serve as sheriff of Wichita county.

"Having lived in this county for the past 13 years and been constantly in contact with its citizens, I believe I know and understand its people and fully appreciate what they expect of the man they elect as their highest peace officer.

"If elected sheriff, it shall be my purpose to serve honestly and fearlessly, without special privileges or favor to any individual or group realizing our laws apply equally to all."

The candidate promised the full co-operation of the sheriff's department to other law enforcement agencies, saying: "One of the most important needs to proper law enforcement in Wichita county or any other county for that matter is the full and unstinted co-operation between all law enforcement agencies in the county and co-ordination between investigating officers and prosecuting forces.

"This will be one of the effects I will strive for in my efforts to serve as sheriff. There is and should be no reason for my failure in this respect and I am sure, from my work in the past with these various departments, this can and will be accomplished."

Green promised if elected he will "employ as my deputies only those with proven records of forthright, honest and sober habits, fully qualified to honorably fill the position and reflect nothing but respect upon the office which I seek."

Prior to becoming chief deputy in January of 1953, Green served as a City policeman in Electra for six years. Before moving to Electra, he was deputy sheriff of Cotton county (Walters), Okla.

He is a member of the North Texas-Southern Oklahoma Peace Officers association and the First Church of the Nazarene, Wichita Falls. Both he and his wife are active in church work. Green has served as superintendent of the church's Sunday School for his past two years and is also a member of the church's board of trustees.

Mr. and Mrs. Green own their own home at 3515 Garden, Wichita Falls. They have two sons, Jack and Joe, both of whom are married.

The sheriff's position is the first public office the veteran peace officer has sought.

"It shall be my desire and purpose to see each citizen of this county, but realizing the impossibility of this I earnestly solicit the consideration, vote and influence of every law-abiding citizen," Mr. Green said.

Metz Elected in Heavy Vote

Election Judge Fred Parkey reports 635 votes were cast Tuesday in the City election. That is about half the qualified votes in the city limits.

Charlie Metz received 403 votes for mayor, defeating Bert Van Horn, seeking re-election, who received 225. Arch Hughes received two write-in votes.

Miss Dosia S. Smith was opposed for re-election to City Secretary. She raked up 619 votes. There was one write-in vote.

In the race for three aldermen positions, Luther Shaw led the ticket with 340; Curtis Sewell got 327, and Elmo Traylor was elected with 316 votes.

T. C. Scott (incumbent), James Cates, Lonnie Lee and A. G. Callahan trailed. Two write-in votes were cast for Lavere Thompson, who had not sought re-election.

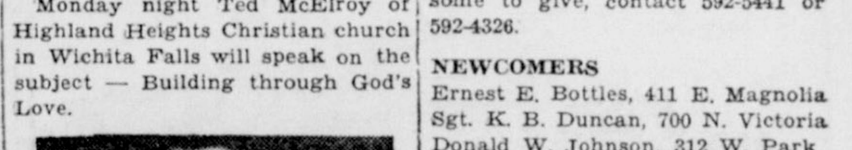

Secret Pals were revealed during the evening and names were drawn for new Secret Pals.

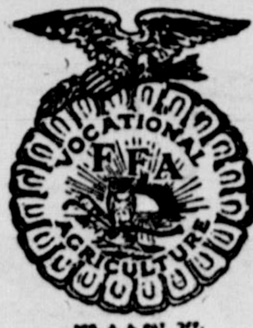

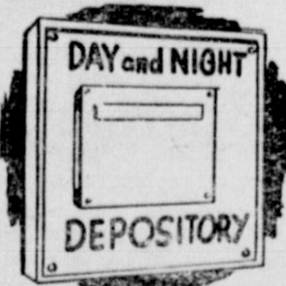
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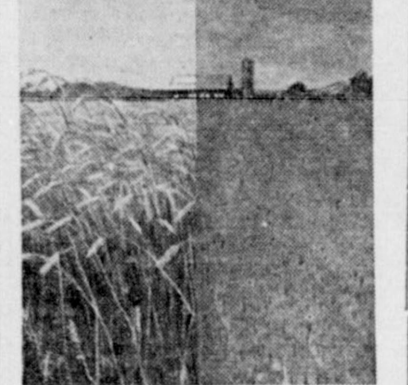

ABUNDANT LIFE

NOTHING IS TOO HARD FOR GOD
There is nothing too difficult for God!
Long after Abraham and his wife Sarah had passed the age of childbearing, God visited them, saying, "I am going to keep my promise which I made to you many years ago." Abraham fell upon his face and laughed. His was the laughter of joy, gratitude and faith that God was keeping His promise—that He was going to give them a child.
Therefore, the Lord was pleased with Abraham's laughter. Sarah laughed, too, but it was a different story here. God was displeased with her laughter and said, "Why did you laugh? Is any thing too hard for the Lord?"
I think this is why Sarah laughed:
First, she laughed because of her age. "How can I renew my youth and bear a child now that I am old?" she asked.
It does sound ridiculous, doesn't it?
Second, Sarah laughed because she could not rationalize or reason it out.
Third, Sarah laughed because in all her knowledge and acquaintance she had never heard of it happening before. "Therefore," she reasoned, "how can it happen to me?"
At first she compared the ability of her body with God's power. Then, she compared her knowledge with the knowledge of God. And, because it was beyond her knowledge, she laughed. It was a sort of nervous giggle one has when he is a little scared or not quite convinced.
Sarah's laughter was different from her husband's. Abraham laughed because he was glad. Sarah laughed because she doubted. So God said to Sarah, "Is anything too hard for the Lord?"
Then Sarah agreed with the Lord that there is nothing too hard for Him to do, and in course of time, Isaac, the son of promise, was born.
There is nothing too hard for the Lord! Another incident points this out:

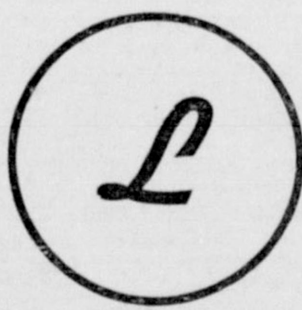

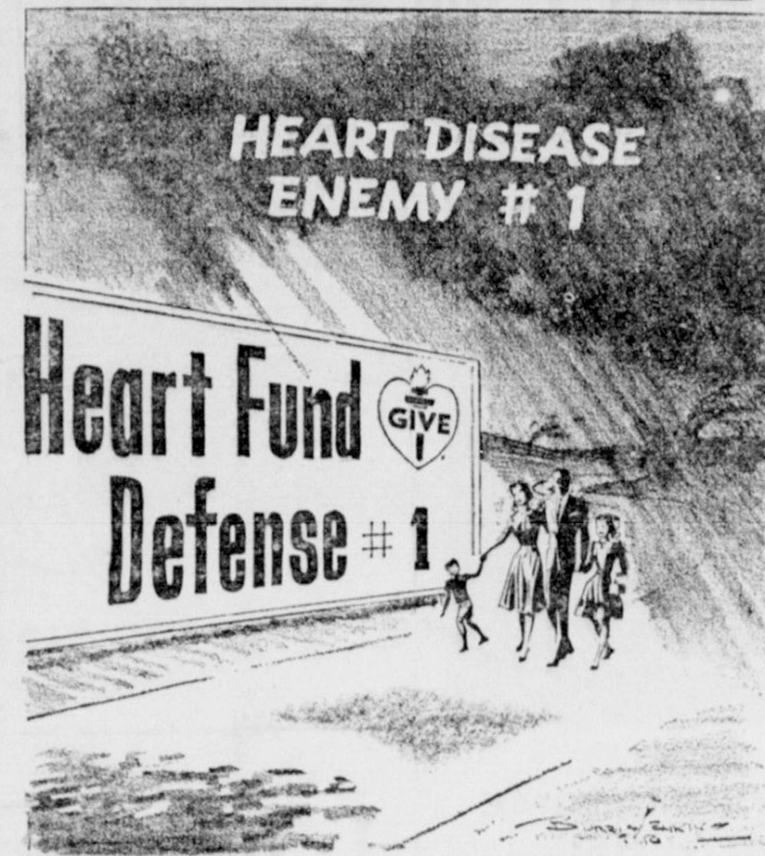

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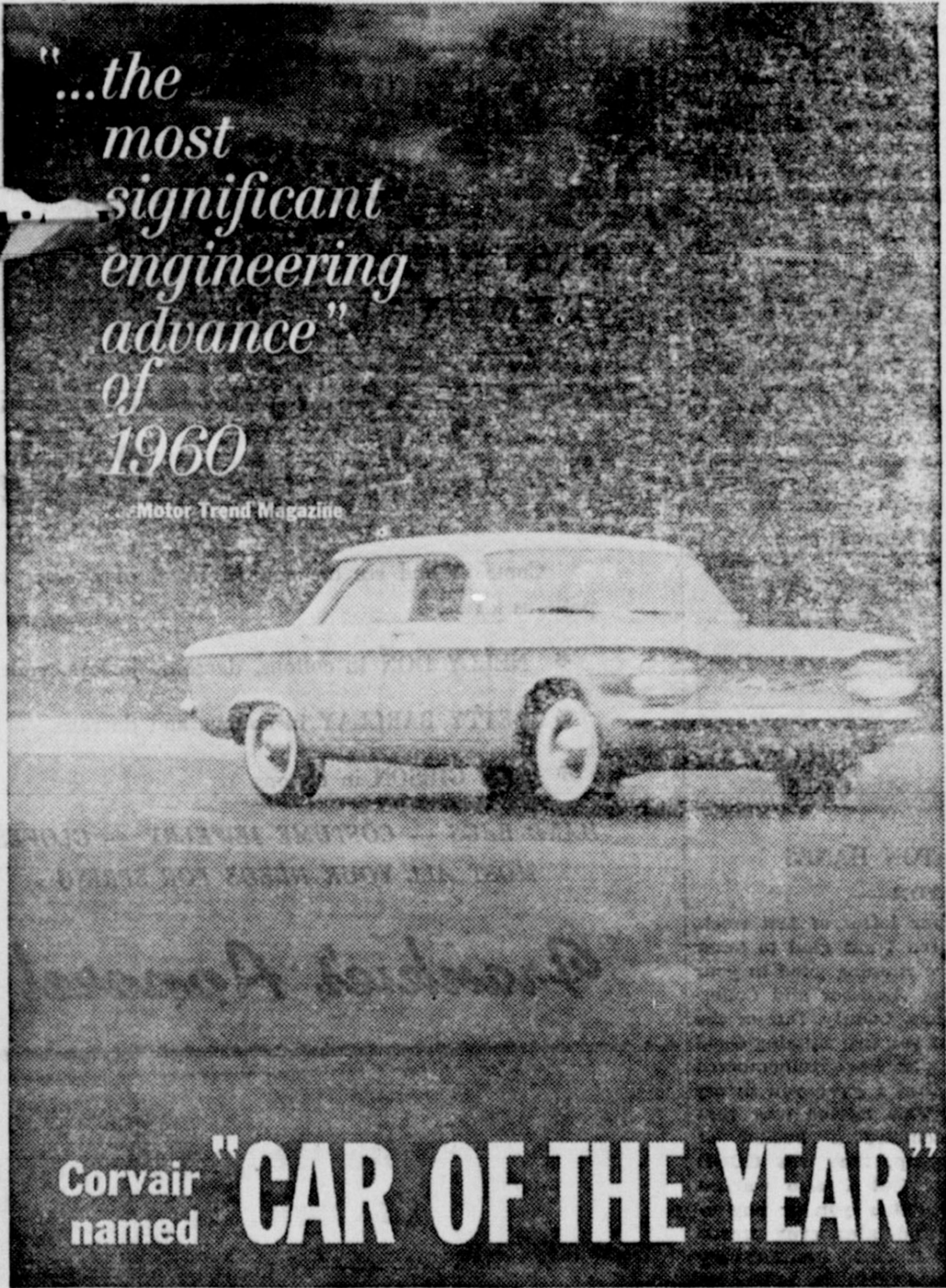
