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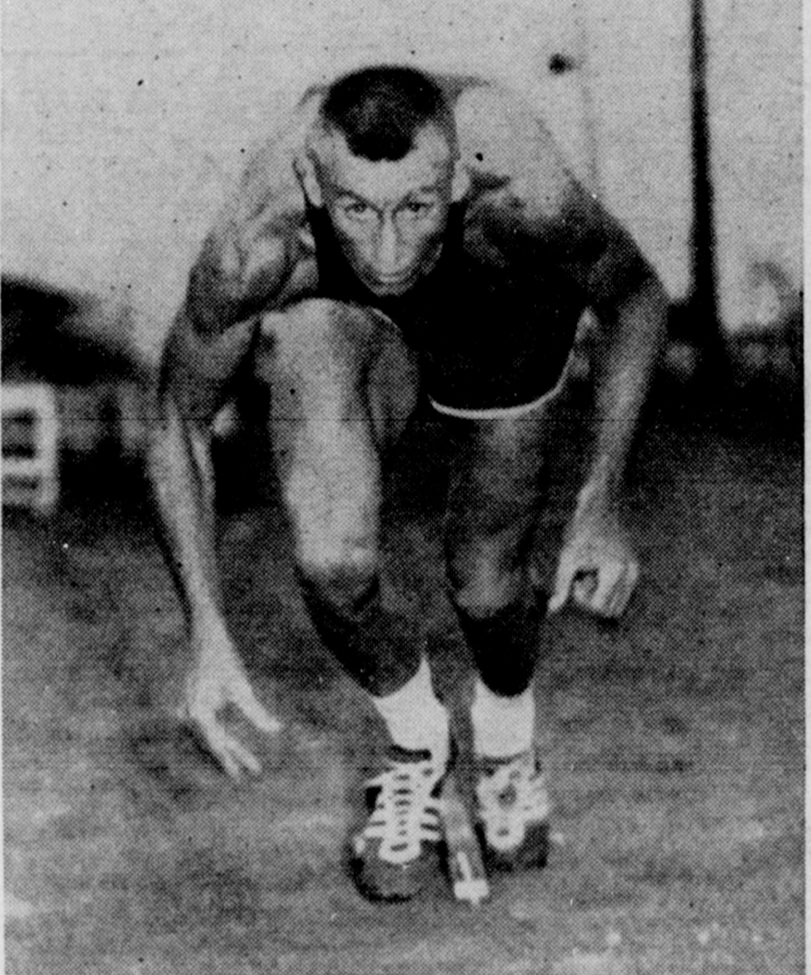

sHUCKs

Many garbled accounts of the altercation which occurred Monday afternoon in Iowa Park have been told. Newspaper, television and radio reports have been far from true, so we asked the Iowa Park police for an accurate report. The following is as true as eye witnesses and the boys implicated can recall:

When an IPHS boy, his younger brother and a girl friend stopped at the stop sign at the southeast corner of the school ground, there were four boys from out of town at the corner. Three of the strangers made wisecracks and one opened the rear doors of the Iowa Park car and walked through it, picking up an empty bottle on the way.

He attempted to break the bottle on the car, but succeeded only in denting the car. Then he broke the bottle on the sidewalk.

A second boy picked up an unbroken bottle.

Then the Iowa Park boy jumped out of his car and opened his pocket knife.

The two strangers attacked the Iowa Park boy, who proceeded to cut the first in his right side. The boy with the unbroken bottle dropped it and started to run. As he went by, the Iowa Park boy cut him in the side and back. The third and fourth boys got in their car and escaped.

The two injured boys walked to the Park Hotel. Tanner's Funeral Home picked up the boys and took them to Park Clinic. After first aid had been administered, Tanner's took them to Wichita General hospital.

In the meantime, the Iowa Park boys, his younger brother and his girl friend went to the police station to report the incident.

According to Iowa Park police, one injured boy has been released from the hospital, and the other is recovering.

According to statements from all concerned, the four out of town boys were complete strangers to the young Iowa Park people.

The whole case has been referred to the Wichita county probation department. No charges have been filed.

Former Parkan Dies in Okla.

Iowa Park friends received word that Mrs. Louie C. Kolp of Oklahoma City, an Iowa Park pioneer, had died Saturday morning after a long illness.

Funeral service was held Monday morning in Oklahoma City.

Mrs. Kolp was born in Gainesville and reared in Iowa Park. She was daughter of Dr. and Mrs. J. A. Landis, who settled here about 1897.

She was married in Iowa Park to D. C. Kolp jr., whose father had charted and platted the townsite.

During the early part of the century Mr. and Mrs. Kolp resided in Wichita Falls, later moving to Oklahoma City. In 1927, following her husband's death, Mrs. Kolp came to Wichita Falls to live with her son and his family.

In 1934 Mrs. Kolp returned to Oklahoma City and made her home with a sister.

Survivors include a son Russell R. Kolp of Wichita Falls; daughter Mrs. H. J. Rhodes of Oklahoma City; four grandchildren and several nephews and nieces.

THOUGHTS ON EASTER

The word "easter" is the anglicized form of the name of a Teutonic goddess, who was called Eostre, Ostara or Ostern, being the goddess of spring and the dawn. The Venerable Bede (673-735) declares that the festival of Easter derives its name from this goddess that was worshipped of old in Britain. The first celebration of Easter, according to Williston Walker in A History of the Christian Church, was in A.D. 154 or 155 in the city of Rome. This perhaps comes as a surprise to many who believe that Easter in its entirety is but a continuation of the Jewish Passover. Perhaps it is also a surprise to the great majority of the religious world which believes that its origin is in Christianity alone.

The date of the Easter celebration has been among the major religious controversies since the close of the second century. Some wanted to base its observance on the lunar calendar, while others believed it should be based on the solar calendar. The disagreement became so heated that Constantine called the Council of Nicea in 325 to settle on one date for the celebration. The Catholic Church was divided over this controversy, among other things, and to this day the Eastern Orthodox and Roman Catholic churches observe Easter at different times. At present both Protestant and Roman Catholic bodies observe the same date which was fixed by Pope Gregory XIII in 1582. This date is determined by the first full moon that falls on or next after the vernal equinox.

In Acts 12:4 in the King James Version the word "Easter" makes its only Biblical appearance. This same word was translated "Passover" in every other passage where it appeared in this version, but seemingly for variety, the translators substituted "Easter" here. The passage obviously refers to the Jewish Passover. Even in the Douay-Rheims (Catholic) Version this is recognized and "Easter" is not mentioned. Neither is it to be found in any other version of the Bible.

Just as the word "Easter" is not found in the New Testament, neither is its practice. It not only fails to mention Easter, but it is also silent on such related subjects as Lent, Palm Sunday, Good Friday, etc. To find such observances one must search elsewhere. Lyman Coleman (Presbyterian) says, "These festivals became an incongruous mixture of Judaism, paganism, and Christianity. These festivals had their origin in a corrupt age of the church, and are a manifest token of degeneracy." (Ancient Christianity Exemplified, p. 542). Encyclopedia Britannica states, "There is no indication of the observance of the Easter festival in the New Testament, or in the writings of the apostolic fathers. The sanctity of special times was an idea absent from the minds of the first Christians" (Vol. VIII, p. 823; 14th ed.). This authority summarizes by saying, "The Lord nor his apostles enjoined the keeping of this or any other festival."

Not only are festivals not enjoined in the New Testament; the New Testament condemns their observance. Paul said in Galatians 4:10-11, "Ye observe days, and months, seasons, and years, I am afraid of you, lest by any means I have bestowed labor upon you in vain." Such is condemned again by Paul in Colossians 2:16-18. Festivals of this sort have been borrowed by the papists from Judaism, mixed with paganism, and called Christianity. It is almost beyond belief that Protestant bodies thus bow to Rome.

The fundamental facts of the gospel are summarized in I Corinthians 15:3-4: "... Christ died for our sins according to the scriptures; and that he was buried, and that he rose again the third day according to the scriptures." The Lord did not just leave us the record of his death, burial, and resurrection to remind us of him, however. He instituted a supper to be kept in remembrance of his death (I Corinthians 11:23-29). The New Testament church observed the Lord's Supper on the first day of the week as will be seen from Acts 20:7. It is more than coincidental that the Lord's Supper was observed on the same day of the week that Christ rose from the dead. The Christian then, when he assembles on the first day of the week, not only remembers Christ's death, but also his resurrection. There is therefore no need for the festival called Easter, for every Lord's Day should commemorate all and more than "Easter" does only once a year.

Lone Star Gas Asks Rate Raise

Lone Star Gas company filed with the Iowa Park City Council at its meeting Monday night, an increase of 54 cents per MCF in each step of its rates for residential and commercial gas service.

This increase to the average residential user would amount to slightly more than one cent per day, it was pointed out by Carl Walsh, local manager.

The rate now in effect in Iowa Park, Walsh said, was based on our 1951 cost of service, yet the costs have increased continually since that year.

Increased cost of purchasing gas in the field is the primary cause for the increased expenses in delivering gas to the city gate.

Walsh asked the Council to give prompt approval to this application, since the requested increase is the minimum amount necessary to allow the company to continue providing gas.

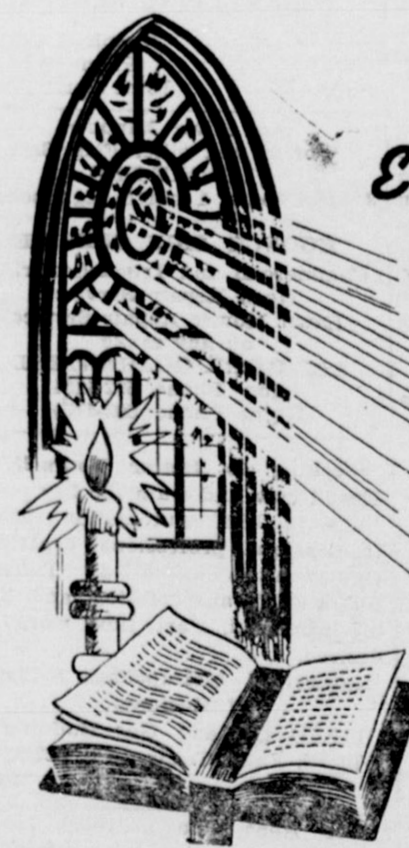

Other survivors are the widow; a son Walter of Menard; a stepson Sgt. Paul Colwell of Ft. Worth; and four grandchildren.



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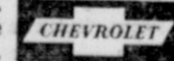

HOW TO GET YOUR PRAYERS ANSWERED

One of the greatest statements in the Bible is, "And the Lord heard and answered." That statement is sweet music to a person seeking God in an intimate, personal manner.

At some time in every life there comes a need to pray. Every person reaches a point where the sky looks black and the horizon of the future is clouded with uncertainty—then he wants his prayers to be answered.

However, there are times when there seems to be no way to get a prayer through or an answer in return. What is the key? Is there some strange secret that God is trying to teach us? I believe there is a way to get prayers answered.

The Bible says that those who wait upon the Lord shall renew their strength. And each of us needs a daily renewing of strength. We need our determinations strengthened, our expectant faith made stronger, and our love increased in every way. If our prayers were answered immediately every time, we would not wait before God.

So the Bible says, "They that wait upon the Lord shall renew their strength." There is no man or woman who can pray and expect God to answer every time in an instant. There are many testings of character, many influences brought to bear upon prayer life and the answer that God would give. It is necessary to understand the value of wait-

ing for God to answer in His own way and in His own time. When a person prays he must appeal to the love of God. Now, God is a good God. He is too good to do wrong, too wise to make a mistake, too strong to fail. Come to God in the way that pleases Him most. The Bible says, "God is love."

Another step toward getting prayers answered is using will. I believe that faith is part will, and to have faith without will power is to have half-faith—little faith. There must be determination and character that stands up and dares to believe God—that knows God wants to give His blessing, and will settle for nothing less.

When I was a little boy we had a neighbor who had a new car. One day the car turned over and pinned his son under it . . . and, although it was not humanly possible to lift such a weight, this man, whose name was Mr. Raimor, picked up one end of that car by himself and lifted it completely off his child. He couldn't possibly have done that on any other occasion. How did he do it? His will gave him new strength.

That extra strength, that extra power given from God to help us meet emergencies flooded his being, and for a few minutes it made him a superman.

God is a good God! He wants to give the very best He has to us, and He is waiting now to answer our prayers.



WHEAT MEETING

A meeting to consider and take action on the vital problems that confront wheat producers will be held in Wichita Falls at 2:00 p.m. Wednesday, April 20, in the Texas Electric Service company auditorium. 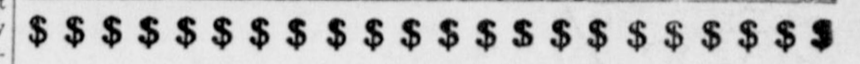
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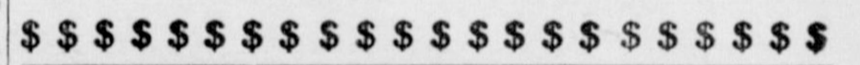

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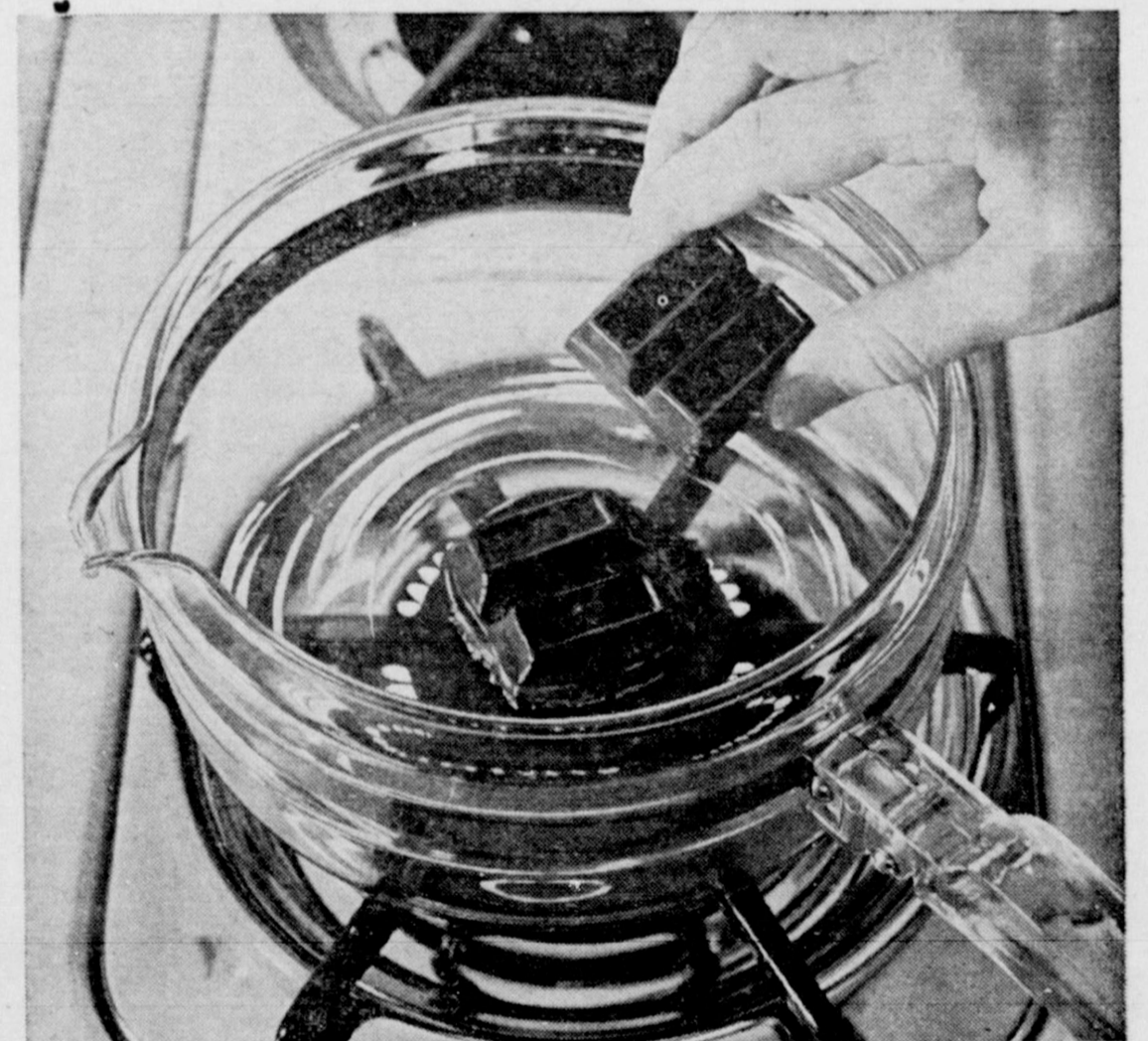
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School News

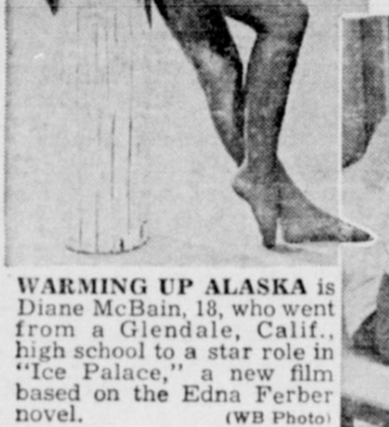

Despite the fact that it was denied time on the three major networks as a matter of Company policy because the film was not produced by their own news department staffs, millions of American television viewers are going to be able to see one of the most controversial space films of our time — "The Race for Space."

"The Race for Space," gives the true facts, impartially and objectively about the race between the U.S.A. and Russia in missile development. Produced by David L. Wolper in cooperation with the U.S. Department of Defense, the U.S. Army, Navy, Air Force, National Aeronautics and Space Administration and the Ministry of Culture of the U.S.S.R., it contains American and Soviet rocket and space films never before seen outside our Intelligence Service, including first views of the dog-carrying Sputnik II.

The film will reach home screens shortly through a triumph of enterprise involving tremendous effort and expense by the film's sponsor Shulton, Inc., makers of cosmetics. They have succeeded in putting together what has been described as a "fourth network"—an association of nearly 100 independent stations and network affiliates coast-to-coast who will air this film on prime night time.

By virtue of this unique hook-up and the tremendous interest and promotional effort which these broadcasting stations will exert, it is expected that the show will be viewed by a greater audience than originally contemplated through a network telecast.

Judging by the initial response from civic, educational and civil defense groups who have seen this film it will have the backing of public spirited groups all over the country.

General Holgar N. Toftoy, featured in the film and Chairman of the World Space Committee, says that every American should see this film. It has been made a regular part of the Curriculum at West Point. Response from the Press has been so tremendous that a news-

paper article about it has been read into the Congressional Record. The film won the 1959 San Francisco International Film Festival Documentary Award, and was nominated by the Academy of Motion Pictures Arts and Sciences for an Academy Award, the first TV film to be so honored.

The film shows the development of the giant V-2 under Hitler's direction, the capture of Wernher von Braun and other German scientists, and the dramatic firings of Sputnik I and Sputnik II, including scenes showing Laika, the

Space dog, being prepared for his flight.

The finale is the dramatic buildup and launching of our first successful earth satellite, Explorer I, a sequence which ends with the actual films of the tense and agonizing countdown in the blockhouse at Cape Canaveral.

There are also probing interviews with Mrs. Robert Goddard, widow of the great rocket pioneer, and General H. N. Toftoy, winner of the Distinguished Service Medal for his successful direction of the Army missile program.

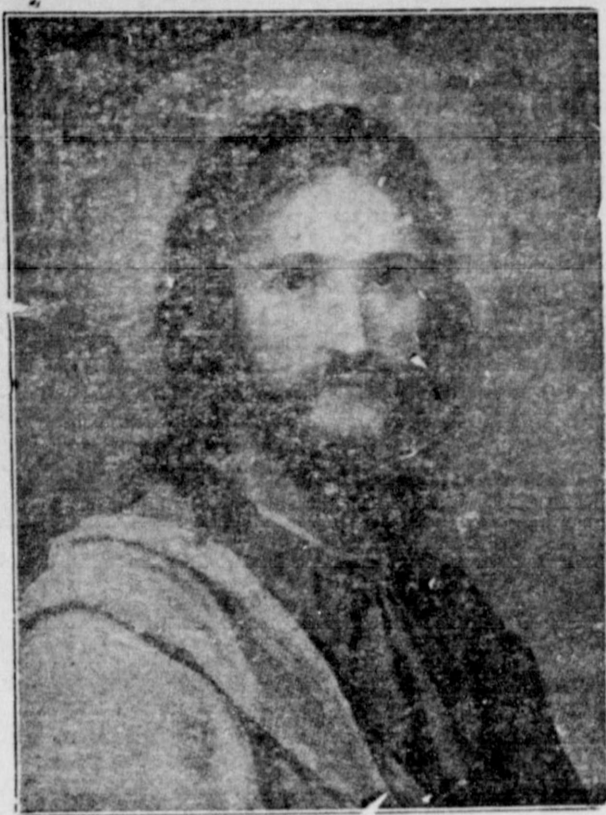
