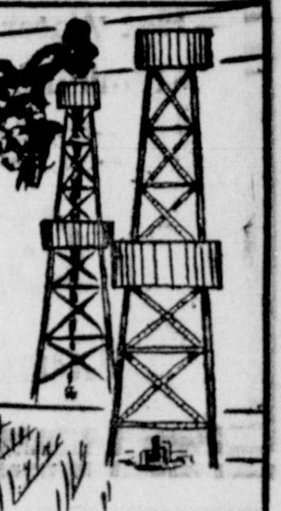

MONUMENTS

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Representative Vernon J. Stewart asks the citizens of Wichita county for their support in his bid for re-election as their State Representative, Place 1.

His statement is as follows:
A man that has been in public office should and must place his record before the people in asking for re-election. I have served faithfully and effectively for several sessions as your representative in Austin. I was born and educated in Wichita county; attended Hardin Junior college for two years; received my BA degree from the University of Texas; and received my law training at Baylor university. In addition to serving as your representative, I have taught government at our own Midwestern university.

The greatest accomplishment of my political career was the passage of the bill placing Midwestern in the state system of colleges and universities. This will result in lower cost to you and your children for a college education. It will also result in greater expansion and development of educational facilities for our own area of the state.

I also sponsored the bill creating the Wichita County Probation department. This was necessary in order to combat the rising rate of juvenile crime in our county and has already resulted in over 20 per cent decrease in such crimes.

During the last session I sponsored a bill placing the regulatory authority of game and fish under the Game and Fish Commission. This is a great step in conserving the game and fish in our county and takes wildlife conservation out of politics.

Another bill which I was proud to introduce and pass in the Legislature was the bill requiring persons requesting a retail beer permit to give public notice in the newspaper. This will give the residents in that particular neighborhood an opportunity to oppose such an application if they feel it would be undesirable to have such an establishment present.

Space will not permit my entire record. If you, the voters of Wichita county, feel that I have served you well and with integrity I will sincerely appreciate your support this Saturday at the polls.

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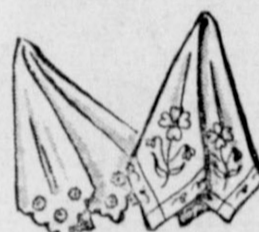
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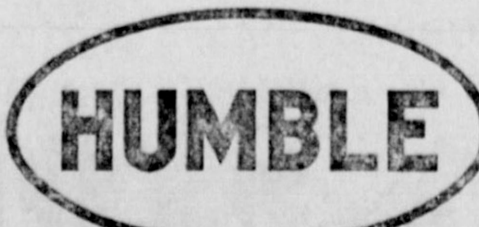
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Park Area club is the oldest Home Demonstration club in Wichita county, having been organized in the early 1920's.

Soil Conservation

Control of weeds in grass plantings will greatly influence the growth of grass seedlings, according to Elvy Sargent, Iowa Park soil conservationist with Wilbarger-Wichita SCD.

Large acreages have been seeded to native grass mixtures and are coming up to good stands. However, a large amount of weeds now growing may limit the survival of some plants.

Two methods of control are recommended: mowing and spraying. If spraying is used, plants should be older than they now are, or damage to young seedlings can be expected. Mowing may be practical now with spraying later.

Johnson grass is a heavy competitor for grass seedlings and if a heavy stand of Johnson grass is present, there is some question as to benefits of mowing, which reduces the shading but thickens the

density of Johnson grass near the ground. This may be greater competition than if left unmowed.

Control of weeds and annual grasses in bermuda grass may be had by grazing after survival of sprigs or sod is determined.

L. B. Dean, district engineer of the Texas Highway Department, was speaker for the Tuesday meeting of the Lions club. Special guest was John Moroney, maintenance foreman in this area.
