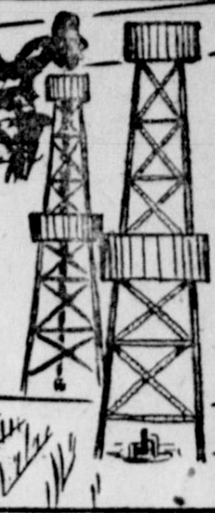

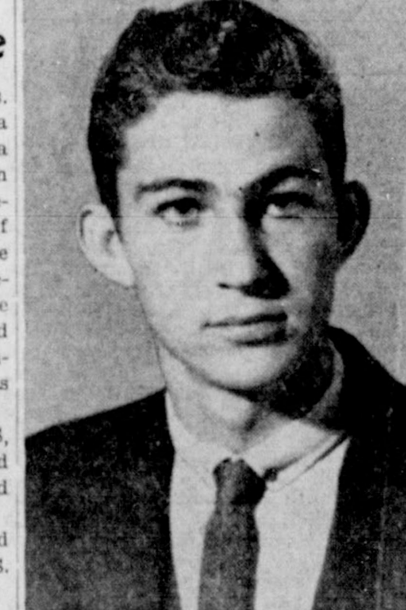
Jerry and his wife, the former Vanita Tate of Wichita Falls, have one son.

A BILL TO BE ENTITLED AN ACT to require applicants for registration of vehicles subject to registration by law to present to the County Tax Collector to whom application for registration is made a statement showing the county, school district, city or town, and other taxing districts by which such vehicles are taxable for the preceding year, and to exhibit to such tax collector receipts, certificates or sworn statement showing payment of all ad valorem taxes for such preceding year, for which such vehicle was taxable; requiring a seller of a motor vehicle to furnish the purchaser tax receipts or affidavit showing that such taxes have been paid; making it unlawful for the Highway Department or any tax collector to issue or cause to be issued registration receipt or license plate, or for any applicant to receive same without compliance with the provisions of this Act; and declaring an emergency.

At 8:00 p.m. the rodeo will open with a Grand Entry which will feature a drill by the Posse or Riding Club winning the parade.

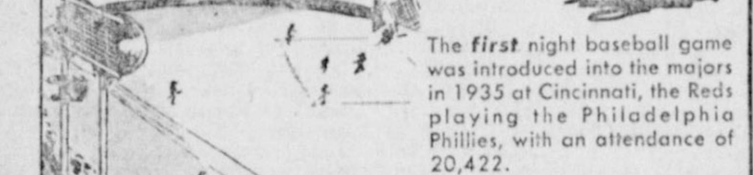
The Cowtown Posse of Fort Worth will feature the Friday night show and the mounted patrol from Wichita Falls will perform Saturday night.

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THE STATE OF TEXAS

To: The Unknown Stockholders of Wichita Falls & Southern Railroad Company and/or their heirs, Defendants, Greeting:

You are hereby commanded to appear before the Honorable 30th District Court of Wichita County, at the Court house thereof, in Wichita Falls, Texas, by filing a written answer at or before 10 o'clock a.m. of the first Monday next after the expiration of forty-two days from the date of the issuance of this citation, same being the 4th day of July A.D. 1960, to Plaintiffs' Petition filed in said court, on the 1st day of April A.D. 1960, in this cause, numbered 65,349-A on the docket of said court and styled Fort Worth and Denver Railway Company, a corporation, Plaintiff, vs. Wichita Falls & Southern Railroad Company and the Unknown Stockholders of Wichita Falls & Southern Railroad Company and/or their Unknown Heirs, Defendants.

A brief statement of the nature of this suit is as follows, to-wit: This suit is a suit for specific performance of a Contract of Sale wherein the Defendant agreed to transfer and convey its interest in and to all that certain lot, tract or parcel of land, being situated in the County of Wichita, State of Texas, and described as follows, to-wit:

All of the interest of the Defendant in and to all lands and premises in Wichita County, Texas, except the right of way of the Defendant commencing at a point approximately 1826.2 feet North of and 2281.1 feet West of the intersection of the East line of the J. A. 

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Foreign Aid

By Sen. Ralph W. Yarborough

The importance of our foreign aid program is highlighted by Khrushchev's tactics and walkout at Paris. The Russian boss's actions illustrate our need for allies in the world.

But the need for our foreign aid program doesn't excuse or justify waste or graft. That is why I recently voted to cut the fat out of foreign aid spending.

One way we sought to eliminate waste was to try to require that Congress must review and approve each foreign water and dam project estimated to cost over \$1,000,000. In other words, we tried to set the same standard on foreign projects we have for federally built water projects in Texas.

But the amendments lost, and today we continue to authorize and appropriate money for foreign public works on a lump-sum basis, without consideration by Congress of the separate large projects. One Senator inquired during debate if any member of the Senate knew how many foreign projects that will cost over \$1,000,000 were being authorized under the \$4,000,000,000 bill. No one answered.

I'm convinced that closer study of separate projects would have two results: The program would cost less; it would achieve more because wisely invested dollars would build more beneficial projects and win wider respect among foreign people.

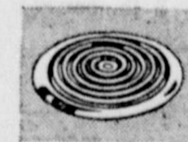

HELLO, FRIENDS:

I didn't take much stake in the first election because there was already too much heated argument. I am going to try and give you a history of my stewardship and am forced to answer the charges against me.

They say I am too old. None of them ever had to bait my hook or lead me across the creek. Years have not affected me and I don't remember ever being sick a day in my life. You have heard on radio that there was five months against me and I didn't pay my taxes. They also said I was very wealthy. These statements don't make sense. A certificate from the Disperser's office and Wichita Abstract Company show there are no outstanding judgments against me. Also one from my office and my chief clerk in the Court House, I have any taxes at all and that if I was wealthy I would pay my taxes I would pay anything if I had any against me my bonding would cancel my bond automatically be put in your hands if you have land in county. My daughters some land down there not realizing enough out of the taxes much less to Texas. I have a hand from Ralph Mc who says that my ranch ed all during the 1950's. really worthless. It has for the last several years, at worthless needle grass, weeds and shinnery. He to sell all his cattle be is nothing for them to have made two trips out a land and I have never to find it. It is in the of a pasture and a dry

hole is off setting it. They could buy it for a whole lot less than what is being spent to defeat me in the election.

They tell you I never stay at my office. I don't know how they would know, if they stay at their office. Do they?

They say I don't know anything about my office. My office force will tell you that when they can not take care of applications for car titles they send them to me. I have never failed to fix one up yet if they had all the necessary papers, I have discussed this matter with the highway department and they have told me how to handle same.

My opponent says he doesn't anticipate any changes in the personnel. He might have different anticipations if he is elected. Again he says he does not expect any drastic changes. It would sure be drastic for the one he let out and it could be one of your best friends and one of my best deputies. At one time he said he would keep them all but he did not say how long. I have never seen an election like this where a newly elected official didn't have persons working for him who are expecting a job. They certainly can't give them a job without disposing of the efficient deputies I have in my office. The records of my personnel show they are second to none in Texas in courtesy, efficiency, and economy. I have only added four new deputies to my office force in twenty-four years I have been in office and we're doing extra work. Three of them coming down at 7:00 in the morning, we have been able to absorb the extra work and save the county money. For efficiency, will say Pat Lambert Company audited my books for fifteen years. We handle some four million dollars a year. The worst year I had was 1956 and we were fifteen cents over. That will be hard to beat because it is better than perfect. After operation of my offices are over at the end of the year I have turned over to the county over \$44,000 above the expenses of my office for their use for the last nine years. Several months ago the county was short on money and said maybe they should invest the collection of Tax Assessor. I took them the municipal report from Austin which said 90% is a good collec-

tion for the budget. This report shows that I have been collecting over 97 1/2% each year as of June 1st. I have not had a delinquent tax collector since Carl Cowles passed away and the County Attorney has only helped me two or three months in the last ten years.

My opponent says he will cut out the special numbers you all are getting. He says it is too much a waste of time. Now I understand he says he didn't say that. He doesn't say what he will do though he says he is well acquainted with all the workings of the Tax Collector's office. He doesn't know that we write 90% of these up before the busy time and have them ready to deliver before the rush starts. If we didn't do this you would have to stand in line much longer. I don't know of anyone who has stood in line over thirty minutes. I have never refused to hold anyone's check till pay day so they could register their cars.

I have never refused to come to the office day or night, rain or shine to help anybody in trouble with their car papers.

I have been awarded a lifetime membership in the West Texas County Judges association and it wasn't awarded on my good looks. They said I had worked harder and done more to help the taxpayers of all counties in Texas than any other one person. Judge Arthur Tipps will verify this.

I want to thank all of you who voted for me in the first primary and those who did not work hard enough to defeat me. I would certainly appreciate your vote and support on June 4th run off.

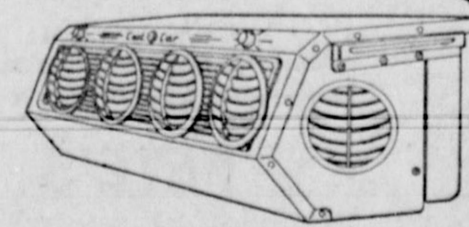
