Funeral service was conducted May 26 with interment in Decorah Lutheran cemetery beside his relatives. Pallbearers were childhood friends of Mr. Anderson.

The two grain companies here Williams & Son, and Ed C. Holder—received more wheat than has ever been handled in Iowa Park before.

Williams handled a little over 100,000 bushels and Holder handled 80,000 bushels.

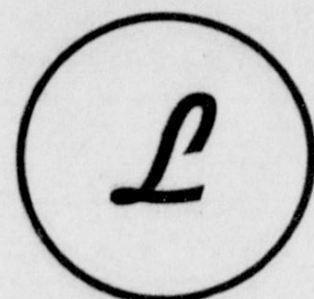

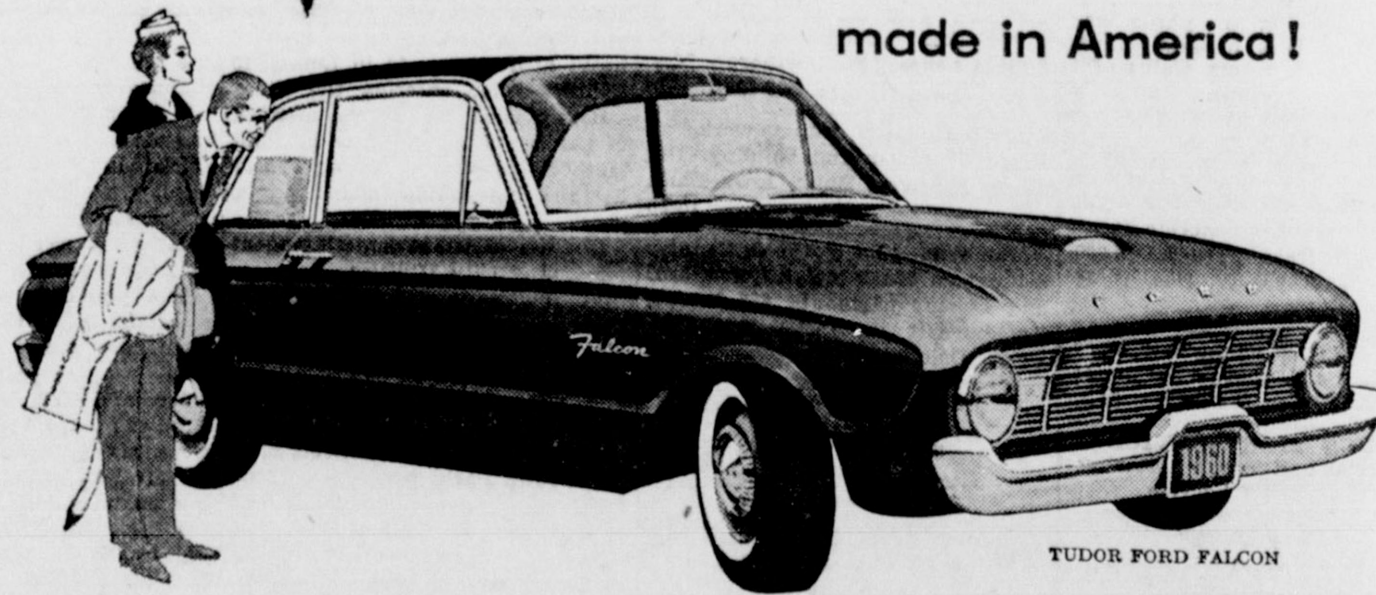

WHAT IS HEALING BY FAITH?
I am often asked the question: "What do you mean when you speak of healing by faith?" One man, a doctor, said to me recently, "I can understand chiropractic healing as an adjustment of the nervous system which makes a physical change. Medical science works a chemical change and brings about healing, but when healing comes through faith in God, I can't understand what happens."
The Bible has a lot to say about healing by faith. One of the things we learn from the Bible is that Jesus, the Son of God, has authority over everything, including sickness. Since He has that authority, He has but to speak a word and a person can be healed. Jesus said in Matthew 28:18, "All power is given unto me in heaven and in earth."
The process of healing is very interesting. According to the Bible, healing is recovery which stops or arrests sickness or disease. Then the God-given recuperative powers of the mental and physical processes are stimulated and the body begins to get well immediately. Healing is a brake to sickness and disease. It stops them.
Sickness can strike your body when it is well and strong. All of a sudden you are losing ground—you are in reverse physically. But you realize how dangerous that can be—that sickness blights your life—that it can kill you.
When you come to be healed you must release your faith. Many times illness is started by wrong believing. When this is corrected, recovery begins. By releasing your faith, your right believing, you recover the powers of your body which have been going in reverse.
So healing is recovery. Christ said, "They shall lay hands on the sick, and they shall recover" (Mark 16:18).
I know that healing comes from God. It is His will that you enjoy good health. The Bible says, "Beloved, I wish above all things that thou mayest prosper and be in health, even as thy soul prospereth."
I do not know exactly how healing by faith occurs, but I do know that it is accomplished when people let their faith go to God, when they believe that they can be healed through the limitless power of God.
When you earnestly believe that God will heal you, you can reverse your sickness. You are automatically on your way to complete deliverance through your strong faith in God. That is healing by faith.

Drunk Tests

Many things can make a man appear intoxicated, according to the Texas Safety association, but only alcohol will register in a test for intoxication. Thanks to scientific devices and methods, the truth comes out.

Instead of sitting in a jail overnight, a sick person can be rushed to a doctor for treatment of illness, injuries or shock.

This type of incident occurs quite often. Chemical tests of the blood, urine or breath not only

save embarrassment, but also save lives.

Tests provide police with information that enables them to detect when a suspected drunk driver is not under the influence of alcohol. That naturally leads them to suspect an injury, or that the arrested person actually is ill.

Tests for intoxication are not compulsory. Thirty states now have chemical test laws.

Chemical tests are one of the most effective means of coping with the problem of drinking and driving; and they are fair when administered properly.

Tests do not tell how many drinks a driver has had. They indicate the percentage of alcohol in his blood. The level at which a person is presumed to be under the influence of alcohol is prescribed by law.

Information on the blood alcohol content, coupled with the physical signs of the driver's condition, helps determine if he is unfit to drive a car.
