Doc Hays Dies in 2-Car Collision

Funeral service was conducted in the Tanner Funeral Home here Wednesday afternoon for Mr. Hershel Morris (Doc) Hays, 59, Rev. Claude McDonald of the Christian church officiated. Burial was in Electra cemetery under direction of Tanner Funeral Home. Pallbearers were Dallas Ralston, Bud Mitchell, Claud Reaves, A. O. Beall, Bill Harris, Jim Fish. Doc was born Aug. 21, 1900, in Rush Springs, Okla., son of the late Mr. and Mrs. Clem Hays. He moved to Iowa Park about 40 years ago with his parents, where he was an oilfield worker. Mr. Hays was in a two vehicle collision about a mile west of Iowa Park at the intersection of Highway 287 and Johnson Road about 5:00 p.m. Monday. He was dead on arrival at Wichita General hospital, where he was taken by Tanner ambulance. Three other persons were injured in the wreck: George Butcher, 66, and Charles Glazner, 49, both of Iowa Park, and Paul H. Hayers, 17, of Electra. Butcher was admitted to Wichita General hospital. He has broken ribs, bruises and cuts. Glazner, driver of the pick-up in which Doc and George were riding, received minor injuries and was released from the hospital. Hayers, driver of the panel truck, received cuts and bruises. He received treatment but was not hospitalized. Highway Patrolman Kenneth Benson investigated the accident. Glazner was pulling onto the highway from Johnson Road at the time of the collision. Mr. Hays' survivors are two brothers: H. C. of Clovis, N.M., and Porter of Little Rock, Ark.; two nieces and four nephews.

Completion by Continental Oil company of a \$300,000 improvement and modernization project at the Kamay natural gasoline plant was announced recently. The project included replacement of an outdated absorption oil unit with a refrigeration-type natural gasoline processing plant similar to the one installed near Pecos in 1959. Work on the plant, which has a daily processing capacity of 7½ million cubic feet of gas, was begun early this year.

Lone Star Gas Has Lease Plan on Equipment

A gas air-conditioning unit lease program, believed to be one of the first of its kind in the Southwest, has been announced by Lone Star Gas company.

Lone Star feels the program will be particularly attractive to business establishments. Certain businesses may accrue tax and conservation of working capital benefits by leasing instead of purchasing equipment. The lease plan also is available to residential customers.

The program, offering two models of Bryant gas air conditioners, gives the lessee an opportunity to obtain summer comfort for a nominal monthly charge with no further concern of such items as maintenance, routine service or capital outlay, Carl Walsh says.

Lone Star chose to offer the Bryant unit as it permits installation with a minimum of disturbance to the customer's property. Bryant units are available in 3- and 4 1/2-ton models and are regarded as add-on units—installed outside a building, thus requiring no floor space.

Lease term is for a 12 month period. Monthly leasing charge includes delivery and installation of unit, installation of concrete slab, necessary coils, water piping, thermostats and wiring. There will be no charge for service for replacement of any part on the lease equipment, Walsh said.

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Farm and Home Safety Are Important

Kill these 21 Rattlers before they kill you—

A den of rattlesnakes lie under the ledge on the hill near the farmhouse. Their flat heads are full of venom and everywhere they go there is death or crippling sickness waiting for the unwary.

Does your home or farm harbor a den of rattlesnakes? Perhaps your property does not harbor the scaly kind of rattlesnakes, but if your home or farm is typical, you have "rattlesnakes" in the form of farm and home hazards.

These hazards are just as fast, far more deadly, and much more common than rattlers. They are ready to strike without warning if you become a little careless.

They give you anti-venom for a snakebite and it works well, but they haven't found anything that will help you when you provide contact between old frayed electric cords or wire and damp ground. The burns on your hand where the voltage arched could be cured, but there is no anti-venom for a paralyzed heart.

A rattlesnake usually gives a warning before striking. There is usually no warning sounded when a spattered mess of crushed bone is pulled from a piece of moving machinery or a lawn mower. A ladder or a throw rug doesn't sound a warning before you fall.

Little innocent looking forgotten things are waiting for you to blunder. A tangled piece of old

barbed wire, a penny in a fusebox, a swimming pool, a plastic bag, a discarded refrigerator, a gun, a cracked rung on a ladder, a frayed lamp cord, and a bottle of disinfectant in the medicine cabinet—all can be deadly.

The step you meant to mend, the pile of oily rags in the corner and the gasoline can in the garage could cause much suffering and leave you with a crippling injury. Many of these things are innocent, some are useful, some provide recreation, some are necessary in our modern world, and usually they are as safe as man can make them—until they have a deadly helpmate which you must supply: Carelessness! You make the carelessness. You mix it and it goes to work.

Let's put a stop to all this unnecessary cost of pain and death. Let's clear up the "den of rattlers" and make our homes and farms safer places in which to live.

Do we have to wait for blood or burn? Start the clean-up with this safety checklist. Kill these "21 Rattlers" before they strike. Let's all make safety a family project and fulfill our responsibility to our family, and the people we deal with daily—to stay safe to enjoy life.

FARM SAFETY CHECKLIST

1. Ladders in good condition.
2. Sharp instruments handled in an orderly and safe manner.
3. Broken bottles and glass picked up.
4. Protruding nails removed from boards, walls, fences.
5. Walks safe and in good repair.
6. Steps safe and in good repair.
7. Porch and stair railings steady.
8. Visibility clear in and around buildings, especially where a driveway enters a public road.
9. Inflammable materials stored safely with adequate ventilation.
10. Poisons and insecticides stored safely.
11. All poisonous materials correctly labeled.
12. All electrical systems properly grounded.
13. Electrical switches in good repair.

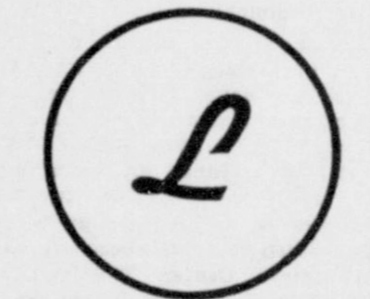

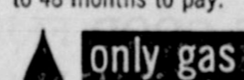

HOW YOU CAN BE HEALED THROUGH FAITH

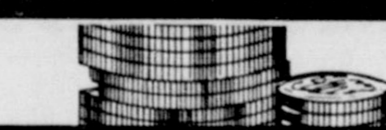

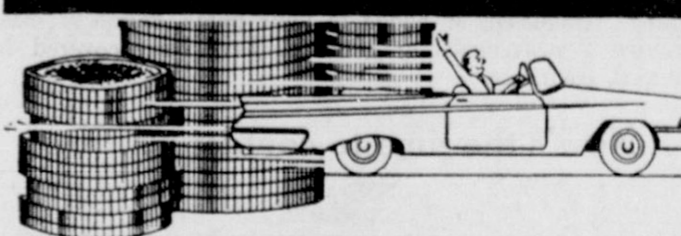
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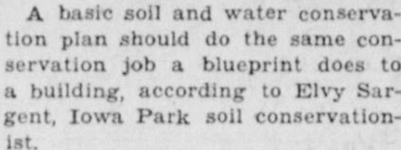
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SOIL CONSERVATION DISTRICT NEWS



OUR SOIL ★ OUR STRENGTH

A basic soil and water conservation plan should do the same conservation job a blueprint does to a building, according to Elvy Sargent, Iowa Park soil conservationist.

Basis for preparing a plan for a farm or ranch is a soil and range survey, Sargent says.

W. H. McAlister of Punkin Center has developed a basic conservation plan with the Wilbarger-Wichita SCD. The soils survey showed the cropland to be Wichita clay loam, a deep, fine textured, slowly permeable soil sloping from 1 to 3 feet per 100. This is Class II land with a fair plant-soil-air-water relationship, a low water intake and slight erosion susceptibility.

A conservation plan aims to maintain active organic matter in root zone, high temporary water storage in soil surface, maintain cover during critical periods, prevent runoff and reduce to non-erosive velocity.

To accomplish these objectives, McAlister plans to seed 20 acres of Austrian winter peas and 10 acres of Madrid clover each year. He will fertilize these legumes and about 75 acres of wheat. All residues are planned for stubble mulching for cover between crops.

These practices will be supplemented by establishing two grassed waterways and terraces when the grass is established. Work has begun on waterway shaping and the stubble mulching.

Other activity in this area: H. C. Obenhaus and Mrs. Cora Washburn have two waterways located and designed by technicians of the SCS. Barwise Estate has a waterway planned to serve four owners of the estate and two waterways have been designed for Carl Moeller. All of these are east of Punkin Center. The Barwise Estate will receive federal cost-share through an ACP pooling agreement.

Newton Crane of Burkburnett will shape four waterways as soon as a contractor is available.

J. B. Riley of Burkburnett Stanley Williamson, Albert May and W. E. Karstetter of Iowa Park are terracing. H. B. Klinkerman of Iowa Park is constructing a pond. Clear Lake Stock Farm of Kamay, owned by Mrs. Ramon Wood, is constructing a pond, diversion terraces, leveling land and growing hogari for dead cover when grasses are seeded. Cost-share for Clear Lake Stock Farm is through the Great Plains Conservation Program.
