Soil Conservation

One of the more important steps in soil and water conservation is hat of working out with the and ranch planner of the Iowa tion Service.

Charles Hanson, son of Mrs. Ida Park states the main tool for and soil survey on each acre. A range survey is best made while working with the land owner in making a forage inventory of grass found on a particular site, as certain land types produce different kinds of vegetation due to depth of soil, soil structure and moisture

A soils survey can assist in diagnosing farmland similar to a phyiscian's diagnosis of a patient's ills. It will assist in pointing out hazards that might be unprofitable to farming of certain fields or areas due to soil depth, types of parent material underlying soil surface, slope of land and degree of erosion taking place, and the ability of a soil to absorb water.

The above items will govern the measures necessary to maintain each acre in accordance to the land needs and capabilities, and whether a rotation of high residue producing crops and proper manage ment of residues are adequate to control erosion, or whether mehis lovely wife Helena and the chanical measures such as installation of terraces and waterways are





BE IT RESOLVED BY THE LEG-ISLATURE OF THE STATE OF Section 1. That Section 49-b, Article III of the Constitution of Texas, be amended by adding thereto the follow-

"The foregoing notwithstanding, bonds hereafter issued by the Veterans' Land Board pursuant to the authority of this Section 49-b of the Constitution may bear a rate or rates of interest not to exceed three and one-half percent (3-½ %) per annum.

"This Amendment shall become ef-fective upon its adoption."

"AGAINST the Amendment to Section 49-b of Article III of the Constitution of Texas by adding thereto a provision authorizing the Veterans' Land Board to issue the bonds authorized under such Section to bear interest at a rate or rates not to exceed three and one-half percent (3-1/2%) per annum."

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
