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



Soil Conservation

Growing native grasses for seed production may offer some irri gation farmers another cash crop, according to Elvy Sargent, Iowa Park soil conservationist. Seed can be expected to give

better results when seeded locally and there are recognized limits from which seed can be moved for seeding, Sargent added. For that reason farmers and ranchers will provide a local market up to their seeding needs. Most seed have had to be purchased from other areas. W. J. Thompson of Wichita Falls

has seeded all cropland on his farm to grass for seed production. Caddo switchgrass and Indiangrass will be harvested this year. Other grassed planted for seed produc tion are K. R. bluestem and Caucasian bluestem,

Experience has shown a good gross income from grass seed but there are more steps involved. Harvesting is slower and often more difficult to perform than routine

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
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
