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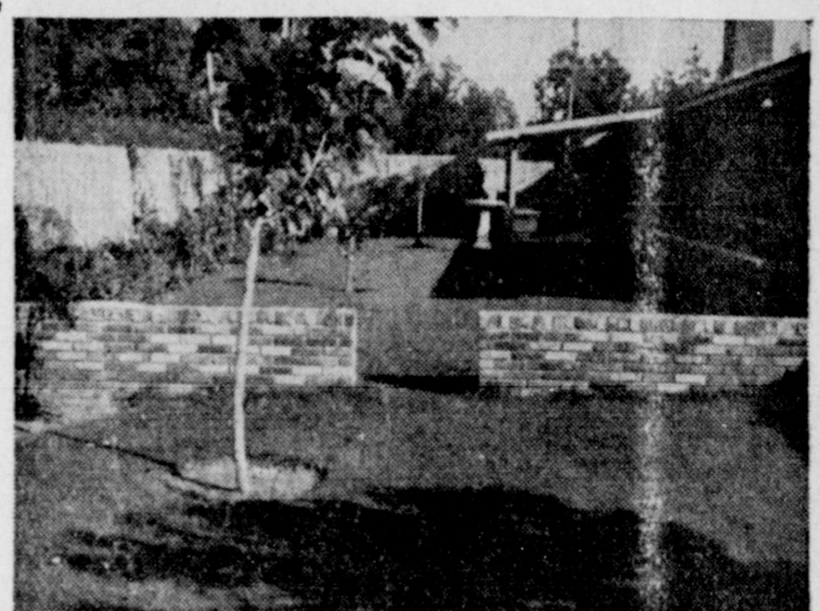

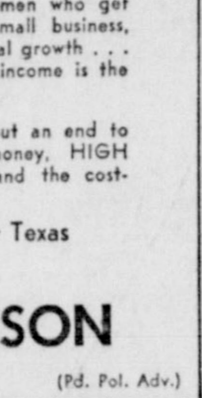

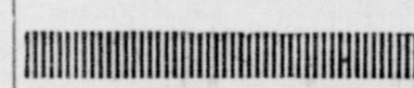

I have always found the American people willing to be just in all things if they have the facts at hand to think over. Here are a few facts to remember when you go to the polls November 8th.

There are several in this race, two men have held office from eight to ten years, total salaries approximately \$75,000. Another candidate has held office more than a quarter century. Another candidate has run and held office for two decades.

Business College as a young man and had many years experience in general office work and auditing, as well as eight years as a deputy in all departments of the Tax Office.

I refer you to any banker, wholesaler or retail merchant in Wichita Falls.

You would not send a banker out to rope cattle, neither would you send a cowboy in to manage a bank. All professions are honorable, even so in politics. We must be careful not to attempt to put a square peg in a round hole as it were.
