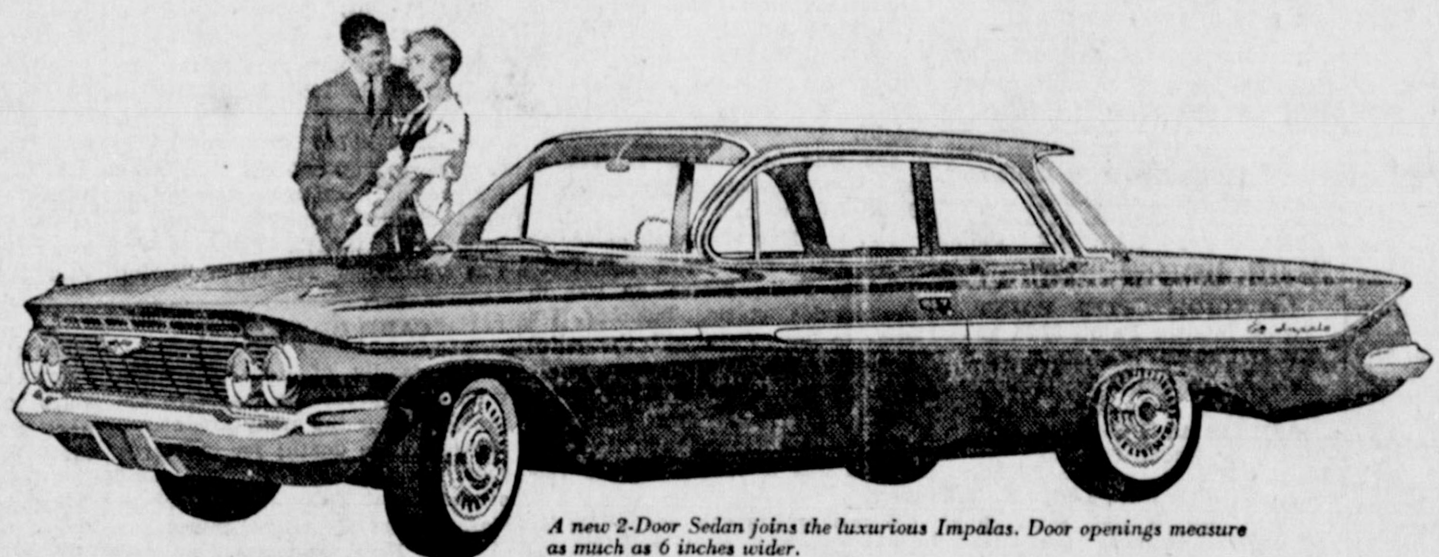

For the sixth consecutive year, Wichita county 4-H members will be represented at the national Junior Poultry Fact Finding conference to be held early in June at Kansas City, Mo. Jerry Lamb and Pat Pruett have been named state winners of 1960 junior poultry fact finding awards.

B. T. Haws, county agent, was named a chaperone for the Texas delegation. All three will receive all-expense trips to the conference.

Jerry is son of Mr. and Mrs. V. C. Lamb of Wichita Falls. He is completing his sixth year of poultry production and marketing work which has involved more than 1000 broilers. He has 79 ribbons and 7 medals. His broilers rated blue ribbons in local shows, at the state fair and at the Houston stock show.

Pat is son of Mr. and Mrs. Robert F. Pruett, route two, Iowa Park. During his five years of 4-H work he has produced 750 broilers and is partner with his mother in a 1300-hen laying flock. He too has made a good record with his broiler exhibits. His training and experience enable him to perform any job connected with broiler or egg production.

He says, "By following a balanced feeding program, using good housing and sanitation and disease control, I am able to have broilers of top quality ready for market in 8 1/2 weeks, weighing from 3 1/2 to 4 1/2 pounds each. A shorter growing period has meant more profit by dressing broilers myself and selling to the user. I can get a better price."

Pat can grade eggs as well as broilers and knows how to handle eggs to maintain top quality. He has studied marketing practices by visiting processing plants and selling outlets.

He has served as officer in his 4-H club and as a delegate to the county council. This year he was county winner in the Farmstead division of Bridwell Soil Builders program.

The itinerary will include France, England, Denmark, Sweden, Switzerland, Germany, Austria, Greece, Italy and Spain.

The Boohers have bought a little French car for transportation on the tour. They expect to return in August of next year.
