of Church and State. Senator Kennedy at Houston repeated his clear-cut stand "for' separation of Church and State. Have we any right to expect him to pressure his church leaders to agree with him? Would we ask Mr. Nixon to sign pledges to bear arms since many of them have been conscientious objectors in past

wars? Ambassador Lodge believes in federal aid to parochial schools. Shall we ignore this clear breach of the separation of Church and State principle found in our Constitution? Mr. Nixon's "vague, evasive and ambiguous" telegram to the Texas Baptist Standard leaves us in doubt as to whether he has "any real convictions" in this vital area, and he has not disclaimed Ambassador Lodge's rather startling statements.

In his 25 years of patriotic serv ice to Texas and the United States, Senator Johnson has demonstrated repeatedly his belief in separation of Church and State. His democratic plan to assist worthy students to get individual loans for their college expenses is clearly constitutional. We Baptists must not let our

churches be embroiled in this campaign and it is only fair that every messenger to the Texas Baptist General Convention in Lubbock should consult with his fellow church members before he commits us on any "political" questions. We jeapordize our taxexempt status if we allow political minded persons to entangle us in their activities.
