VOICE FOR THE VOICELESS

Last month in Telephone Talk, I mentioned the successful launching of Echo, the communication satellite in orbit 1,000 miles above the earth.

Now I have news of still another product of communications research. It's a new artificial larynx to help people with impaired vocal cords to speak again.

This electronic larynx is really a "new voice" for people who have lost the use of their vocal cords. When held against the throat, this 7-ounce device (looks something like a flashlight) replaces the vibrations of normal vocal cords to produce speech. It is being offered on a non-profit basis.

In an age of great scientific achievements such as space satellite communications, the Bell solar battery and transistors (all pioneered by Bell scientists), it's reassuring to know that telephone research has not overlooked human needs in the search for better communications services.
