



HOSPITAL CARE BY TELEPHONE

Each day a number of interesting or unusual communica-tions problems cross my desk. While this one didn't happen in Iowa Park, I think you'll find it interesting, too.

The day after Thanksgiving, a young mother was hospitalized. She needed medication and complete rest. Everything went well until she began to miss her three little girls who were too young to visit her in the hospital. To make matters worse, she worried about not being able to do her Christmas shopping.

When the nurses discovered what was troubling her, they had a quick remedy. A phone was placed next to her bed. She talked with her children every day . . . and, what's more, did all of her Christmas shopping by telephone. It's stories and services like this that make it possible for us to advertise like this: "You name any communications need, Southwestern Bell has a service to meet it."

"NOW HEAR THIS . . . "

Remember this old phrase made famous by the Navy? It was used to gain attention of crew members in all parts of the ship when new orders or communications were communicated. When answers were required, all the crew members had to do was "speak up."

Near each phone in the home is a small speaker which broadcasts the caller's voice. The person called can answer through a small microphone located in the base of the phone.


If you'd like more information about the home interphone, just call the telephone business office-or ask any telephone service man.

Refreshments were brought by the families. This time it was sandwiches and trimmings such as


