

> Generally, shallowland soils supand bottomland soils support mid and tall grasses. Random clippings in different sites con be weighed and calculated into total pounds of forage produced per acre. > A soils map of farmland can assist a landowner in locating the ills or hazards that might be unprofitable in farming a certain erosion taking place, and the ability of a particular soil to absorb


