





Easter Seal Funds To Aid Crippled Children Monday evening, March 27, vol unteer workers of junior and senior girls, under leadership of Ben Hildebrand, will ring doorbells for donations to the Easter Seals campaign, Each girl will be wearing a blue and white tag as

identification and will have sheets of Easter Seals for donors. This year more than ever before Easter Seals need to be bought

because a \$100,000 rehabilitation center is to be erected at Sixth and Denver in Wichita Falls for the benefit of crippled children of this area.

The building will replace an inadequate Cerebral Palsy headquarters in the basement of Memorial Auditorium in Wichica Falls.

The building will be designed so that cerebral palsy, polio, muscular dystrophy and muscular sclerosis patients can be treated.

The center is being financed by Kiwanis club trust fund, and private sources providing \$50,000 plus a matching \$50,000 from the Hill Burton Funds, a federal aid source. Mrs. Nina Jackson, center director and speech therapist, and Mrs. Betty Wages, physical therapist, now operate in the Cerebral Palsy headquarters and will be in charge

of the new center. An occupational therapist will be added to the staff. When additional space is provided, volunteer workers will be used. Presently there is no room for volunteers to work.
