The old bird was a source of delight to school children. Often Polly hung out in the trees and talked to the children. Polly Led to talk over the telephone and always would ask "Are you going to Iowa Park?"

After Mr. Tanner's death the bird was a watchdog for Mae Mae. When he heary anyone on the outside of the house he made a peculiar sound to attract her attention. When he saw a strang er approaching he called "Mrs. Tanner"; when he saw a member of the family coming he called

Polly sang "Glory, Glory, Hallelujah." When Buddy and Browne sat down to eat the parrot would ask "Is that good?" Most of the time they would tell him it was good and would give him something to eat. Other times they would ignore the question to get the bird's reaction. Then Polly would yell out "Is that stuff

Buddy started work on his new funeral home this week. Polly could not have picked a more op-portune time to die, because the cornerstone of the new structure provided a vault for the bird. Consensus among Iowa Park folk is that he could not have had a more appropriate burial site.
