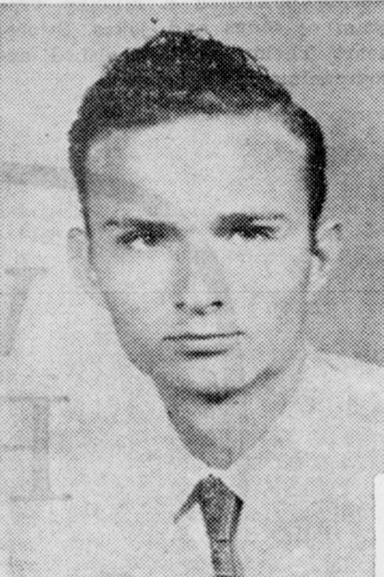

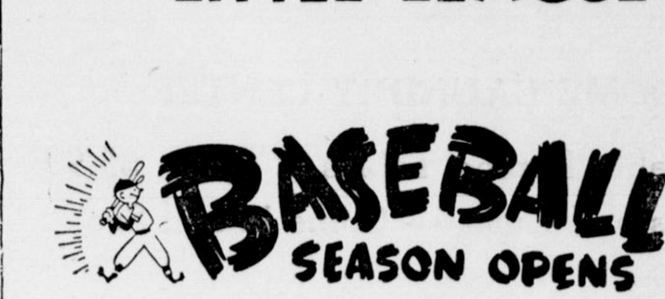
Service Held for Tom Rogers, 82

Hawks to Austin

Hawk thincleds went to Abilene last Saturday to compete in the McMurry college invitational meet for all teams that had qualified for the state meet. There were 22 teams represented, and the Hawks won first place with 60 points. The Hawks won the 440 relay in 43.4 seconds, fastest time turned in by a Class AA team this year. Larry Brooks, Jim Gard, Bobby Gilbreath and David Parkey ran the 440 relay. In the mile relay the Hawk team of Jackie Brooks, Gard, Parkey and Gilbreath won in a time of 3:26.3. In individual events, Gilbreath won the broad jump with 21 ft. 7 1/2 in. and the 180 low hurdles in 20.1 seconds. Thursday morning the team left for Austin to compete in the state meet Friday night. Last year the Hawks won the state championship competing in Class A. This year they are in Class AA and will be one of the teams favored to win the championship. Otha Woods is also qualified to compete at Austin.

Saturday morning at 11:00 the parade will officially open the Iowa Park Little League season. The parade will feature the IP Hawk band in full uniform and the Junior Sheriff's Posse headed by Fats Weakley. 150 Little Leaguers in full uniform will march, and League dignitaries Arch Hughes, Jimmie Stewart, Doyle Eckelbarger and Earle L. More Blood Needed

My Dear Mr. and Mrs. Public: This is to let you know Iowa Park Jaycees have replaced 145 pints of bloods for citizens of Iowa Park and surrounding area since the Blood Program was started in early 1959. This blood was used for those who were unable to replace it for some reason or another. Jaycees have also been sponsoring transfusions of gamma globulin to a small boy here who is suffering from a blood disease. Without these transfusions at least twice monthly, this young fellow could not expect to live long. Only means the Jaycees have of obtaining and providing blood, Mr. and Mrs. Public, is through generous donations of folk like you. Now we are "in the red," so to speak, as far as our replacement program is concerned. The Blood Bank in Wichita Falls has furnished our citizens, with approval of Iowa Park Blood Chairman Jim Cunningham, about 20 pints more than has been replaced. We are asking you to ask yourself—would the few minutes it will take for you to give a pint of blood, be worth the life you may save? Some day you may be the unfortunate person who needs blood, so why not do what you can now—while you can. Anyone between the ages of 18 and 59 years who can pass the physical checkup may give blood. Written permission of a parent is required for unmarried persons under 21. Jaycees point out that you may eat normally up to four hours before donation time, and that black coffee, toast without butter, or carbonated beverages are accepted after that time. If you donate at the Blood Bank in Wichita Falls, please assign the blood to Iowa Park Jaycees Blood Program, so it can be used by our citizens. The Bloodmobile will visit Our Town on May 17 from 12:00 till 6:00 p.m. and will be located at the new Youth Center. Very sincerely yours A Jaycee Gallon Club member
