J. O. Musick, general manager of the Texas Safety association makes this comparison:

John Jacob Astor donned formal evening clothes . . . the 8-piece band swung into the strains of "Autumn" . . . stars shown down on a quiet ocean. Then the giant unsinkable liner, lights suddenly extinguished, sank beneath the water. Rich and famous Mr. Astor, foreign born and little-known Mauritz Adahl, loving elderly Mr. and Mrs. Isidor Straus (she refused rescue to stay with her husband) . . . children, parents and newlyweds—a total of 1,517 persons—went down with her.

The world rocked with hearings, accusations and universal grief. Maritime laws were changed. Famous men committed suicide. Widows, widowers and orphans filled newspapers with poignant pictures and stories of their loss. The Titanic disaster was one of three of the greatest "natural" disasters ever experienced by US citizens.

Yet a greater, ever-recurring and ever-growing disaster strikes this country every year. It goes without notice — no national gnashing of teeth—no headlines—no remedial laws. Each summer month, June-July-August, for the past five years we have killed more than twice as many people as died on the Titanic.

They die through man-made mistakes and carelessness on our streets and highways . . . crushed beneath wheels of trucks, trapped in flaming cars . . . mangled by suddenly accordion-pleated metal.

Traffic accidents in the US in June, July and August of 1958 took the identical number of lives attributed to three of our most noted disasters . . . the Titanic, the Galveston tidal wave, and the Johnstown flood. 9,726 men, women and children lost their lives in traffic accidents in those months. And 9,726 men, women and children perished in those three "natural" disasters.

Camp Fire

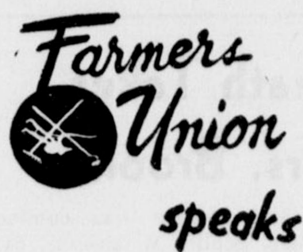

The Department of Agriculture has called upon farmers and other local leaders to help make the Rural Areas Development program a success. First loans under the program are planned for sometime this month. Secretary Orville Freeman said the program will receive top priority of all programs of the Department and that all resources of the Department are being mobilized to assist local communities in carrying forward programs and projects of economic development. Initiative for formulating and operating successful programs of rural area development must come from the locality, and the drive to keep up the program must be the responsibility of local people, Freeman says. Major emphasis is being placed on measures to cure chronic low-income problems of rural areas. Many farm families are underemployed because they live on inadequate units or because their area lacks educational and other employment opportunities. Eligible rural areas will be selected on the basis of the highest in numbers and percentages of low-income families, and of substantial and persistent unemployment or underemployment. The legislation provides additional authority and a new "kit of tools" to assist local communities in carrying forward programs and projects of resource development. State Extension Services are responsible for seeing that Rural Areas Development committees are set up. State and local Extension Service representatives will assist local groups in forming district or area or county committees. Church leaders are expected to play a vital part in the program activities and many will be serving on state and local development committees, Freeman says.

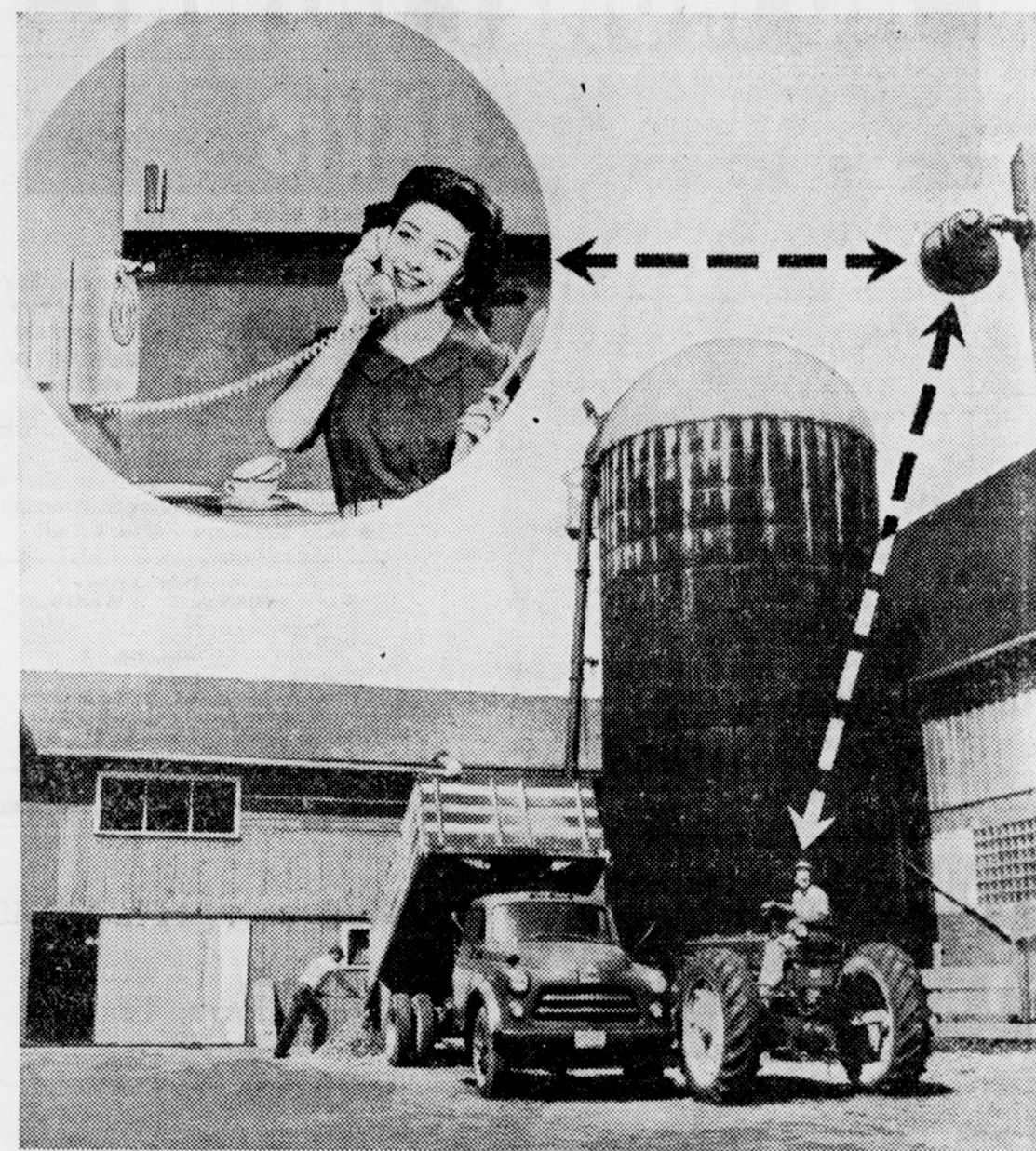

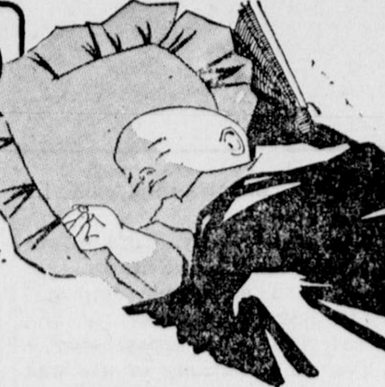

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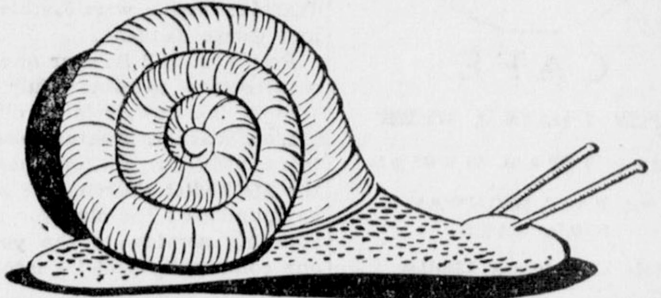
