Phones are equipped with loudspeaker - microphone units so the user can talk on the intercom without removing the receiver

This feature enables the farmer. for example, to continue working in the barn while carrying on an inter-com conversation with his

Regular phone calls can be held on the line while the inter-com is used to talk with someone at another location on the farm.

The outdoor loudspeaker-micro phone feature makes it possible to talk with persons working outdoors in the farm yard. For example, the farmer's wife can talk to him while he is working outdoors, and he can reply even if he is a considerable distance from


