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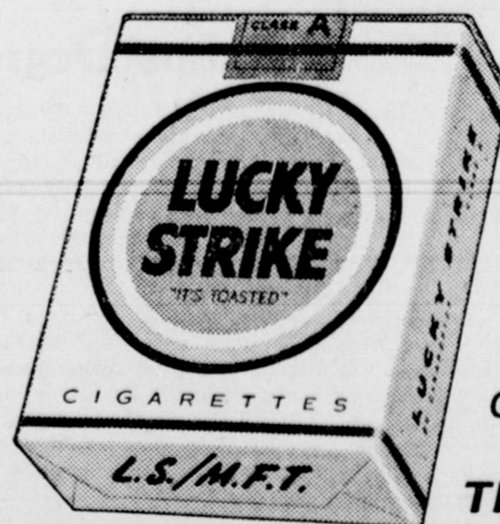
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Home Safety Is Important

The amateur gardener is exposed to many hazards and must exercise constant care when using yard tools and equipment, Lone Star Gas company manager Carl Walsh cautioned this week.

Lone Star and Iowa Park Herald are co-sponsors of the 1961 Home Safety program here.

Almost 12 per cent of all home accident fatalities occur in the yard, according to a survey reported by the Kansas Board of Health and others. Of the total deaths, 5.6 per cent were caused by falls; 1.6 per cent by exposure to fire; 1.3 per cent by suffocation; and 3.1 per cent by miscellaneous causes.

Principal dangers are careless handling of rakes, hoes and power lawnmowers. Turn hoes, rakes, etc. downward when momentarily laid aside, and store properly when not in use. Observe these safety rules when operating the mower:

1. Avoid using an electric mower when the ground is wet. You may

cause a short circuit or slip on the damp grass and fall against the blades.

2. Before using, clear lawn of stones, wires and other articles the mower can catch and throw into the air.

3. Keep children and pets at a safe distance when you are using the mower.

4. Be sure of your footing and balance when operating a mower on an incline. Downhill mowing is especially dangerous.

5. To push the mower over obstructions, tip it by manipulating the handle rather than by reaching under the mower.

6. Stop the engine before removing objects from reel or rotary blades.

7. Disconnect plug wires when you are working on the underside of the mower.

8. Store fuel in a closed metal container and keep it out of reach of small children.

9. Shut off mower before leaving it unattended.

10. Keep flame away from the mower while refueling.

Most of the annual four million or more death and injuries caused by home accidents can be prevented if we observe four rules:

1. Learn to recognize and understand the hazards in the home.

2. Develop a sense of responsibility toward safeguarding ourselves and others against the possibility of home accidents.

3. Acquire skills required to perform household tasks safely.

4. Acquire safe orderly habits in all activities in the home.

Let us ensure our home safety by observing these four simple rules.

Sibley has been vocational agriculture teacher here the past eight years. He and his wife Florence have two children: Stephen, 9; and Sylvia, 8.

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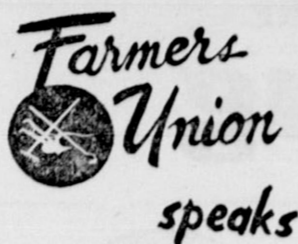

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Secretary of Agriculture Orville Freeman has declared that all the resources of his department have been made available to Rural Areas Development to end poverty and give rural areas of the nation the same economic opportunities now enjoyed in cities.

Farm Income. Basis for the success of any program of rural development is a fair and stable farm income. All programs proposed by the Administration are aimed at improving and stabilizing farm prices. Prices have already improved considerably and the future looks hopeful. Success of current programs and participation of farmers will go a long way toward determining permanent programs.

More Bargaining Power. Freeman is working in several ways to strengthen farm bargaining power. Congress has instructed him to work with farmer advisory groups to develop long-range programs. He has reactivated the ASC committees, liberalizing credit and administering all programs for the benefit of farmers.

Conservation. Water and land conservation are important in the program. Sufficient water and power, as well as flood prevention, are vital in the general industry and prosperity of the rural neighborhood.

Co-operative Services. Strong and fully protected co-operatives are needed to maintain farm income and increase marketing efficiency. Many services of the Department of Agriculture are available to Co-ops. Farmers Union and other co-operative groups are working to establish once and for all the rights and privileges of Co-operatives.
