TELEPHONE SERVICE NEAR NORMAL AFTER HURRICANE CARLA STRIKES

Hurricane Carla has come and gone, and I know we were all glad to see her go. Even though we were not directly affected here in students from each grade with the the surface through seeding time Iowa Park, I'd like to tell you a little of what she did to the tele-phone service on the Gulf Coast and what Southwestern Bell did president with the latter serving Farmers are making plans for about it. Telephone people were ready for the emergency. Before the winds and rains had subsided, Southwestern Bell had men and equipment

rolling to the disaster area to restored crippled telephone service. An army of 5,400 telephone men from many cities and states was hastily assembled in the Galveston-Corpus Christi-Victoria area. More than 900 came from points in North Texas, Oklahoma, Arkansas, Kansas, and Missouri.

EQUIPMENT FLOWN IN

At the same time, the company flew emergency generating equip- in Our Town. ment for electric power into the storm area from many places in our five-state territory. From other cities in North Texas, special mobile radio trucks converged on the stricken area to help bridge the gap left by the silenced telephones, relay emergency messages, and maintain contact with the "outside world."

These joined forces with the men, trucks, and other emergency equipment which Southwestern Bell had sent into the area as a precautionary measure when hurricane warnings were first issued.

OPERATORS FROM WEST TEXAS






