

In Romans 12:3 the Bible says, "God hath dealt to every man the measure of faith." God deals to every individual a measure a measure of faith. Everyone comes into this world with it. Jesus said to Thomas, who had doubted his Saviour's resurrection from the dead:

"Thomas, see the evidence. Look upon me and see my nail-pierced hands. Be not faithless, but believing. Then Thomas saw, and made his confession of faith."

Jesus made a difference between the word faith and the act of believing. He meant this: 'You have the capacity for faith, the power to believe, but I want you to start believing."

You may be seeking divine healing from God; you already have the faith (God has given each of us a measure of faith), but are you using the faith you have? Has your faith become a living, dynamic thing? Do you feel your faith? Are you aroused to action by it? Does it push outward striking a blow for outward, striking a blow for deliverance? Does your faith bring you to a point of decision? Do you act upon your faith?

When faith is alive in you, you feel it. It is something that causes you to believe in a stronger, more positive manner.

You must learn how to use your faith to get what you want from God.

Faith is a very vital part of the Bible's teaching. Your faith can become a living force. When it does, it becomes a weapon, an instrument of deliverance, a mighty power that brings you to God and to what He has promised you.

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
