RESOLUTION to amend Section the State of Texas, as amended in 1903, so as to authorize the grant of aid in the establishment able. and maintenance of a home for the disabled and dependent wives and widows of Confederate soldiers ed the Confederacy, and making an appropriation.

SECTION 1. Be it Resolved by the Legislature of the State of Texas: That Section 51 of Article 3 of the or have printed on their ballots, the Constitution of the State of Texas, words .. For the amendment to Secas amended in 1903, be so amended as to hereafter read as follows:

Article 3. Section 51. The Legislature shall have no power to make any grant or authorize the making of any grant of public money to any individual, associations or individuals municipal or other corporations whatsoever; provided, however, the Legislature may grant aid to indigent and disabled Confederate soldiers and sailers who came to Texas prior to January 1, 1880, and who are either over sixty years of age or whose disability is the proximate resuft of actual service in the Confederate army for a period of at least three months, their widows in indigent circumstances who have never remarried and who have been bona fide residents of the State of Texas since March 1, 1880, and who were married to such soldiers anterior to. March 1, 1880; provided said aid shall not exceed eight dollars per month, and provided further, 23-4 that no appropriations shall ever be made for the purpose hereinbefore specified in excess of five hundred thousand dollars for any one year. And also grant aid to the establishment and maintenance of a home for said soldiers and sailors, their wives and widows and women who aided in the Confederacy, under such regulations and limitations as may be provided by law; provided the grant to aid said home shall not exceed one Mundred and fifty thousand dollars for any one year, and no inmate of said house shall be entitled to any other aid from the State; the Legis. lature may provide for husband and wife to remain together in the home; and provided further, that the provisions of this section shall not be construed to prevent the grant of aid in case of public calamity.

SEC. 2. The Governor of the State is hereby directed to issue the necessary proclamation for the submission of this amendment to the qualified voters of the State of Texas on the first Tuesday in August, 1907.

The sum of \$5000, or so much thereof as may be necessary, is hereby arropriated to pay the expenses of carrying out the provisions of this resolution.
