Pevler, the unknown heirs, spouses, assigns, devisees and legal representatives of the unknown owner or owners of the herein-after described land, all other persons owning or having or claiming any legal or equitable interest or lien upon said land, Defendants, Greeting:

You are hereby commanded to appear before the Honorable 78th District Court of Wichita County, at the Courthouse thereof, in Wichita Falls, Texas, by filing a written answer at or before 10 o'clock A.M. of the first Monday next after the expiration of forty-two days from the date of the issuance of this citation, same being the 15th day of January A.D. 1962, to Plaintiff's 1st Amended Petition filed in said court, on the 1st day of December A.D. 1961, in this cause, numbered 69,040-B on the docket of said court and styled Leta Weseman, joined herein by her husband, Hubert Weseman, and V. Plaintiffs say that the Defendants should be divested of title and title entered in Plaintiffs' names by Judgment of this Court under the ten year statute of limitation because the persons holding the apparent record title to the land have not exercised dominion over said land any time during such period of ten years next preceding the filing of this suit, nor have they done so one or more years during such period; and that the Plaintiffs have openly exercised dominion over said land for said ten year period, wherefore the Plaintiffs say that titles to such land have passed to them.

Wherefore, Plaintiff prays that the Defendants be cited to answer this petition, and that Plaintiffs have judgment for the title and possession of the above described premises, and for such other and further relief as they may be entitled to either in law or in equity.

If this citation is not served within ninety days after the date of issuance, it shall be returned unserved.

The Officer executing this process shall promptly execute the same according to law and make due return as the law directs.

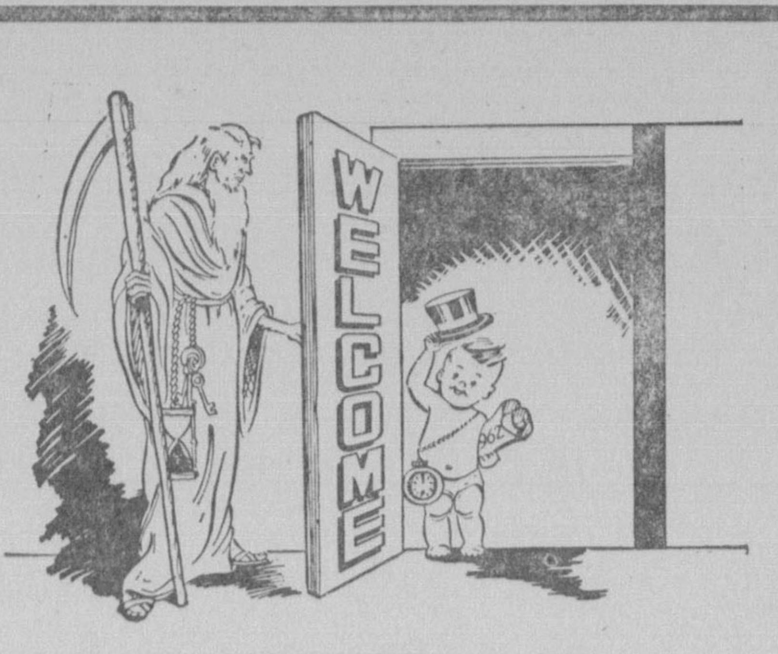

### WHAT ARE YOUR NEEDS?

To become a widow suddenly is a dismaying experience, especially when there are young children to provide for. Few conditions of life are as desperate.

One woman, suddenly faced with this disheartening situation, was encouraged when she read Isaiah 54:5, "For thy Maker is thine husband; the Lord of hosts is his name."

She gathered her children around her and cried, "O Father, You said YOU would be a father to the fatherless, and You said You would be a husband and a judge of the widows. Now, Lord, a father brings in food and provides the other necessities of life for his wife and for his children. I am depending solely on You to keep Your Word. You said You would supply all our needs according to Your riches in glory by Christ Jesus."

When she prayed this prayer, her funds were exhausted. At the moment the food supply was getting very low, so low that there were only some stewed tomatoes remaining. It was a cold February night. She rose from her knees and thanked God for His promise to provide and began to prepare her children for bed.

A widow with four small children, one only a few months old, without a means of earning a livelihood, facing the lonely prospect of struggle, suddenly abandoned her fear and turned to God. It was wonderfully comforting for her to know that God had promised to be a father to

the fatherless, a husband to the widow.

Shortly thereafter, she heard a knock on her door. A woman, a complete stranger, was there. She said, "I have something for you. Will you accept it?"

Dazedly she agreed. The woman went out to her car and, with another woman, began to carry things into the house—smoked and fresh meats, all kinds of canned foods, flour, eggs, milk, and even cake and candy.

It was like a dream. The food had been sent from a church about 30 miles away. The widow knew that the provision had come from God, and she remembered that God had said, "Before they call, I will answer; and while they are yet speaking, I will hear" (Isaiah 65:24).

The widow's heart was filled to overflowing with gratitude and joy, for this incident marked only the beginning of God's providence for her and for her children.

She had learned the sweetest lesson of all life—to trust the Lord. She had learned that it was not necessary to ask God more than once for a need, for God knows the need even before the asking. She learned also that God meets more than bare need. He provides abundantly, superabundantly.

If you have any problem that is more than you can manage alone, place your complete trust in God, for "He careth for you." He will save your soul, heal your body and provide for your every need.

## Cemetery Group Meets Jan. 7
