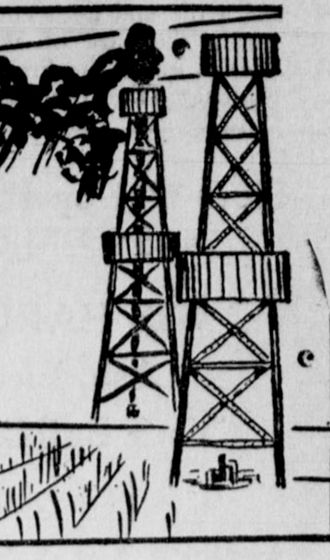

Sen. Moffett Seeking Re-election

George Moffett of Chillicothe released Wednesday his formal announcement for re-election to the State Senate from the 23rd District composed of Archer, Baylor, Cottle, Dickens, Foard, Hardeman, King, Knox, Throckmorton, Wichita, Wilbarger and Young counties.

Cotton points out that he was sole author of Senate Bill 6 of the 56th Legislature which made Midwestern university a state school.

"Education is the foundation for progress, and in the years to come Senate Bill 6 probably will mean more to this entire area than any bill ever passed by the Texas Legislature," said the Senator.

As a leader in agricultural legislation Moffett has introduced and passed a dozen bills helpful to farmers and livestock producers, and will bring better food products to consumers. He vigorously sponsors scientific research to discover new uses for cotton. He states, "The best long range solution for the cotton surplus problem is to find more ways to consume it. Texas is making more progress in this field than any other state."

Senator Moffett was joint author of the bill at the last session to place the construction and maintenance of both the state's main highway and farm road systems on a sounder financial basis.

His statement mentions that he has never sponsored a tax bill, and has supported revenue measures only when there was a real need for more funds to support the state's hospitals, highways, public schools, colleges, old age assistance and other justifiable purposes. He favors amending the new sales tax law for smoother and more convenient operation.

Moffett emphasizes that Texas has better roads with a 5c state gasoline tax than any neighboring state, even though they have a 6c, 6.5c or 7c state tax on gasoline.



He calls attention to the fact that Texas has no state income tax while all adjoining states do have. He is opposed to such a tax.

He cites reliable figures which show that the total taxes collected per person, per year in Texas, are lower than in any neighboring state. The figures are: Louisiana \$140, New Mexico \$130, Oklahoma \$122, Arkansas \$92 and Texas \$84, which is the lowest average tax collected per person per year in any of the above states.

He favors correcting the auto insurance merit plan.

He is opposed to race track gambling.

Senator Moffett is a life long resident of this senatorial district and a life long Democrat. In his legislative races he has always received over 85 per cent of the votes in his home county. He further states:

"I deeply appreciate the favorable consideration of the voters in previous elections. I sincerely desire to serve you again and respectfully solicit your vote in the Democratic Primary on May 5."

The jokes do not concern the Negro and his problems—they are slanted toward some of the folk expected to be in the audience.

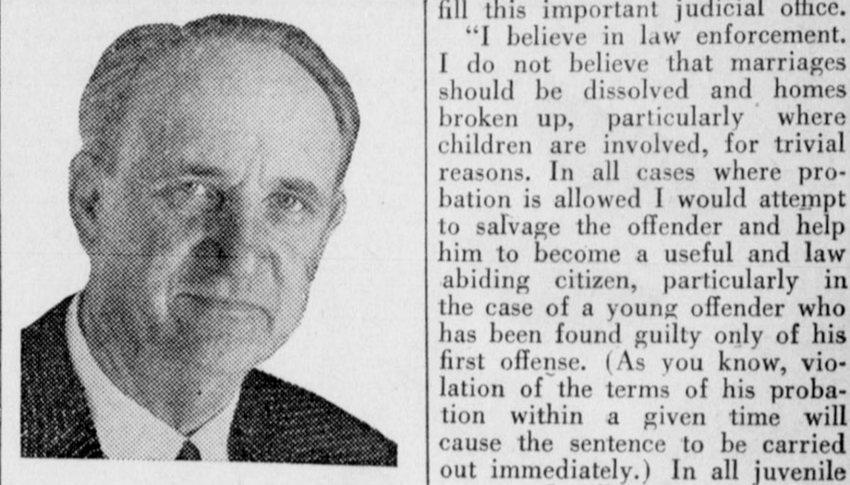

Last month a group of about 50 student from Washington high school, Wichita Falls, presented a musical program at the Christian church here. They were well received and appreciated by a large gathering.

Judge Friberg Asks Elective Term



Judge Walter Friberg, a native of Wichita county and practicing attorney in the county for 32 years, authorizes the Herald to announce his candidacy for judge of the 39th District Court, a post to which he was appointed last Dec. 16 to succeed Graham B. Purcell who was elected to Congress.

Judge Friberg is a grandson of John Friberg, pioneer settler who came to the county in 1833 and for whom the Friberg community was named. The community has since joined with the Cooper community and is presently known as Friberg-Cooper.

In his formal statement Judge said:

"I am in this race because I am the present Judge of this Court, by appointment, and because of the job at stake—a lawyer's job of the highest importance. We have three district judges in Wichita county and each represents the highest trial court under our Texas procedure.

"Our district courts try both civil and criminal cases. The trial of criminal cases involves felonies which are cases where a defendant may be sent to the penitentiary as a punishment for his crime. The civil jurisdiction of the court involves appeals from the justice courts in many probate, guardianship and administrative matters; likewise, appeals from the justice courts in civil cases are heard by the district courts. The district court also hears all civil cases where the amount in controversy exceeds \$200 and all suits involving title to land.

"Family litigation heard by the district courts includes divorce suits, child custody cases, juvenile matters, dependent and neglected children, all adoption proceedings. In addition thereto each judge is a member of the Juvenile Board of the county.

"There are, of course, many other types of litigation involved, but the above are the most often tried, and all are important.

"After my appointment to the bench, I was chosen by the other district court judges to act as the Juvenile Court of this county.

"Obviously all of these cases involve matters of great importance to the parties. In criminal matters, good law enforcement is at stake as well as the life and liberty of the person charged with an offense. In other matters the money or property rights of an individual in substantial amounts is at issue. Again, in a divorce action there is the question of whether a divorce should be refused or granted, and if granted, what disposition should be made of the property rights of the parties and what will be for the best interest of the minor children after the divorce is granted.

"Most of the juveniles in our community are dependable young folk of good moral character, well behaved, and either attending a school or working, and they are a credit to our American way of life. A few are just the opposite and these make it necessary to provide a juvenile court. Still other children are dependent and neglected, and through no fault of their own, become a source of court procedures.

"In all of these matters the law grants the Court a great deal of latitude and judicial discretion. A wide experience and time proved ability are necessities for the lawyer who would adequately fill this important judicial office.

"I believe in law enforcement. I do not believe that marriages should be dissolved and homes broken up, particularly where children are involved, for trivial reasons. In all cases where probation is allowed I would attempt to salvage the offender and help him to become a useful and law abiding citizen, particularly in the case of a young offender who has been found guilty only of his first offense. (As you know, violation of the terms of his probation within a given time will cause the sentence to be carried out immediately.) In all juvenile matters, I will use my best judgment in applying the law as it now exists, or may hereinafter be enacted, toward the end that not only will our society be protected, but that the youthful offender may be restored to a way of life that will be useful to his community and a credit to him.

"In each case that I hear I will devote my energies toward granting each party who comes into my court a fair and impartial trial under the law and facts.

"You will have opportunity, prior to the Democratic Primary on May 5 to judge for yourself my conduct on this bench. Diligent service will at all times precede any personal or political consideration of my own. If elected, I will be then, what I am now, an impartial judge, trying to fulfill the highest ethics of the judiciary and to be of service to the people of our county.

"It will be impossible for me to take care of the duties of my office and at the same time see as many of the people of this county as I would like to. I humbly ask you to give me your fair consideration for this nomination, and I seek your vote and influence in my behalf. I am grateful to the Honorable Price Daniel, Governor of Texas, for my appointment to this office. I will ever be grateful to you, the people, for election to this office."

Walter Friberg is a native of Wichita county. His father Emil Victor Friberg was an early day Wichita county farmer and rancher who died in 1957. His mother lives in the Judge's home now at 3901 Southmoor, Wichita Falls.

Friberg was graduated from WFSH and continued his academic training at TCU and the University of Texas law school and Baylor university school of law, from which he received the bachelor of law degree in 1929. He then began his practice in Wichita Falls.

The Judge's 32 years of legal practice has included experience as assistant county attorney, special county judge and Wichita Falls city attorney. He has served as both plaintiff and defense attorney during the years as well as gaining much experience in administrative law, all of which add to his qualifications to continue to serve as District Judge for Wichita county.

Friberg is married to the former Anne Edwards, daughter of the late Dr. C. V. Edwards, a distinguished Baptist minister. They have two children: Annette, a senior at Baylor university; and Emil E., a graduate mechanical engineer who resides in Wichita Falls and is associated with the Texas Electric Service company.

Judge Friberg and family are members of the First Baptist church. They take an active part in church, civic and community activities. Judge Friberg is a long time member of the Masonic fraternity and Maskat Temple. For a number of years he has worked with the Shrine committee which sponsors the Order of Demolay for boys. He has been chairman of that committee for several recent years.

Mr. and Mrs. J. D. Bishop and daughters—Debbie 5, Jane 2 and Cathy 7—moved this past week to 506 E. Cash from Wichita Falls. He is employed with Barbour Trucking company. The family attend a Baptist church in Wichita Falls.

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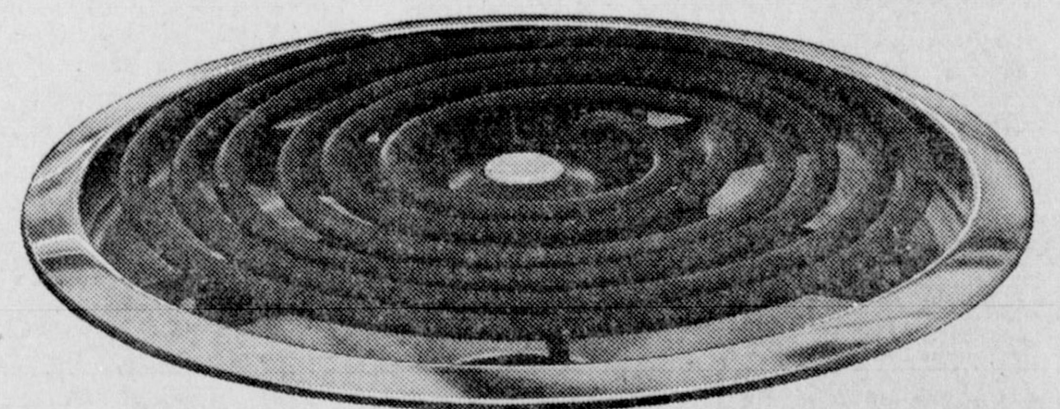

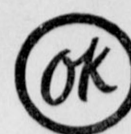
