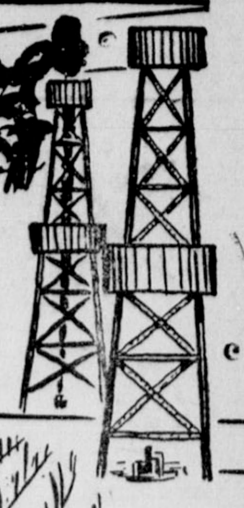

Miss Lomax attends the Church of Christ.

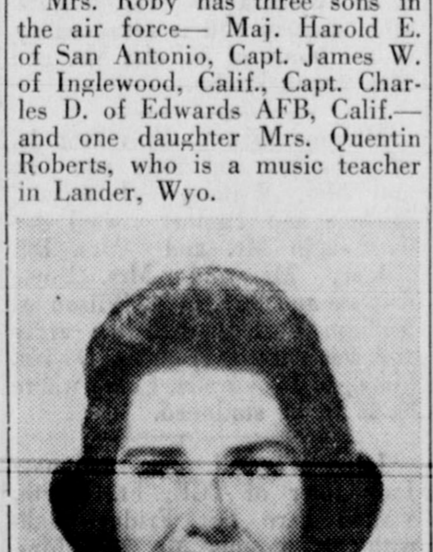


Mrs. Patsy Todd resides at 811 Vogel with her husband Delbert. She teaches at Kidwell school.

The state Loaning Library is sending about 400 books between now and April 15.

Kidwell school students and faculty have started a collection for children's books for the library. The children are bringing nickels and dimes each day.

Iowa Park held its City election Tuesday with 668 citizens casting votes for mayor, city secretary and three aldermen.

In the mayor's race Charlie L. Metz was re-elected with 334 votes. Morris V. Jacks ran a close second with 330.

Miss Dossia S. Smith was unopposed for re-election as City secretary, and received 655 votes.

Top three in the aldermen's race were Clark Holloway, 389; Sam D. Hunter, 376; and Bill Spruiell, 324.

Voting for the four runners-up was: Marlin Terrell, 302; W. T. Crawford, 183; Lowell Short, 234; Clint McBay, 117.

John C. Murphree, city attorney, will administer the oath of office to the City officials next Monday night.

Dr. Theodore Gill, Perkins Lecturer To Preach Here Sunday Morning

The Perkins lecturer in Wichita Falls this year will preach at the morning service of worship at the Iowa Park Presbyterian church on April 8. Dr. Theodore A. Gill, president of San Francisco Theological Seminary in San Anselmo, Calif., will fill the pulpit at 9:00 on that day.

The lecture series begins later that morning at First Methodist church of Wichita Falls.

Dr. Gill is one of the leading churchmen of our day and is widely respected as a minister, theologian, author and lecturer. This is a rare opportunity for the Christians of this community.

Dr. Gill's sermon topic at 9:00 will be "Our Nuisance Value." He will also speak to a Men of the Church breakfast at the Iowa Prk church at 7:00 the morning of April 8. Then his topic will be "The Pulpit in the Pews."

All the community is invited to the 9:00 a.m. service. Child care is provided in the church sanctuary and people are urged to arrive early so not to be disappointed. The 9:00 service will be the only one of the morning at the local church, with the church school beginning at 10:00.

Iowa Park post office is to begin Thursday, April 5, additional city mail carrier service for portions of the south side and north side for Carrier No. 2, Harry Moore.

Postmaster T. E. Gilbreath has announced there are two "musts" the postal department requires before mail can be delivered to the house:

1. You must have a suitable mailbox.
2. Your house must have the street number on it.

The postal department has sent letters to all new patrons to this effect with other information. Gilbreath asked that these two things be done before filling out the questionnaire and returning it to the post office.
