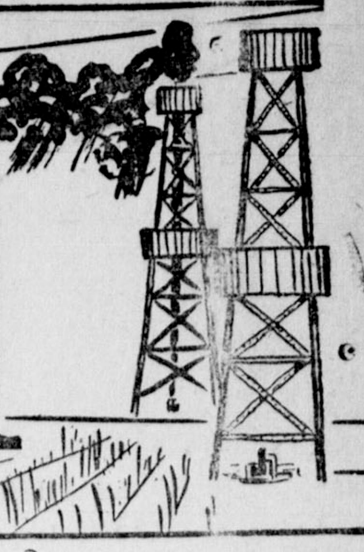

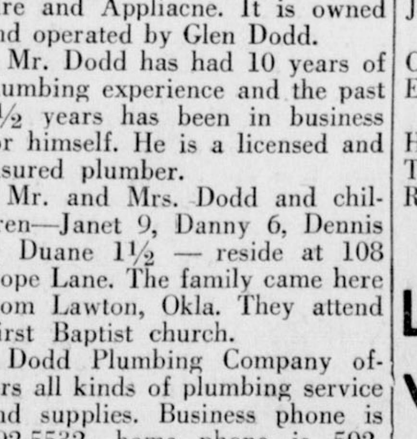

## Butts Seeks Co. Judge Post

Charles Butts, a native of Wichita County and practicing lawyer in Wichita Falls, has authorized the Herald to publish the following concerning his candidacy for the office of County Judge, subject to the Democratic Primary, May 5.

Running on the basis of his experience in the general practice of law since he was licensed May 10, 1949, and his background of training in government and economics, Butts cites his service as Special County Judge on numerous occasions in both Wichita Falls and Odessa, where he practiced law for a time in the early 1950's. Additionally, in January of this year Butts was chosen by the lawyers to serve in three cases as Special Judge of the 39th District Court following the resignation of the Honorable Graham B. Purcell, Jr., to become Congressman for this district.

Popular among his fellow lawyers, Butts has served as Secretary of both the Wichita County and Ector County Bar Associations, is a past president of the Blackstone Bar and has served as a Director of the Junior Bar of Texas, as well as on the State Bar Committee for legal assistance to members of the armed forces. Maintaining a vital, active interest in helping to preserve our "American Way of Life," Butts was 1961 Chairman for "Law Day—USA" and currently is 1962 Co-Chairman.

A former Eagle Scout, Butts, 41, has maintained a life-long interest in Scouting, Hi-Y and other Youth activities. He is Superintendent of the Senior High Sunday School Department of the First Presbyterian Church, member of the Y's Men's Club, Director on the Board of the Wichita County Mental Health Association and membership chairman of the Heart Association for 1962.

A veteran of World War II, Butts served 26 months overseas as First Sergeant of a "Flying Fortress" squadron with the 8th Air Force in England, and was decorated with the Bronze Star medal for his outstanding administrative achievements. Friend of the serviceman and veteran, he maintains an interest in veterans' affairs and has served as First Vice-Commander of his American Legion Post.

Son of Mr. and Mrs. John E. Butts, well known Wichitans since 1911, Butts attended Wichita Falls public schools, and was a member of the National Honor Society upon graduation from high school in 1938. He attended Texas Tech and Midwestern University and received a bachelor's degree in government with a minor in economics from the University of Texas in 1942. After serving three years in the Air Force, he entered Law School at the University, receiving his law degree in 1949. While in Law School he served on the Law Honor Council.

Butts is grandson of Mr. and Mrs. John T. Butts and Mr. and Mrs. George H. Whorton, late well known pioneer residents of Wichita Falls. He also is nephew of Reverend and Mrs. Patrick Henry, formerly of Wichita Falls, and of Mr. and Mrs. D. W. Whorton. Mr. Whorton recently retired as a machinist with Wilson Mfg. Co.

Father of three children himself, Butts has a "close to home" interest in our Young People, and pledges to devote a great amount of time and energy in the event of his election as County Judge to the many matters that concern our youth. Butts believes that study should be made regarding the establishment of a Vocational School in Wichita County, and expressed in the "Voters Guide" of the League of Women Voters his willingness to head such a study in the event of his election. He also favors the establishment of a Youth Center in all of the cities and towns in Wichita County as one step toward solving the so-called problem of "juvenile delinquency." However, Butts is of the firm conviction that the matter of "adult delinquency" deserves perhaps even closer study, for, "Our children are in great need of good and better examples by which to live."



Butts' children are Charles Jr., 16, a sophomore at Wichita Falls Senior High, who recently was cited by the Attorney General of Texas for his outstanding presentation before the Hi-Y Youth in Government Legislature in Austin. Also, young Charles has been active in Amateur Guild at the High School and has become well known himself over the county while campaigning for "His Dad" for County Judge. Robert, age 12, and Diana, age 7, while yet too young to distinguish themselves with their achievements, are excellent students and are pulling for "Dad's election on May 5th."

Concerning his candidacy, Butts says, "These past several months it has been my great pleasure to shake hands with old schoolmates, friends young and old, all over Wichita County. My campaign funds have been limited, therefore, I have tried to meet everyone I possibly could. Unfortunately, however, it will be impossible to shake everyone's hand, so, if you whom I have met will "shake your friends' and neighbors' hands in my behalf" between now and May 5, I shall ever be grateful, and to you whom I have not been able to meet I most humbly "ask to serve as your County Judge."

In the event of my election I shall consider the office as one of solemn public trust, and with God's help and guidance I shall not let you down.

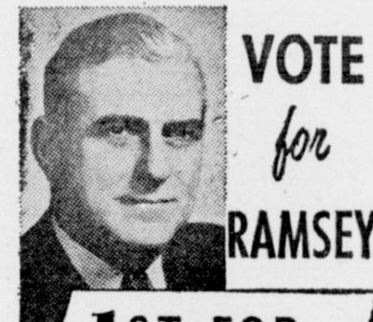

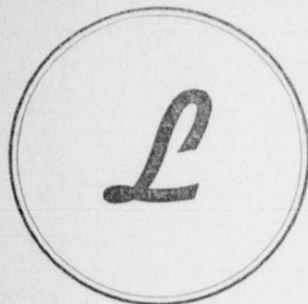

## Christ and a Faith for Our Day

by Boyd Schlenker



Many of us find ourselves in the same difficulty at the spiritual level as did the business firm at the financial level when it called in an efficiency expert to diagnose its problem. The final verdict was "The trouble with you is, your margin of operation is too thin." We are called on by Christ to see that the real coming into manhood and womanhood, the real heroic life, the life which is truly exciting and full of meaning and purpose, is lived by those people who are willing to be risky, to push themselves to their limits—and beyond.

Nowadays, many people are satisfied with being pulled along with the current stream of things; the margins seem to be pretty well fixed. Some people don't want to push anything too far; they are like the pre-Columbus explorers who dreaded to venture out into the sea, for fear that they might go too far and fall off the edge of this flat earth! They were not quite certain what was out there and they didn't want to push themselves to find out.

This attitude can move right

into our homes where it is possible to lose the fine art of communication. It is quite possible, someone has suggested, that man is becoming a vegetable, planted in his earth-brown chair in front of the TV. But he is not the only potato in the patch; his wife is rooted by his side, and their little spuds are sprouting right next to them;

Yet, seriously, we are faced with a terribly important problem. If we could but snip the cord to the TV set and let some amateur entertainers take the stage—father, mother and the children. Let us learn once again how to entertain ourselves as a family. The margins of our lives can be set so narrowly anyway; do not let them close in tighter.

The gospel of Jesus Christ dares us to live life to its fullest, to refuse to make our margin of operation too thin. It is an act of faith—to risk great things for God. One of the great modern missionaries, William Carey, a Baptist, spoke this way: "Expect great things from God; attempt great things for God." But at some points the Church has become such a cautious and ingrown that any similarity between it and the vitality which has al-

ways characterized the Christian Church is purely coincidental!

Our margin of operation can be too thin in other ways also. It can happen to the businessman who finds it so easy to run his business just this side of the margin of complete honesty. It can happen to the student who will simply not take full advantage of the great opportunity of studying when it is so easy just to get by; and then in later years is deeply sorry for mulling his only real chance for learning. It can happen to the housewife who is satisfied with having just an average home and an average family life; who is so interested in recipes that she never has quite enough time to sit down to talk with her children and to share common experiences with them.

The temptation not to go beyond the margins of life can and does come to every person. The temptation was with Christ. He felt it deeply in the wilderness; it continued with him throughout his earthly ministry; the temptation to do just a little less than the best, to remain within the safe walls of conformity, to keep from venturing out into the dark and uncharted.

The Greek author Nikos Kazantzakis wrote a startling book entitled "The Last Temptation of Christ." Much of the book is quite imaginary, yet it still points to the real truth of Christ's temptation to limit himself, to avoid spending himself completely. The last temptation of our Lord, according to the author, is to come down from the Cross, to save himself, and to lead a normal life.

It is wonderful, we feel, for Jesus to have lived and taught and to have given deep inspiration to life; but that is as far as we would have him go. If he were to suffer upon a cross, if he were to die because of me and for me, then that would involve me in something I hadn't counted on. That would mean that he would be my master and I his slave, his servant. And that would be going beyond the margins that I had set for him in my life.

It is certain that we cannot control the length of our lives, but we can have much to do with their width and depth. God does not set us into life without provision: His gospel. His righteousness, His word. There is One who has gone before us in this human life, One who motions to us now to come ahead into the unknown, the daring, the faithful. A man must apply himself to full and vital living, that the margin of operation of his life may not be too thin.

## Ministers Oppose Gambling on Horse Races in Texas

We, the ministers of Iowa Park churches, would like to italicize our thinking regarding the propositions on the May primary ballots which call for the legalizing of pari-mutuel wagering on horse racing. We believe that the word of God is not static and has something vital to speak to us all on this matter.

We confess it may appear that too often we have waited to speak out against something; but this is not just a matter of "being agin." The Church of Jesus Christ is for the dignity and sensibility of man. We oppose gambling in any form because as a vice it has a history of making victims of individuals and encouraging a sinful waste and over-indulgence.

The Church is opposed to gambling in any form because it means that a person abdicates his God-given reason and abilities to invest his time and money in something that is pure chance.

It may be argued that "a little fun never hurt anyone." But every intelligent business and political leader is opposed to legalizing pari-mutuel wagering in Texas because he knows what it does to people. And this is our concern: what happens to people. The State Democratic Committee has come out in opposition to the propositions; all the leading candidates for governor have done the same.

Some people feel that the income for the state would justify its legalization. Two things may be observed here: First, the financial health of a community is diseased and not helped by the legalized betting. The Arlington Journal says: "Arlington has had first-hand experience in days past with horse racing. Back in the '30's our city was the scene of one of three big racing tracks in the state. While the racing season brought many people to the area, and lots of dollars were spent other than at the betting booths, (we) can recall dozens of families who suffered irreparable damage because food and rent dollars failed to 'win, place, or show' at the tracks. Businesses went bankrupt, and otherwise honest men embezzled funds and ended up taking their own lives because of debts incurred at the racks."

Men do not only affect themselves, but families and others about them are, in their innocence, forced to suffer also.

The other point is this: The crime rate always rises when gambling is legalized. Not only does this mean a great deal more expense from the public for law dire effects upon our communi-

enforcement, but it means the ties as a whole and our young people in particular.

U. S. Attorney General Robert Kennedy says this: "The \$2 bet helps finance the narcotics traffic, prostitution, bootlegging, labor racketeering, the bribery of police, the corruption of public officials and the degradation of entire communities. In the last analysis, people in every community must come to realize that the vicious activities of organized crime will be seriously cramped when the racketeers and hoodlums no longer can depend on the \$2 bettors to backroll their activities."

Surely we Texans are capable of more moral honesty than to legalize and tax anything wrong, or dangerous, or even anything with a prevalent history in that direction. Such a move is basically untenable and illogical in any court of humanity and decency and is a travesty on the intelligence, character, and sense of justice of the people of Texas.

We are not on a "Holy Crusade"; we simply want our citizens to avoid an "unholy mess"!

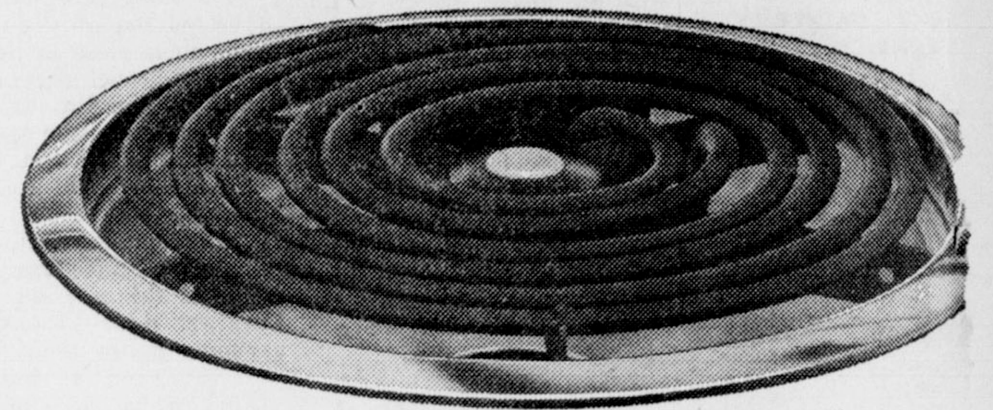

### VICTORY OVER DISCOURAGEMENT

There is an old allegory which tells how Satan called together a council of his servants to devise a method to make a good man sin. One evil spirit after another rose with a suggestion, yet Satan rejected each one.

Finally, one imp said, "I am sure I can make him sin." "And what will you do?" Satan asked. "I will discourage him," was the reply. "Ah," cried Satan, "that will surely do it."

Discouragement is a trick of the enemy, more subtle, more deadly and more common than all other hazards along the pathway of life. Discouragement comes not only over big failures but also over little mistakes. And sometimes Satan makes us discouraged when we haven't even failed at all. In many little ways, he tries to plant the seeds of discouragement and despair in our lives.

I once read about a man who walked all the way from California to New York City, a distance of about 3,000 miles. Upon his arrival in the big city, the newsmen asked him what was the hardest part of the trip. "Was it climbing over the Rocky Mountains? Was it walking through the hot desert or crossing swollen rivers? Was it avoiding heavy traffic in the large cities?"

When the man shook his head to all of these, he was asked just what was the hardest part of his trip. He replied, "It was the said in my shoes." A very little thing, but it discouraged him often. Sand in his shoes made him doubt that he could succeed.

The greatest weakness in my life is the tendency to become discouraged over trifles," a minister once said.

Many of God's greatest men have wrestled with discouragement and through God's power, they have won the victory over it.

After repeated failures, Moses found himself in the desert, lost in despair and discouragement. But God was in the desert, too. And Moses discovered Him. He found His presence in a burning bush. Moses felt too little to lead the Israelites from Egypt. But God promised to go with him. With God's help, Moses found he had no reason to be afraid of the task. He had no reason to be discouraged when he had God as an ally and friend.

The secret of victory over discouragement lies in trusting God and believing right.

First, keep in mind that all discouragement is from Satan. And if you belong to God, you need not accept it. Second, remember that the omnipotent God will go with you. To trust Him for victory over discouragement, puts you on the winning side.
