Huge crowd attend Chamber banquet

One of the largest crowds ever to attend an Iowa Park Chamber of Commerce banquet was on hand Saturday evening when two women were recognized for their accomplishments in the community.

Recognition and plaques went to Mrs. Earl Watson, Outstanding Citizen of the Year, and Mrs. W.F. George Senior Citizen of the Year.

Presentation of the awards dimmed an evening of steak dinner, prepared by the Iowa Park Mule Skinners; good humor by speaker Bob Murphey; and introduction of new Chamber officers by outgoing president Charlie Lee, who pointed out the efforts and accomplishments of the Chamber during the past year.

New officers recognized were Keith Aulds, president, Don Flowers, first vice president, and Richard Davis, second vice president.

The crowd which filled the high school cafeteria was said to be the largest to attend a local Chamber banquet, other than when Gov. Preston Smith was speaker some six years ago.

Murphey lived up to his billing as an enjoyable after dinner speaker, with such comments as "In my country, everybody's Baptist, unless somebody's been messin' with them."

MRS. WATSON

Mrs. Watson, wife of Dr. Earl Watson moved to Iowa Park 16 years ago and since coming here she has contributed immeasurably with her time and talents in the city's cultural, educational and civic activities.

She has the distinction of being the first lady to serve on the city council and she is also mayor pro tem.

As a member of the council she is commissioner of Parks and Recreation Department and she was instrumental in getting an ordinance passed for the creation of a Park and Recreation Board. She and her co-workers are currently trying to obtain water systems for the parks so that the newly planted trees may survive during the summer months.

A member and past president of 23 Study Club, she is also second vice president of Santa Rosa District of Texas Federation of Women's Clubs. She served as secretary of the Bicentennial Commission and was an area chairman for the swimming pool solicitation.

The mother of two sons and two daughters, she is vitally in the youth. She served as president of Kidwell

P.T.A. and as leader of Camp Fire Girls two years. She was also a den mother for Cub Scouts. She was a participant in Texas First Lady Volunteer Program and has served as co-chairman of the Arts and Crafts Show to benefit the Iowa Park Library three years. She has been secretary and co-chairman of Friends of the Library and a member and committee chairman of the Iowa Park School System Self Study.

Contributing to the spiritual development of the city, she is a member and an elder of First Christian Church where she has taught a Sunday School class for 12 years and has served as president of Christian Women's Fellowship.

MRS. GEORGE

Mrs. George, lovingly called "Aunt

Nellie" by friends and relatives, has been a resident of Wichita County nearly 88 years. She came to Texas from Nebraska with her father and family, Andrew Weeth in 1889, settling on a farm north of Iowa Park. On the death of her mother, being the oldest daughter, she helped raise the other children.

She and her husband, the late W.F. George, were large contributors in the building of W.F. George High School. During the depression, the couple shared their income with their church and invested in the future by putting through college a number of young people as well as their own children.

For years they donated the use of building on West Park for recreation for the Volunteer Fire Department

and for many years the First Methodist Church has been the benefactor of both their presence and gifts.

Mrs. George contributes annually to Cal Farley's Boys Ranch and she and her late husband helped to furnish the chapel there. She contributed the land for the Iowa Park Little League Baseball Field and she has contributed to Wichita General Hospital to purchase equipment.

She is a regular attendant at church and Sunday School and until

recently was treasurer of Wesley Bible Class. She is active in the United Methodist Women's work.

Though she is 96 years old, longevity of life is not the greatest characteristic. Her alert mind, physical activity, community interest and generous heart set her apart as an unusual person.

The mother of four daughters and one son, one daughter having passed away, Mrs. George maintains her own home. She is an excellent cook and seamstress and shares her baked goods with neighbors.

IN JOHNSON CASE

Federal grand jury continues investigation of disappearance

A federal grand jury Wednesday continued its probe into the disappearance of Iowa Park grainman Robert Johnson, however, an assistant U.S. attorney said he doubted any indictments would be returned by the 22-person panel.

Although the grand jury was still at work behind closed doors late Wednesday afternoon, an official close to the investigation said the panel was not expected to meet again today.

However, that does not eliminate the possibility that the federal grand jury may again explore the Johnson case in the future.

It was business as usual Wednesday for the grand jury as it began hearing the third day of testimony on the Johnson case.

Although officials would not reveal their identities, a man and a woman reportedly had testified by Wednesday afternoon.

Port Aransas Constable Ben Cash, who has spearheaded the investiga-

tion since the outset and maintains Johnson is alive and living on a ranch in Mexico, arrived at the Wichita Falls Federal Building early Wednesday morning.

Cash went on the witness stand Tuesday and there were indications his testimony would continue Wednesday. He and assistant U.S. attorney Jim Rolfe held a brief conference Wednesday morning, discussing material Cash carried in a folder containing documents and photographs.

Shortly after 9 a.m. Wednesday the doors to the jury room were closed, and a U.S. marshal held a vigil outside the door instructing newsmen to wait about 30 feet down the hall from the jury room located on the second floor of the Federal Building.

How long the grand jury will continue its investigation remained a mystery, an exclusive choice of the 22 persons serving on the panel.

Earlier in the morning Rolfe explained the outcome he anticipates.

Rolfe, who has been assigned the case with Ron Eddins, another assistant U.S. attorney, said he does not expect any indictments to be returned by the grand jury. He said the grand jury probe is mostly exploratory.

Although about 20 persons were reportedly subpoenaed to testify, Rolfe said only four or five had taken the stand by Wednesday morning.

Cash's initial testimony came Tuesday, but he would not disclose what information he gave the jury or how long he was on the stand.

Also testifying Tuesday was Donald Deslatte, one of Johnson's truck drivers, who reportedly was beaten twice after a statement he made claiming Johnson's Jan. 3 drowning was faked.

Giving testimony Monday were investigators with the Texas Department of Agriculture and Steve Gray, an FBI special agent stationed in Wichita Falls.

In other developments, it has been

reported that U.S. Embassy officials have informed Mexican officials of a warrant for Johnson's arrest.

A federal arrest warrant was issued Friday on Johnson after a magistrate's complaint was filed accusing Johnson of directing the transportation of about 9,000 bushels of stolen wheat from Geronimo, Okla.,

Second candidate files for race

One more hat has been tossed into the political ring for school trustee during the past week.

Joining incumbent Robert Wilcox as a candidate on the April 2 ballot is Mrs. Charles (Martha) Dudley, who worked for several years in the school administration office.

Two trustee positions are up for election this year, one held by Wilcox and the other by Glen Miller.

City administrator Gene Britton said Wednesday that no candidates have yet filed for the city election, where terms of Bill Gilmore and Bud Adams are expiring.

Council calls election on charter, aldermen

A lot of important things took place during Monday night's meeting of the city council, but out of the item which consumed most of the meeting's time came nothing.

The council declared an executive session and retired to the city hall office at 8:02 p.m., and didn't return to the council chambers until 1:52 a.m.

Subjects of the meeting held during that segment of the evening were "personnel and sanitary landfill." No other comments were to be made concerning the meeting.

No action on either subject was taken once the council resumed its regular open meeting.

The important items that took place, however, included officially receiving and accepting the charter drafted by the Home Rule Charter Commission, calling an election both on the charter and alderman positions, opening and accepting new

bids on three half-ton pickups, approved re-coding of city ordinances, and accepted a petition to annex a home north of Shiloh Addition.

Upon receiving the newly-drafted charter, Mayor Johnny Crawford declared the document "a masterpiece."

"I'd like to commend those members who worked so hard and so diligently to complete the drafting," he said, "If you put all three commissions together, there's been a tremendous amount of work gone into the charter's drafting."

The mayor termed the charter as probably the best ever written in the state, recognizing the new document is the result of two previous commissions' work along with the efforts of the present commission.

After accepting the charter unanimously, the council set April 2 as the date the public will vote on the proposed document. That date is also slated for the council election.

Bates Chevrolet's bid to sell the city three half-ton pickups was accepted from among four bidders. The bid called for \$3,892.23 per unit. Other bidders were Shaw Motor, Moore Ford and Longhorn Chevrolet.

A resolution was passed to allow the Municipal Code Corporation of Tallahassee, Fla. to re-code all city ordinances, and publish them in loose leaf binding at a cost of \$5,250 for 50 copies, based on 350 pages.

Funding of the project was budgeted in this year's cost of operation, it was explained.

Rip Smith petitioned the city to

annex his home property, located north on Johnson Road from Shiloh Addition. After accepting the petition, a public hearing on annexation was set for Aug. 28, next regular meeting of the council.

Aldermen approved Crawford's appoint of Vern Horsky and Tom Neely to the Planning and Zoning Board. Horsky succeeds himself, and Neely replaces Robert Harper. Terms of appointments are for three years.

Other members of the Board are Gene Lowrey, Donald Hill, Erwin Soell and Robert Nolen.

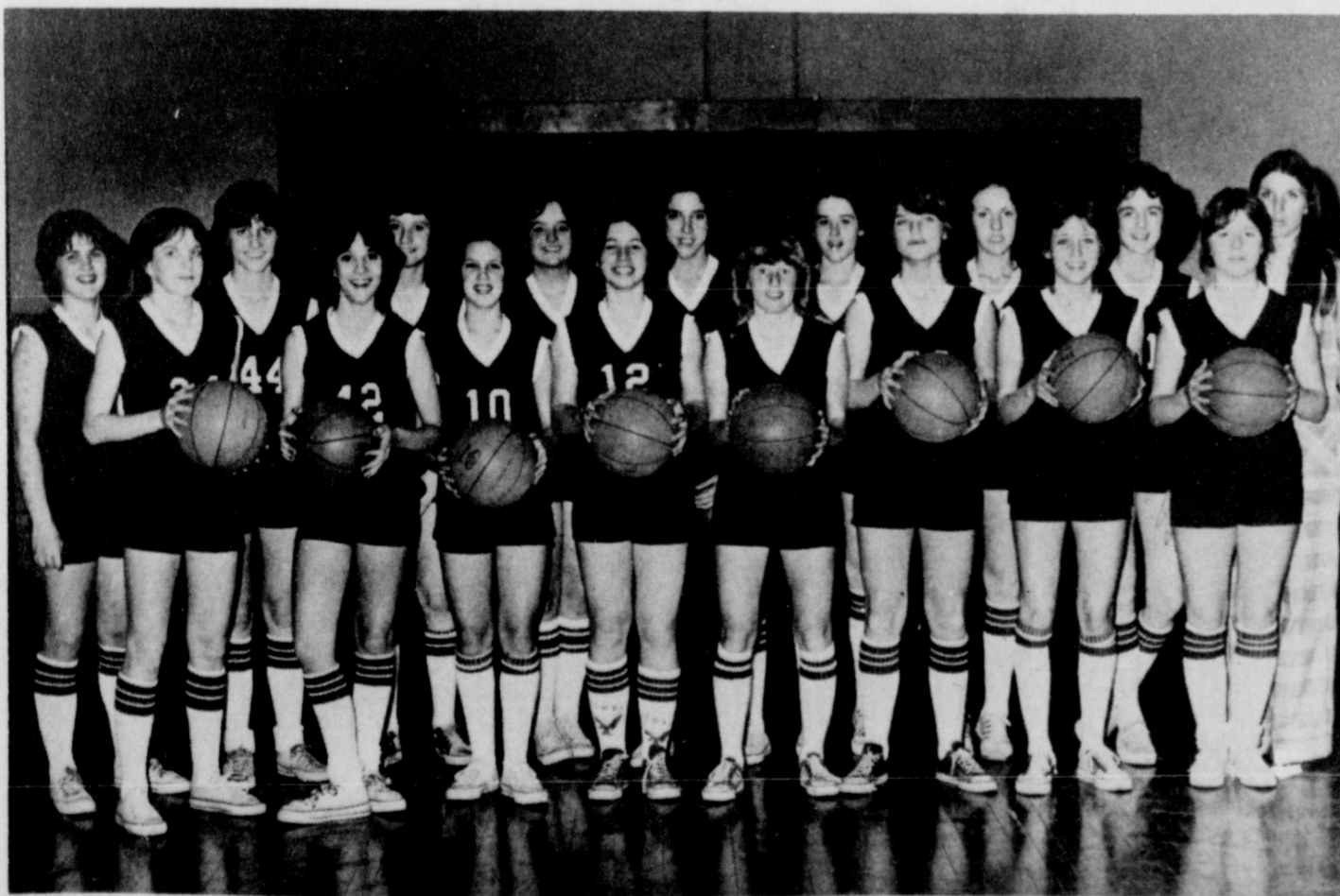
Mrs. Charlie Lee, representing the Parks and Recreation Board, presented a drawing of proposed landscaping of Oscar Park, on the west side of Gordon Lake.

Details of the plans were approved by the council, and a cost study for a watering system will now be made.

Final draft of a preapplication for a Community Development Block Grant was presented and approved by Don DuBoise. The application seeks \$99,986 from the federal government for water, sewer and street improvements in the eastern portion of the city. The city's portion of the project would be "in-kind labor", it was explained.

And just before the council's meeting adjournment at 2:22 a.m., approval was given for a resolution in support of legislation being proposed by the City of Shamrock to allow general laws cities to annex without consent of owners.

Aldermen Bill Gilmore and Joe Singer were not present.

Cook of the Week

In early days, French bakers engaged in making breads, biscuits, cakes and rolls were called "Boulangers". In the 20th century, American cooks are not always tagged with a fancy name, but they are very busy preparing delicious, nutritious foods for their families.

It seems that more and more cooks, even though they welcome the bread and cake mixes on the grocer's shelves, have one or two specialties to "show off" their cooking skills. Mrs. Bill Campbell, wife the the Faith Baptist Church pastor, has a treasured collection of recipes that her husband has brought back to her when he was away holding revivals or attending conventions and meetings. Chances are any of her recipes will spark the tired appetite or intrigue the most sophisticated guest.

Does the family have a craving for seafood? One does not have to wait until the fisherman returns with his prize catch to make the family dinner an occasion. Neither does one have to scramble through dozens of cookbooks for a favorite recipe—just try Mrs. Campbell's Shrimp Creole.

The former Arminta Weyrick, a native of Duke, Okla., she was graduated

from high school at Mission, Texas. She attended Wharton County Junior College, Alvin Junior College, University of Corpus Christi and did seminary work through the Houston Extension Department.

Since her marriage to her high school sweetheart who became a Baptist minister, they have lived at San Antonio, Carlton, Clute and at Houston, where Rev. Campbell pastored for 15 years before accepting the call of the Faith Baptist Church and assuming his duties in Dec. 1976.

At the local church, Mrs. Campbell is director of the Young Married People's Department and she assists with the teaching of the Sunday School lesson to residents at Wood Convalescent Center. Her hobbies are writing poetry and children's stories.

The couple's children are Mrs. Tal Holmes of Houston and George W. Campbell, who moved from Carlton where he was minister of music last week to Mt. Lebanon Baptist Encampment. They have two grandchildren.

SHRIMP CREOLE
In 3 T oil, brown:

1/2 cup celery
1/4 cup onion
1/2 cup green pepper
To the above add:
1 can mushrooms, drained
1 #303 can tomato sauce
Parsley, bayleaf, salt and pepper to taste
Simmer 1 hour
Add 1 1/2 lbs. (or less) shrimp. Cook over low heat for 30 minutes. Serve over rice.

Note: White meat of chicken is a good substitute for cutting amount of shrimp.

POP-UP BREAD

4 cups flour
1 pkg. dry yeast
1/2 cup milk
1/2 cup water
1/2 cup oil
1/4 cup sugar
1 t salt
2 eggs
1/4 cup grated cheese (optional)
2-1 lb. coffee cans

Mix 2 cups flour with yeast. Heat water, milk, oil, sugar, salt over low heat just until fat is warm. Cool about 5 minutes. Stir into flour and yeast. Add rest of flour and beat until smooth and elastic, about 2 minutes on medium speed or 150 strokes by hand. Divide dough into 2 parts. Put in two greased 1-lb coffee cans. Cover cans with plastic tops. Let rise in warm place 85°F until dough reaches about one inch from top. Remove plastic tops and bake at 325°F for about 35 minutes until bread is brown. Cool in cans 15 minutes before removing.

CHEESE CAKE
1 small box lemon jello
1 cup boiling water
1/2 lb. Philadelphia Cream Cheese
1 cup sugar
1 T vanilla
1 tall can Pet evaporated milk, chilled
Dissolve jello in boiling water. Set aside to chill; do not let congeal. Cream cheese with sugar; add vanilla. Whip chilled milk. With medium speed electric mixer, blend milk with cheese and jello.

CRUST
Crush 36 Graham crackers. Mix with one stick margarine. Press crust into 9x13 pyrex or two smaller dishes.

Pour filling over crust. Sprinkle top with fine crumbs. Cover with Saran and chill for several hours.

CHILI VERDE RICE

1 cup uncooked rice
2 cups sour cream
1/2 lb. Monterey Jack cheese
1-6 oz. can peeled whole chilies
1/2 cup grated Jack cheese (extra)

Prepare rice your favorite way and combine with sour cream. Season with salt. Arrange 1/2 mixture in greased pyrex or corning-ware. Cut 1/2 lb. Jack cheese into domino-size pieces and wrap in green chilies that have had seed removed. Place on rice. Add remaining rice and dot with butter. Cover with grated cheese. Bake at 350° for 30 minutes or until cheese and butter are bubbly.

SCOTCH CAKE

Mix together and set aside:
2 cups sugar
2 cups flour
Measure into sauce pan:
1 cup water
1 stick oleo
1/2 cup shortening
4 T cocoa

Bring to boil. Mix well with flour and sugar. Add: 1/2 cup buttermilk
1 t soda
1 t salt
1 t vanilla
1/2 t cinnamon, if desired
2 eggs, well beaten

Mix well. Bake in 9x13 pan for 30 minutes at 350°.

Make icing while cake finishes cooking (last 5 minutes).
1 stick oleo
4 T cocoa
6 T milk

Bring to boil. Add 1 lb. powdered sugar. Beat smooth with mixer. Spread on hot cake.

One cup pecans, coconut or both may be added if desired.

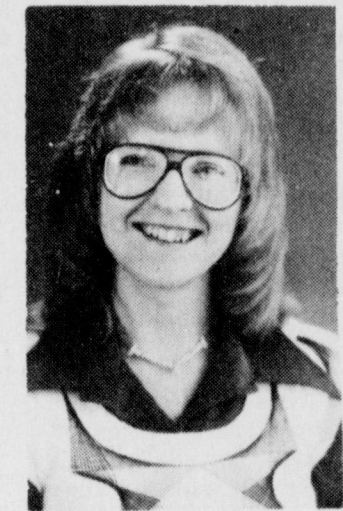

In describing the religion, Mrs. Tanner said that it was 96 percent Hinduism, two percent Moslem and two percent Christian and that the people made much of good and evil spirits. She observed that the status of women was deplorable compared to the women in America and that they work in rice fields, wash clothes, dishes and bathe in rivers.

Among the many other interesting things about Bali that Mrs. Tanner emphasized were the schools, the practice of polygamy where each man is allowed four wives; the sports stressing legalized cock fighting which takes place at noon and the industries. She described the art work, wood carvings, material weaving done by the Balinese women and children as the finest and most beautiful in the world.

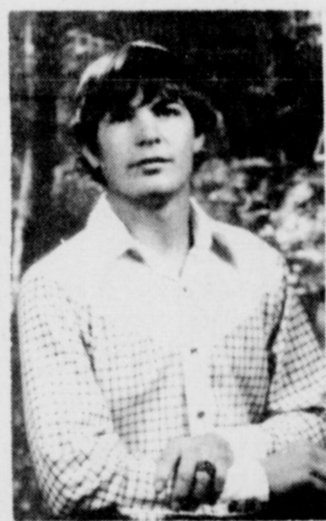

Myers is scheduled in August to begin 1,040 hours of training in diesel truck technology.

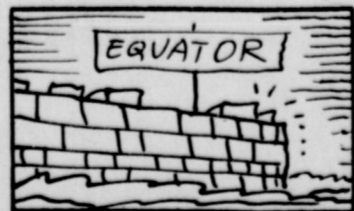

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Great News FOR THE World

THE PROMISED LAND

The land promised in the Bible is a real and substantial part of this earth, a place for living men and women; and inheritance in it belongs to the future. It has no connection with the cloudy region sometimes referred to in hymns which speak of the dead as "safe in the Promised Land". It has none the less a very close connection with the hope of future life, as a later article in this series will show more fully.

- The promised land is the land that was promised.
- This very obvious statement emphasizes that the words of Scripture mean what they say, and opens the way for asking to whom the promises were made and what was promised.
- The promises were made to Abraham and his seed.
- "Now to Abraham and his seed were the promises made" (Gal. 3:16).
- The land promised to Abraham, Isaac, and Jacob for an everlasting possession was the land of Palestine and adjoining territories.
- "And the Lord said unto Abram...Lift up now thine eyes, and look from the place where thou art northward, and southward, and eastward, and westward; for all the land which thou seest, to thee will I give it, and to thy seed for ever" (Gen. 13:14-15). "I will give to thee (Abraham) and to thy seed after thee, the land wherein thou art a stranger, all the land of Canaan, for an everlasting possession" (Gen. 17:8). "Unto thee (Isaac) and unto thy seed will I give all these countries" (Gen. 26:3). "The land whereon thou (Jacob) liest, to thee will I give it, and to thy seed" (Gen. 28:13). "By faith Abraham, when he was called to go out into a place which he should after receive for an inheritance, obeyed; and he went out, not knowing whither he went. By faith he sojourned in the land of promise, as in a strange country, dwelling in tabernacles with Isaac and Jacob, the heirs with him of the same promise" (Heb. 11:8).
- The seed associated with Abraham in the promise of the land was Christ and all who are adopted into him and covered by his name.
- "He saith not. And to seeds, as of many; but as of one, And to thy seed, WHICH IS CHRIST...For as many of you as have been baptized into Christ have put on Christ...and if ye be Christ's, then are ye Abraham's seed, and heirs according to the promise" (Gal. 3:16-17, 27, 29).
- The promise was not fulfilled in the lifetime of Abraham, Isaac or Jacob.
- "These all died in faith, not having

received the promises, but having SEEN THEM AFAR OFF" (Heb. 11:13). "God gave Abraham none inheritance in the land, no, not so much as to set his foot on" (Acts 7:5). "I (Abraham) am a stranger and a sojourner with you; give me a possession of a burying place" (Gen. 23:4).

- The occupation of the land by the descendants of Abraham under the law of Moses was not a fulfillment of the promise made concerning Abraham and Christ.
- "The promise that he (Abraham) should be THE HEIR OF THE WORLD was not to Abraham or his seed through the law, but through the righteousness of faith" (Rom. 4:13-14). "If the inheritance be of the law it is no more of promise; but God gave it to Abraham by promise" (Gal. 3:18).
- The fulfillment of the promises made to the fathers is spoken of in the Scriptures as future.
- "Thou wilt perform the truth of Jacob, and the mercy to Abraham, which thou hast sworn unto our fathers from the days of old" (Micah 7:20). "To perform the mercy promised to our fathers...the oath which he swore to our father Abraham" (Luke 1:72, 73). "My covenant with Abraham will I remember; and I WILL REMEMBER THE LAND" (Lev. 26:42). "Jesus Christ was a minister...to confirm the promises made unto the fathers" (Rom. 15:8).
- The fathers to whom the promises were made have a prominent place in the pictures which the Bible gives of the Kingdom of God, and the Holy Land is shown to be the solid basis of the hope for the future.
- "Ye shall see Abraham, Isaac, and Jacob, and all the prophets, in the Kingdom of God" (Luke 13:28, 29). "The Lord shall reign over them in Mount Zion". "The kingdom shall come to the daughter of Jerusalem (Micah 4:7, 8). "The Lord of hosts shall reign in Mount Zion, and in Jerusalem, and before his ancients gloriously" (Isa. 24:23). "At that time they shall call Jerusalem the throne of the Lord; and all the nations shall be gathered unto it, to the name of the Lord, to Jerusalem; neither shall they walk any more after the imagination of their evil heart" (Jer. 3:17). "The Lord delighteth in thee, and thy land shall be married" (Isa. 62:4). "They shall build the old wastes...they shall repair the waste cities, the desolations of many generations" (Isa. 61:4). "He shall swallow up death in victory...In that day shall this song be sung IN THE LAND OF JUDAH" (Isa. 25:8; 26:1).

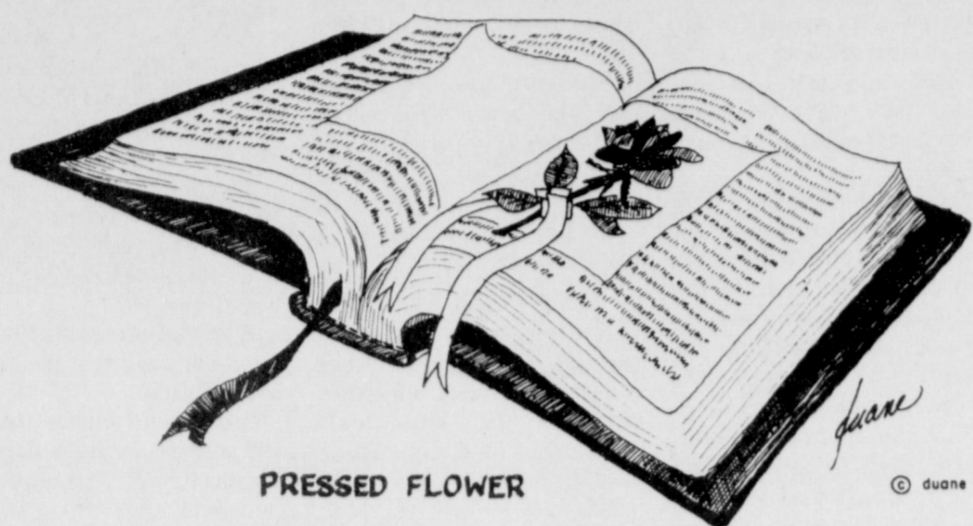
DRIED, PRESSED FLOWERS

to Fort Worth. Various agencies have been investigating Johnson's grain and fertilizer dealings since the Iowa Park man reportedly fell off a fishing boat and drowned Jan. 3 in the Gulf of Mexico near Port Aransas.

However, Cash maintains Johnson did not drown, but is living on a Mexican ranch south of Eagle Pass.

Charles Titus, a Port Aransas deputy constable, was in Eagle Pass earlier this week and reports he believes Johnson has left the Mexican ranch and gone deeper into the interior of Mexico or to another country.

Both Cash and Titus have made trips to Belize, a small South

American country below Mexico, in search of Johnson.

FBI agents in the Wichita Falls office indicated their search has not yet taken them into Mexico, but are working out of Eagle Pass.

The agents here indicated the FBI is most involved in what is taking place in Wichita Falls.

In the wake of a Texas state agriculture department probe that uncovered 500,000 bushels of grain is missing from Johnson's Geronimo Elevator Co. in Wichita Falls, agriculture officials in Colorado also have launched an investigation into his grain dealings there.

Grain storage facilities with which Johnson is associated in Eads, Arlington and Galatine, Colo., all are empty, according to Colorado agriculture officials, who do not expect criminal charges to be investigated at this time.

While no bankruptcy proceedings have been filed in Colorado, a pre-trial hearing is set for next Thursday on the involuntary bankruptcy proceedings that have been filed by creditors in Wichita Falls.

A date for the bankruptcy suit filed here is expected to be set at Thursday's pre-trial hearing.

As I See It....

I feel sorry for the Holiday School District residents. It appears this community of people is being torn apart over the school's coaching situation.

And we here in Iowa Park know what it's like, for we've had our share of similar situations.

I feel the actions of the school board Monday night were without reasonable considerations, ill advised, and as illegal as they could be. And from it has come some extremely poor publicity for the school district, and more is likely to come.

It should be pointed out here that I like very much each member of the coaching staff, that I know, and respect the others I don't know. But that isn't the reason for my comments.

Holiday has, over the past few years, earned the reputation of having an outstanding athletic program. The record speaks for itself. The caliber and number of youths participating do likewise.

Normally, when a coach's contract is not renewed, it reflects on his record and virtually ruins him in his profession. But I don't think it will in this case. These people can go about any place they wish, and be welcomed with open arms and blank checkbooks. They're that good.

What's going to happen is, the school district will suffer.

If the situation stands as it now is, the caliber of coaches who apply for jobs there will not be what the people of the district want, in all likelihood. I've talked with a number of coaches, from several schools, and their reaction is unanimous: they wouldn't, nor do they know of anyone who would, apply for a job at Holiday under the leadership the district now has.

There were some people upset with the coaches, I understand. This is apparent, considering the voting of

the board and the reasons they gave. But were the majority of those voting reflecting the majority of the people in the school district? That's the important question.

As to the board's action being illegal, it was.

According to the Texas Open Meetings Law, no vote can be held during an executive session, called to discuss personnel or anything else. And the board's explaining to the public what took place after the fact doesn't make any difference.

Neither was the vote recorded, as to who voted which way, in the minutes records.

In my opinion, the votes do not count, since the count was taken during an illegal portion of the meeting.

There is also serious question about hiring someone to serve a term in a particular position at an agreed salary, and then cancel it.

I wish Monday night's actions had never been taken. And I'm sure some

others wish the same, or will before this is all over.

Trustee agenda set for Friday

The Iowa Park school board will hold its monthly meeting at 7:30 p.m. Friday, after being postponed from Feb. 8.

Items to be brought up, according to the agenda posted Tuesday, were athletic department reports, calling of a trustee election, and an executive session, though the agenda does not specify what the subject of the closed meeting.

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Trustees release coaches

Meeting procedure is legally questionable

The Holliday school board turned down a motion Monday night to extend its contract with athletic director and head football coach Don Lucy, and on another motion the board voted not to renew contracts with the school's five other coaches.

Discussion of the contracts and voting on three related motions transpired behind closed doors, raising questions concerning the legality of the board's actions.

A cloud of legal doubt also hangs over the manner in which the minutes of the closed session were recorded.

Lucy and a newspaper reporter were in the meeting room Monday night, but when trustees approached the segment of the agenda dealing with coaches contracts, Supt. Ray Coe asked Lucy and the reporter to leave the room.

The reporter and Lucy left the meeting room, however, the board did not take a formal vote on going

into executive session as required by Texas law. Also, because the public was excluded by request, voting was not in public, as required by law.

After 30 minutes behind closed doors, Coe notified the reporter he could return

Trustee Tommy Mankins, board secretary, read aloud the action that had been taken on a trio of motions.

A motion was made by trustee Jack Ayres and seconded by Mankins to extend Lucy's contract as athletic director and head football coach for one year. The motion failed with two votes in favor of the proposal, three votes against and one abstention.

A second motion was made by Wells and seconded by trustee Bob McDaniel not to pay Lucy his athletic salary above his state base pay past the end of the

present school term, the minutes state. The motion passed 3-2 with one abstention.

A third motion was made by McDaniel and seconded by Wells to not renew any coaches' contracts for the forthcoming year. The motion passed 3-2 with one abstention, according to the minutes.

The minutes did not indicate how individuals on the board voted.

It was explained after Monday night's meeting that Lucy's present contract will not expire until the end of next year.

Contracts will expire at the end of this year for coaches Bill Lee, Walter Lemons, Cody West, Scotta Schroeder and Ralph Klinkerman.

The last time Holliday's eighth grade boys won the District 13-A championship was in 1973, West said.

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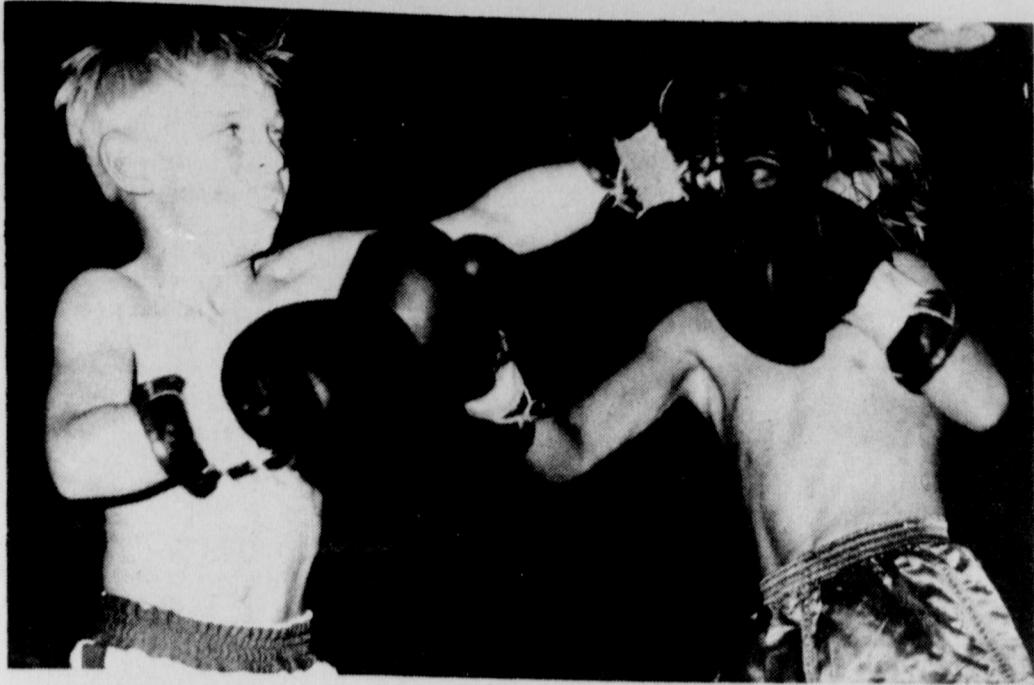

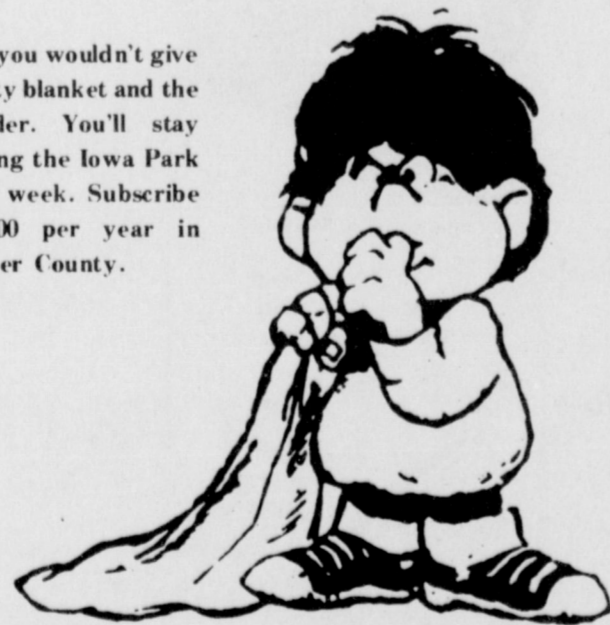

Hawks close season with winning effort

Coach Mike Billingsley's Hawk basketball team finished its season schedule here Tuesday night, still unsatisfied but with a vast improvement over the previous year's accomplishments.

The Hawks were 13-15 on the season, as compared with 1-28, and 6-8 in conference play, instead of 0-14. And they came within three points Friday night of making that record even for the year.

Tuesday's finale was a come-from-behind 62-55 win over Stephenville. And they were edged Friday by Brownwood 45-47.

The vastly improved season record also signals what is to come for basketball in Iowa Park, too. Billingsley loses only four varsity players, starter Tom Pappas and reserves Lowery Bartow, Rex Huckaby and Shane Kimbrew.

Coming back next year with Doug Rogers, Paul Hubner, Rusty Price, Donnie Taylor, Anthony York, Ed Kennedy and Jim Rowell will be the entire junior varsity team, which has

winning record this year and closed out their season 71-43 over Stephenville.

The visiting Yellow Jackets jumped out to a 6-0 lead at the start of the game and led 16-14 at the quarter and 32-25 at halftime. Widest margin held by Stephenville was nine points.

Still holding an eight-point lead with three minutes remaining in the third period, the Yellow Jackets went into a stall, and it backfired. Led by hustling Doug Rogers, who finished the night with 18 points, the Hawks narrowed the gap to three points, 39-42, by the final official rest stop.

Iowa Park quickly took the lead early in the fourth period, when a visiting player drew a technical foul after being charged with a personal foul. Rowell hit his two free shots, Rogers shot the technical, followed closely by York making a three-point play and Rogers stealing the ball for a layup.

All of a sudden, with 6:25 still remaining in the game, the Hawks were ahead 48-42.

Play became fast and furious the final 1:02, with

both teams being charged with a total of nine fouls; and York and Price both fouling out.

Rowell finished second high with 15, and York had 10.

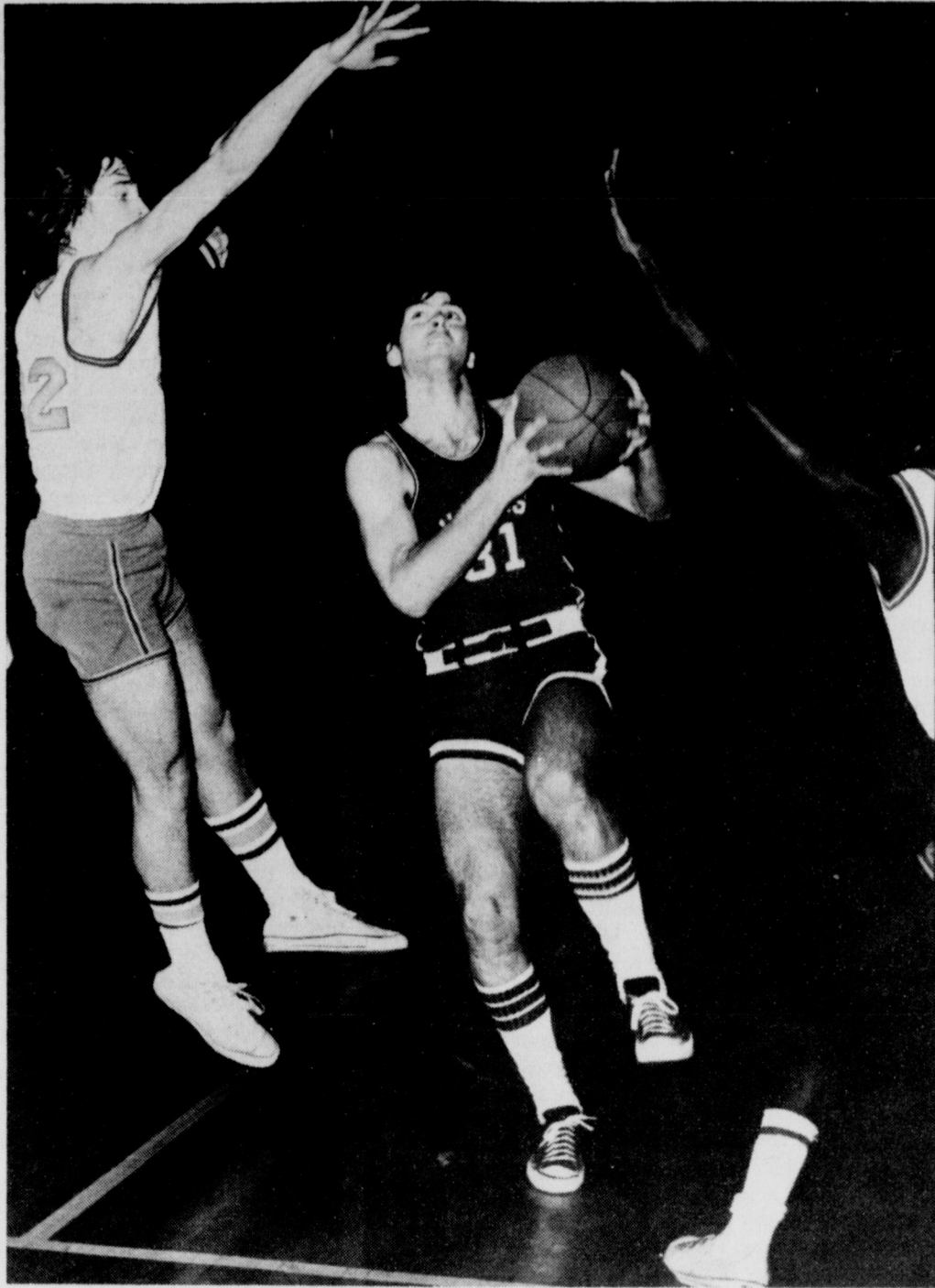
Coach Billingsley apparently said the right things at halftime Friday, because the Hawks scored eight more points, 22, in the third quarter than they did the entire first half.

The Lions finished 4-3 for the conference after losing 54-40 to Dist. 4-AAA champion Mineral Wells Tuesday night.

finals in all divisions that afternoon.

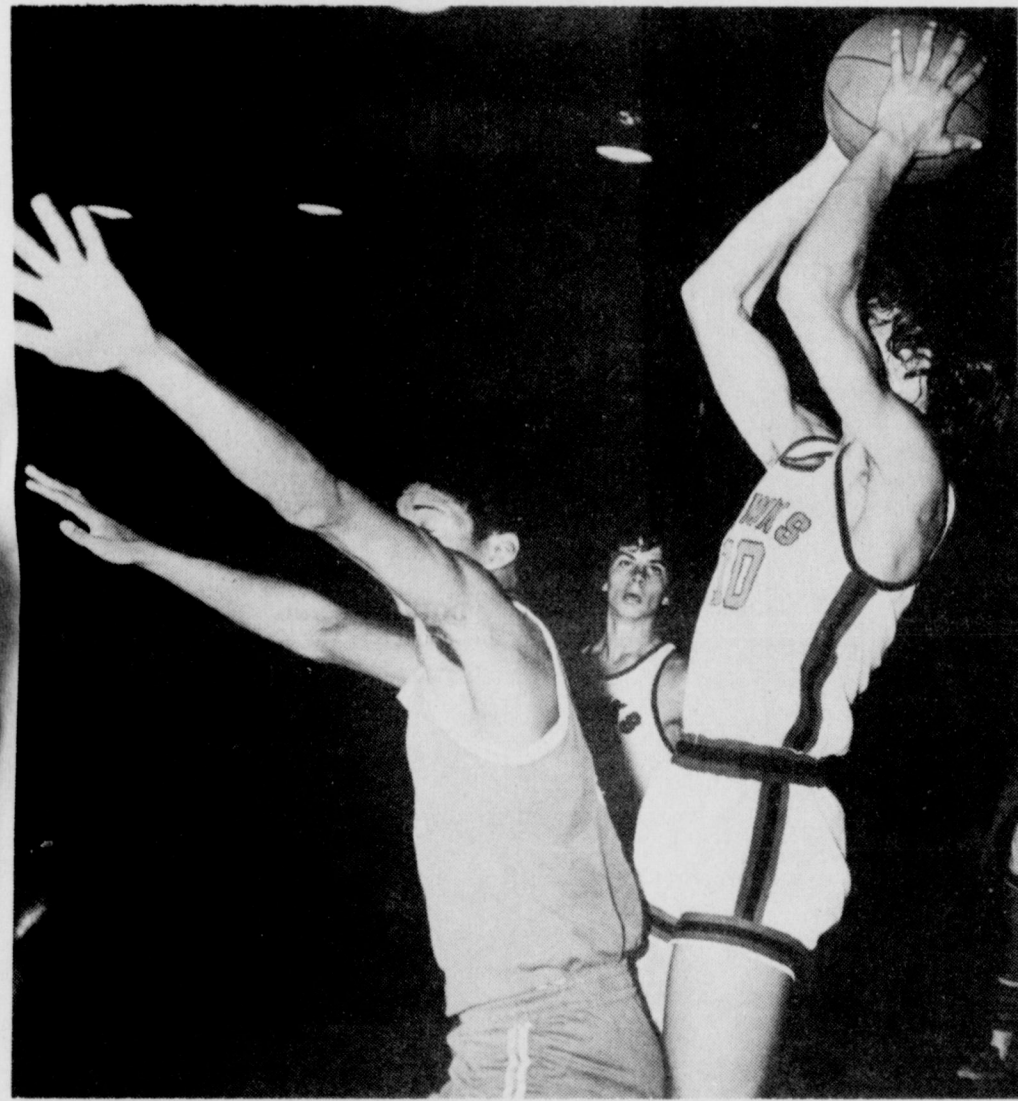
