## TO MEET REAL AMERICANS <br> COME TO WEST TEXAS

Ninety-eight-and-nine teathe per cent of Weat Texas people are as tive born whites. Weat Texas and
the Panhandle have loog had the reputation of being a "white mad" country," but the exact extent to which this is true has not been definite ly known until Roscoe Ady, Industria Commiasioner of the West Texes Chamber of Commerce, made a close study of the most recent census re ports of the Government and an aounced that 989 per cent of the ection are native born whites.
In making this study Industr Commissioner Ady blocked off rection of the State containing 80 counties, having an area of 88,72 square miles, which is greater than the combined areas of Maine, New Hampshire, Vermont, Massechusetts, Rhode Island, Consectict, New Jersey and Maryland. It is equal in area to the combined area of England, Scotland and Wales.
In aome of these counties no for eigh born people are found, and number of others are free of ne groes. In many cases the combined negro and foreign born population is lese than one per cent of the total

BAIRD GAS RATE TOO HIGH A news item says that Amarillo is prepared to offer patural gas at seven reminds us that several bundred gas reminds us that several hundred gas
users in Baird are paying an exorbitant price for gas, and the people should protest.
The price originally was flfty cents per thousand feet, but two years ago it was raised to sixty-two. and-a-half cents net, if paid by the 10th of each month; sevents-five cents if not.
Now, is not this too much to pay for gas? With gas fields near us, on the northesst and south, our peo ple ought to demand a reduction in the rate. Most everything has come down in price, wages have declined and we doubt if a single business man in Baird is making anything like average profits this year. Win ter is coming on and people will be less able to meet the enormous gas bills this winter than ever before. The people should demand a reduction in gas rates. Other things are too high and we will name them later: but we are more interested in the gas rate just now. For one, the price of gas is not reduced, we will use coal this winter, mostly for heating purposes.
Gas is a great convenience and Mac Brundage, our friend, is oplendid man, popular and all that but we are paying too high a price for gas. Perbaps no other public service coporation dong business in Baird receives anything like the in come the Texas Gas Company re ceives from Baird penple, and re turns as emall an amount in cost of operation.
We are not kicking about that, hat we are kicking about the price we have to pay for gas; but if we cannot get a reduction in price this winter, we shall do our best to use something eise for heating purposes beside gas.
We may be unable to get coal, but if the people unite in making demand for it, we can get coal and se that to some extent to reduce ur gas bills. For one, we are no longer able to pay the rate we have had to pay in the past two winter or gas. Coal at $\$ 13$ per ton is cheaper than gas at the present rate we are forced to pay for gas.
So long as we could afford to pay wice as much for gas as we ever had to pay for coal or wood we did not mind it, but we can no longer atford to pay one-third more for gas o four monthe, during, the winter of 192021 than we ever paid before in tweive months for cosl or wood.

conscience: no human suthority ought, in any case whatever, to control or interfere with the rights of conscience in matters of religion, and no preference shall ever he given by law to any religious society or mode of worebip.' Thus religrous intolerance is foreign to our genius, law and history, and we deplore and condemn every effort to tir up sectarian strife.
Those who fan the flames of relgione bigotry and race prejudice are endangering our hard won liber-
ties.
"While we believe in the wise egulation and restriction of immiAmerica as their home be loyal to her laws and ideals, yet we have no sympathy with that undemocratic and narrow interpretation of Americanism that seeks to create a preju dice against the foreign born and their children
"Nothing can he more fundamen tal in our national life than theae principlea and require that all of thnae who asek oflice under the name
of Demneract. stand and cenduct their campaigne upon a Democrati platform.'
