Charter fails; Adams, Hicks are elected

Iowa Park voters turned down the proposed Home Rule Charter 5-3 Saturday, while they were ousting one of two incumbents vying for re-election.

The charter failed by a wider margin than the two previous times elections have been called on the issue, 562-369.

Bud Adams was successful in his bid to be re-elected to the city council. But Bill Gilmore, dean of the

aldermen with more time on the council than the rest of the members combined, was unseated by newcomer H.C. Hicks.

Hicks drew the most votes, 459, and Adams 384.

Gilmore was actually fourth in the at-large voting. He received 327 votes, behind Bud Thompson, who served one term and was not re-elected last spring. Thompson had 354.

Andy Arrington received 200 votes and Jess Rowe 156. There were four additional write-in votes for Kenny Gilmore.

A total of 969 votes were cast, including absentee, and that represented the largest number of votes in a city election in a number of years.

Adams and Hicks will be sworn into office at the regular meeting of the council Monday night, which starts at 7 p.m.

Canvassing of the ballots was accomplished in a called meeting of the council Monday.

Board incumbents lose at polls

Newcomer G.R. "Rusty" Rusk swung the greatest support among five candidates for the Iowa Park school board, and Jesse McCullough succeeded in his bid to return to the board, both defeating incumbents Glen Miller and Robert Wilcox.

Rusk polled 642 votes to lead all candidates in the at-large race for one of the two seats up for election.

McCullough, who lost in his bid for re-election last year, amassed the second-highest number of votes, 562.

Incumbents Wilcox and Miller polled almost the same number of supporters, 429 and 424 votes,

respectively. Another newcomer, Mrs. Charles Dudley, received 305 votes.

The election attracted one of the highest turnouts of voters in recent years, 1,209.

Myers re-elected board chairman

C.E. Myers was re-elected chairman of the board of trustees of Iowa Park Consolidated Independent School District Tuesday evening after the swearing in of two newly-elected members.

Myers was re-elected by acclamation vote of the board, who also voted unanimously for Bill Spruiell as vice president and Delbert Catlin as secretary.

Myers administered the oath of office to Jesse McCullough and Rusty Rusk, who were elected in Saturday's election. The oath came following the official canvassing of election returns.

During the business session, trustees approved salary adjustments for cafeteria personnel and bus drivers; hired a new assistant coach and teacher aide; approved purchase of two school buses; and changed their meeting location for next month.

Hourly workers in the cafeterias were given a pay increase of 15 cents, from \$2.40 to \$2.55 an hour, and

managers were raised from \$385 to \$410 per month.

The additional \$5,600 in cost can be absorbed by the lunchroom program without any increase in lunch prices, according to Bill Steger, who oversees the food program and made the pay recommendations.

Drivers of routes one through five, and nine, were raised from \$210 per month to \$235; route eight from \$230 to \$250; and route 10 from \$270 to \$290.

This will amount to an increase of approximately \$2,100 for the transportation department, but the state is expected to increase its allowance to Iowa Park between 10 and 15 percent, Steger pointed out.

Adjustments for both cafeteria and transportation personnel are for the 1977-78 school year, but Steger asked that they be made at this time in order to plan for the coming year's budget.

NEW COACH

Athletic director Pat Tone recommended that Charles Williams

be hired as a high school assistant coach, and the board approved the hiring.

Williams, who coached six years with Tone at Hobbs, N. Mex., is currently an assistant at R.L. Turner High at Carrollton. He was Tone's line coach four years at Hobbs.

Tone said two more coaches are yet to be hired for the coming year.

Sue McCarthy was hired as a Title I aide to replace Susan Steger, who resigned.

NEW BUSES

Because of the increasing need for buses for extracurricular activities, Steger recommended that two new buses be purchased for next year.

He pointed out that the bus had been replacing buses on a regular basis of one a year. However, because the mileage demand on buses has increased over the past few years with additional programs, two were needed for next year.

As an example, he told of one bus which was anticipated to accumulate 90,000 miles by the end of this year,

Green thumb students to sell their plants

Iowa Park High's ornamental horticulture department will hold its fifth annual plant sale Friday and Saturday, according to instructor Jimmy Howell.

The class offers plants it has worked to produce through the year in the greenhouse, offering hanging baskets, bedding plants, tomato and pepper plants.

Howell noted that his 27 students were interested enough in the project to take two days of their Easter holidays to hold the sale.

Hours the greenhouse will be open will be 8 a.m. to 5 p.m. Friday, and 8 a.m. to 3 p.m. Saturday.

The greenhouse is located on the

high school campus, near the intersection of Johnson Road and West Highway.

There are over 300 hanging baskets with 30 different kinds of plants, including fantasia, springii fern, airplane plants, money wort, begonias and many others.

Bedding plants include geraniums, petunias, vinca, alyssum, impatiens and many more, Howell said. And there will also be bell, banana and jalepeno peppers and several varieties of tomato plants.

Each of the 27 students have cared for 12 hanging baskets. They also have large tomato plants they pollinate and care for daily, among their other plants.

Tomatoes produced in the greenhouse are served in the school's cafeteria.

Additional projects for the year, carried out by students, have included working closely with the garden club on plans for Pace Park, as well as digging some of the plants used to landscape the expressway between Johnson Road and Pacific exits.

After the sale this weekend the class plans to landscape the home being constructed by the building trades class, plant the annual bed in front of the greenhouse, and do some budding and grafting of pecan trees at the Experiment Station, Howell reported.

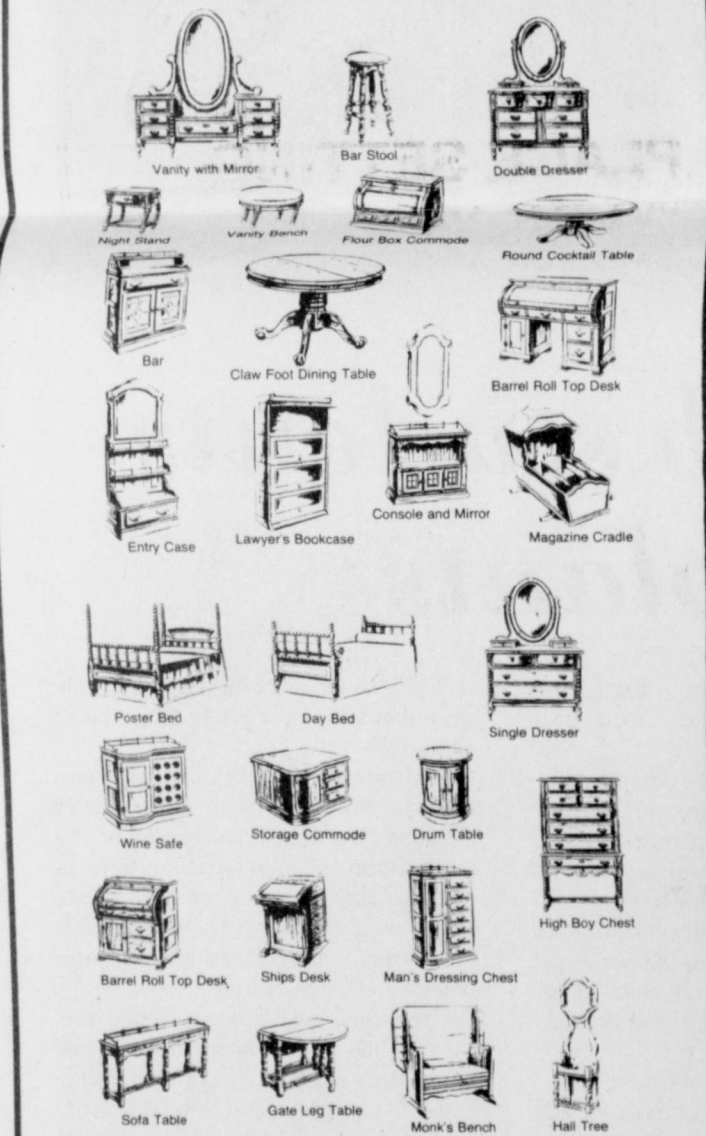
The bride chose a three-piece blue and white knit suit with a short sleeve jacket and flared skirt for her going away ensemble.

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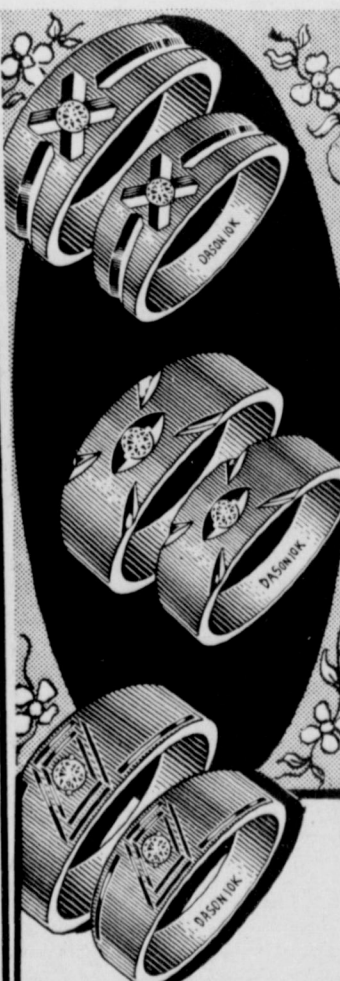
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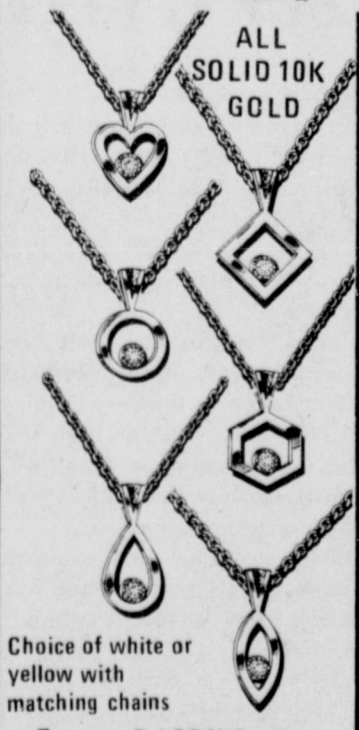
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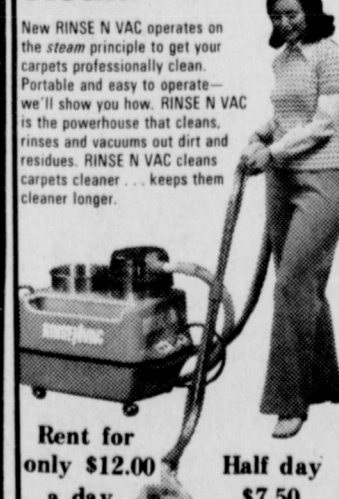
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Pappas-Whitson wedding rites are repeated Friday

Whip one can Eagle Brand milk

Add to cranberries. Let set in refrigerator until firm.

FLAKY PIE CRUST

Mix and sift:
2 cups flour
1 t salt

Mix in 3/4 cup lard with finger tips. Moisten slightly with 1/4 cup ice water. When mixed, toss on lightly floured board and roll out. Bake in hot oven, 400°. Will make one double pie crust or two single pie crusts.

CHERRY PIE

1 cup sugar
1/4 cup flour
3/4 cup cherry juice
3 1/2 cups red sour cherries
1/2 t vanilla extract

Cook together over heat until thick. Put in pie crust and cover with top crust and prick top. Bake at 400° for 35 minutes or until crust is golden brown.

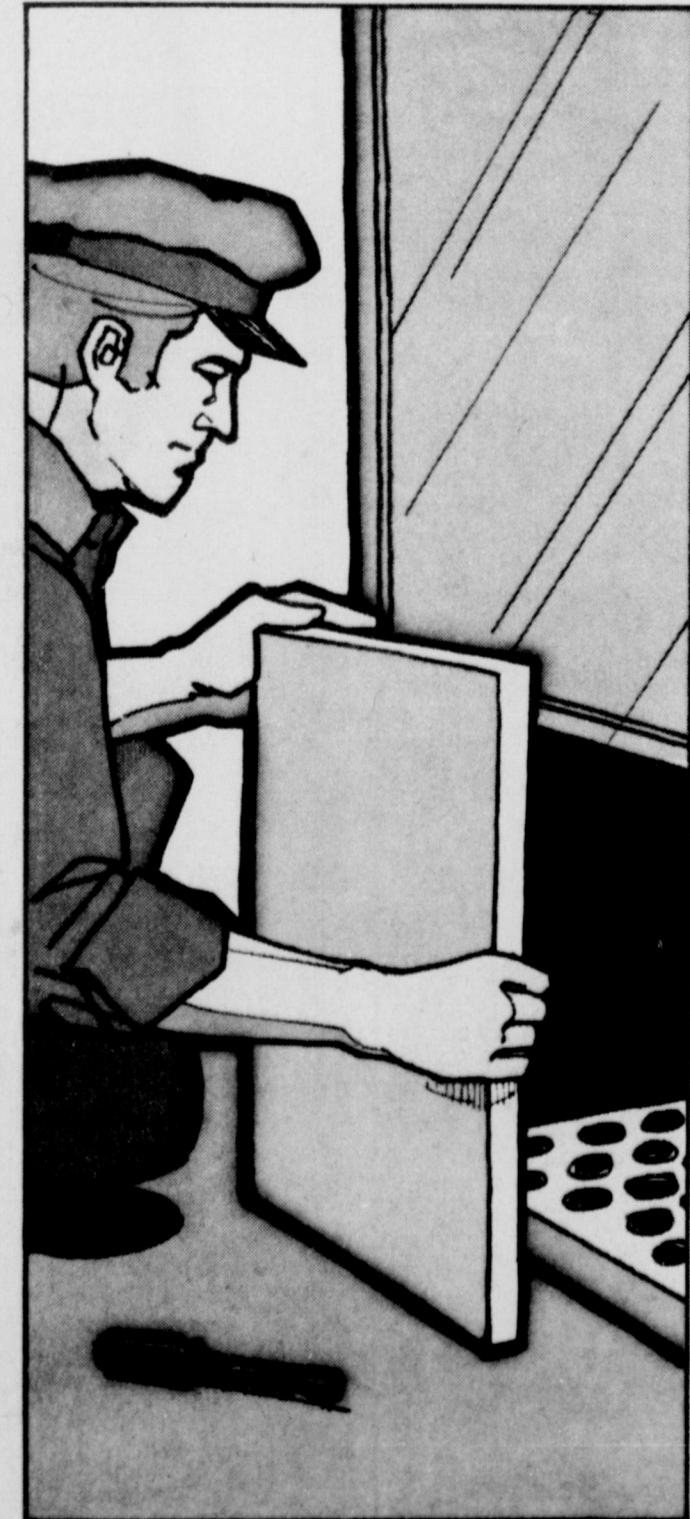

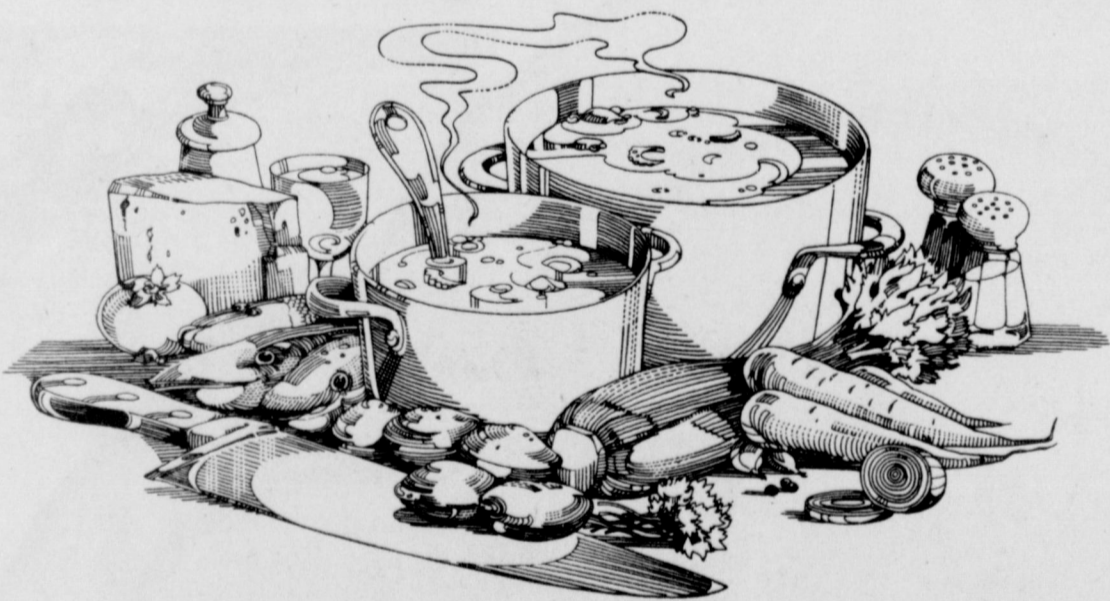

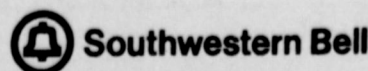

1 lb. cod fillets.
1 tsp. dried dill weed

Halencak carried Bowman Community with 12, while Sorenson and Lawson each collected nine votes.

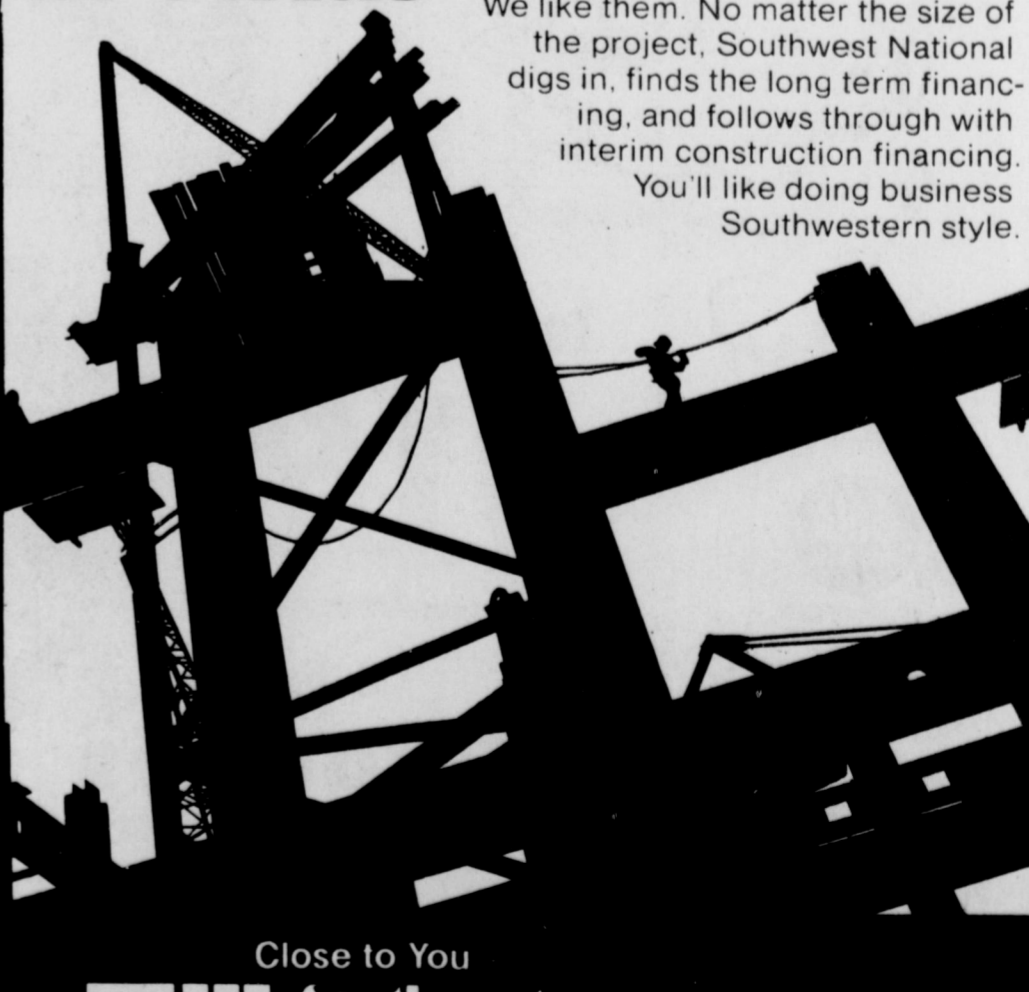

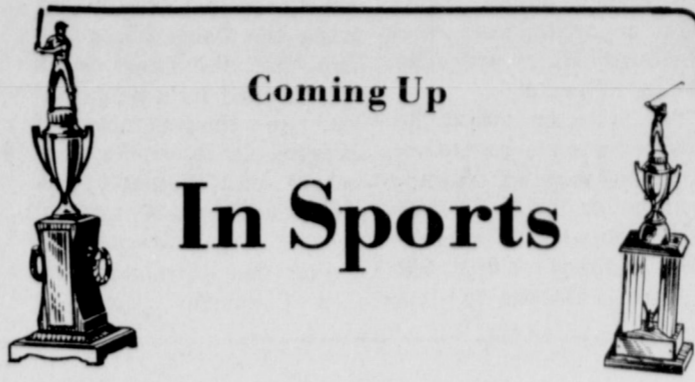

needs of commercial feeds came into being. The club meets each second Monday night in Texas Electric Reddy Room in Wichita Falls at 7:30 p.m. Clyde Webb of Burkburnett is president and C.M. Carroll of Holliday is vice-president of WVRBA.

Pecan grafting shortcourse set here next week

A pecan grafting shortcourse is scheduled for Monday and Tuesday. The first session will be the classroom instruction at 7:30 p.m. on Monday, in the Community Room of the ASCS office in Iowa Park.

Then the field experience will be at 6 p.m. Tuesday at the Iowa Park Experiment Station. Virgil Woodfin, chairman of the county pecan and fruit committee, will provide the instruction. Those who

attend both sessions should be able to graft their own pecan trees without any difficulty. Don Decker, County Agent, will show insect and disease control. Pecan graft wood is

needed for the new propagators to topwork their trees. Those who have graft wood for sale are asked to contact the county extension office at 766-0131. Referrals can be made to the graft wood sources.

The prospect for cotton prices is favorable this year, and Wichita County producers are expected to nearly double the cotton acreage. Larry McAlister, of the Double L Farms in the Punkin Center Community,

is increasing his cotton planting to about 400 acres this year while Weldon Roth is increasing his planting to about 250 acres. McAlister will be planting 30 inch rows with row crop equipment while Roth will be using his grain drill to plant his cotton in 20 inch rows.

A new cotton grower will be Fred Dwyer of Bacon Switch Road. He is planning 300 acres of cotton to be planted with a grain drill on 20 inch centers.

Short season cotton production is recommended for top dryland yields. The key to this system is early fruiting. Practices aimed at early fruiting include adequate fertility, uniform planting (May 10-20), early maturing varieties and insect control.

Control of the overwintering bollweevil is the critical part of the program. Uniform planting over the county is essential. Information from the research center at Vernon indicates May 10-20 as the best planting dates.

The weevil has to be stopped before egg laying occurs. This can be accomplished with one spray application when the oldest squares in the field are about the size of a match head. Guthion or malathion is effective in weevil control.

Fleahoppers are an occasional problem in some areas. Field inspections are made just as the cotton begins to square. Control measures are applied only when damaging levels occur (35 fleahoppers per 100 terminals or a loss of 50 percent of the square).

Two more pesticide training and certification meetings are scheduled for farm and ranch producers in the area. Those meetings are set for 7 p.m., April 26, at the Reddy Room of the Texas Electric Service Company in Wichita Falls and 7 p.m., May 5, in the Community Room of the Texas Electric Service Company in Burkburnett.

Every producer must be certified in order to purchase restricted use pesticides beginning October of 1977. At least two months is required for the certification application to be processed by the Texas Department of Agriculture and certificate issuance.

Only 20 producers attended the recent Iowa Park meeting. This means there are a lot of producers who need to complete this training in order to meet the qualifications for purchasing restricted use pesticides.

The 4-H Complex at 1626 Midwestern Parkway in Wichita Falls has some fertilizer impregnated straw which is available to homeowners free of charge. This would be excellent for mulch material in vegetable gardens and flower beds.

Homeowners may bring their pickups or sacks or boxes and get all they want, as long as it lasts.

4-H news

One hundred and three Wichita County youth are enrolled in home environment 4-H projects. These young people read information, measure a room, plan furnishings and complete a room presentation on poster board.

Thirteen finalists will be selected April 6 to set up vignettes in county stores.

Those helping with the projects are Henrietta Sands, Joanne Fangman, Sara McNew, Linda Ayers and Ella Mae Jessel.

Participating stores are Sears, Popular, Robertsons, Huff Galleries, Tanners, Pilgrim House, Spears, Dillards, Whites, Wards in Electra, Parkway and Whites in Iowa Park and Jerry's in Burkburnett.

The 4-H council is sponsoring a Family Night at 7 p.m. on April 30, at the 4-H Complex in Wichita Falls. Everyone is invited to attend, bring a covered dish and stay for Square Dancing.
