Gas should be basing its gate rate for the city on interstate prices, rather
than intrastate, because the city is on an interstate line and most, if not all, gas is purchased from Oklahoma.
The RRC has jurisdiction over all gas produced and consumed in the
state (intrastate), but the Federal Power Commission rules on all
interstate cases. On that basis the city will challenge the RRC's

## Aldermen approve re-zonings


#### Abstract

Two tracts of land were re-zoned during Monday night's lengthy meeting of the city council, attended by more then 20 persons. The northwest corner of Block 21, Texas northwest corner of Block 21, Texas Addition was re-zoned from automotive convenience to light industry. That tract is to the west of Singleto That tract is to the west of Singleton Communications, on West Highway. The northeast corner of Block N, Texas addition Texas addition, was re-zoned from single family residence to automotive convenience. The site is between Third Street and the Peppy's building, fronting the access road. Another tract was requested to be re-zoned, but aldermen requested additional information on plans for it from the prospective buyer, before granting approval. Rezoning of the land next to Singleton's is reportedly for the Uture location of Mowrey Gu residents against the business wa countered by Singleton who said it would produce less traffic and noise than a nother drive-in eating place or service station. service station. Finnell bill benefits volunteer fire fighters

| recently won House approval of legislation to provide death, disability, and retirement benefits to volunteer firemen. <br> Finnell, House sponsor of such legislation, said the act "is a recognition of the vital role our volunteer fire fighters serve in Texas. For the first time, volunteer firemen will be assured of solvent benefits for themselves and their beneficiaries." <br> The House-passed measure, already approved by the Senate, now goes back to the Senate for approval of correcting House amendments. <br> The Holliday legislator also announced that his resolution requesting Congress to oppose extension of federal price controls to the intrastate natural gas market, H.C.R. 140, was approved by the House Energy Resources Commit tee this week and now awaits House floor action. <br> "It is crucial for Texas to keep the federal government out of the business of telling Texans how much of our natural gas we can sell and use in this state. If Congress places our intrastate natural gas under federal controls we'll see Texans being deprived of our state's own resources," Finnell said. |

## Family day homes

 must be registered| All family day homes must in compliance with the law, according to Mary Hardin, program director for day care licensing in Region 4 of the Texas Department of Public Welfare. <br> There are currently 367 registe ed family day humes in the region," said Mrs. Hardin, "and another 96 in the process of being registered. But there is also an additional number who have neglected to register." <br> A "registered family day home" is defined as a child care facility which regularly provides care in the caretaker's own residence for not more than six children under 14 years of age, excluding the caretaker's own children. <br> It also provides care after school hours for not more than six additional elementary school siblings of the other children given care, provided that the total amount of children including the caretaker's own does not exceed 12 at any given time. <br> To become registered, the operator of the family day home should first contact their local DPW licensing office for registration materials. The materials will include The Child Care Licensing Act of 1975, Minimum Standards for Registered Family Homes, Parents Guide to Registered Family Homes, Fire Inspection Request Card, Emergency Medical Care Forms, Sanitation and Safety Check List, A Guide for First Aid and Emergency Care, Regi stration Form and Addres sed Envelope. <br> The operator should keep one copy each of the minimum standards, the parents guide and the emergency medical forms and give one copy of each to a parent of each child in care. Each operator must also request a fire and health safety inspection prior to registration. <br> A local fire marshall may conduct the fire inspections, and a local sanitation officer | may conduct the health health inspections are not available locally, the operator can conduct its own inspection according to state specifications. Once the minimum standards have been met, including the fire and health inspections, the operator should send the registration forms to the local DPW licensing office. <br> If there is a standard the operator cannot meet because it would cost too much money or for any other reason," said Mrs. Hardin, "please let us know, because the law lets us waiver or not require a standard to be met for just cause." <br> She noted that some of the standards such as immunizations for the children and the maximum number of children (12) you may have in care cannot be waived. <br> All registration forms should be returned within 30 days after the operator has received the packet of materials. After the registration form is returned and all standards have been met, the operator will then be mailed a letter of notification that the day home has been officially registered by DPW. The registration certificate is valid for two years from the time of issuance, the fire and sanitation inspections must be then completed again each year. <br> One the home is registered, it can begin accepting children for care. The provider retains the form. <br> A DPW representative is not required to visit the facility. However, if a complaint is received regarding violations of minimum standards or allegations of child abuse or neglect, a DPW representative will then come to the home and talk with the operator. Also, visits may be made to the home as part of a statistical sampling. <br> Registration of family homes also offers some benefits to the community, providers of care, parents and children in care. DPW keeps lists of all child care facilities in each community. These lists are available to parents seeking child care. <br> The Department will also provide consultation services to providers on nutrition, health, equipment, discipline and other aspects of child care. All family homes are on the DPW mailing list for the day care newsletter which contains current information on what is happening statewide in day care. <br> "If someone refuses to become registered," said Mrs. Hardin, "they will be subject to the Child Care Licensing Act of 1975 . Those in violation will be referred to the county or district attorney for legal action." <br> The Licensing Act provides for a civil penalty of not less than $\$ 50$ nor more than $\$ 1,000$ for each day of violation, as the court may deem proper. It also provides for a criminal penalty of a Class B misdemeanor for operating a child care facility or child placing agency without a license; or a Class C misdemeanor for persons placing a public advertiseplacing a public advertise- ment for an unlicensed facility. |
