# **City awaits ruling** on gas rate hearing

No ruling has yet come out of a hearing in Austin Friday morning before Texas Railroad Commission Examiner Austin Bray, nor is one expected for several weeks.

The hearing was called by the Railroad Commission (RRC) when Lone Star Gas Company appealed following the City of Iowa Park adopting a natural gas rate ordinance which the utility company claims lowered the rates required.

Attending the hearing were Mike Hubbard, city attorney, Gene Britton, city administrator, and Johnny Crawford, mayor, The meeting was started at 10 a.m. and lasted until 12:30.

A full hearing was scheduled by the examiner on the issue for July 15, also to be held in Austin.

However, that hearing might not ever come about.

Hubbard is to file a declaratory judgement on the jurisdiction of the RRC over the rates set for Iowa Park. Depending on scheduling problems brought about by a case in Wichita Falls Thursday morning, Hubbard said he would file the car or Friday. Originally to be filed in federal court in Wichita Falls, the plan was changed to file it in Austin, because that is the seat of the RRC office. Iowa Park contends that Lone Star Gas should be basing its gate rate for the city on interstate prices, rather than intrastate, because the city is on an interstate line and most, if not all, gas is purchased from Oklahoma.

"I feel they (the RRC) would be obligated to continue their stand as to jurisdiction until the legislature or courts change it."

The city attorney went on to say, "I was surprised that they allowed us to question their jurisdiction, over objection of Lone Star Gas. Lone Star contended this was a collateral attack on their jurisdiction, and previous rulings under GUD 588 (Gas Utility Docket 588).

"In our introduction we stated to the commission that we were going to question their jurisdiction on grounds of interstate activity by Lone Star. They allowed all our questions into their hearing records, which was not their practice just a during the Vernon hea

Britton and Lone Star also disagree on terms concerning net and gross billing. Britton calls the gross bill a penalty for not paying by a prescribed date, while Lone Star calls the net bill a discount for paying by that date.

The city administrator points out that Lone Star, in documenting for new rates, always quotes the net figure, in order to show a lower profit figure.

Britton said Lone Star is supposed to start spot digging of its lines in the city sometime next week, to determine pipe condition, which is another basis for establishing rates.

# Graduation ceremony set Friday in stadium

The RRC has jurisdiction over all gas produced and consumed in the state (intrastate), but the Federal Power Commission rules on all interstate cases. On that basis the city will challenge the RRC's jurisdiction on gate rate setting here.

Britton acknowledged that the rate set by city ordinance would be low, if intrastate rates applied. However, he insists, the rate provides the proper profit, based on interstate prices paid by Lone Star at the Oklahoma well head.

At the outset of the hearing, Hubbard pointed out that Iowa Park was not acknowledging the RRC's jurisdiction over the city, but was there only to defend itself before the examiner.

They reported that the examiner was not surprised, because he produced both headlines and copies of articles which had appeared in the Iowa Park Leader on the subject.

"I was not surprised in terms of the RRC's stand, in terms of jurisdiction. They stated the state legislature has

"In fact, Lone Star objected so

strong that the examiner disallowed the entire testimony of the Vernon city manager," Hubbard stated.

The only exhibit Lone Star produced at the hearing was a comparison of receipts under the city's ordinance and from rates requested by Lone Star.

G.H. Vaughn, director of accounting for the company, said the rates under the new ordinance would produce a "negative rate of return". He pointed out the ordinance lowered the income from \$411,281 to \$340,775.

Britton quickly pointed out Vaughn had omitted inclusion of the pass through charge.

An adjustment on the rates could be made by the RRC examiner, should he produce a ruling before the July 15 hearing, or before any injunction is handed down by federal court, though it is not expected.

It was pointed out that the July hearing might be postponed by federal court action, and possibly never be held, depending on what action the federal judge takes.

#### CHANGE EXPLAINED

Britton pointed out he had received some questions on why Lone Star's billing to city customers for last month did not include two rates, net and gross.

The one rate system was put into the new ordinance because in the utility company's sample ordinance, which originally called for a general price increase, elimination of the

# **Aldermen approve re-zonings**

Two tracts of land were re-zoned during Monday night's lengthy meeting of the city council, attended by more then 20 persons. The northwest corner of Block 21, Texas Addition was re-zoned from automotive convenience to light industry. That tract is to the west of Singleton Communications, on West Highway.

The northeast corner of Block N, Texas addition, was re-zoned from single family residence to automotive convenience. The site is between Third Street and the Peppy's building, fronting the access road.

Another tract was requested to be re-zoned, but aldermen requested additional information on plans for it from the prospective buyer, before granting approval.

Rezoning of the land next to Singleton's is reportedly for the future location of Mowrey Gun Works. Arguments of neighboring residents against the business was countered by Singleton who said it would produce less traffic and noise than another drive-in eating place or service station.

Pioneer Real Estate has purchased the land on the access road north of Kidwell, and proposes to construct a brick business building. Carl King, one of the owners, pointed out that the site was not suitable for residential construction and if any other businesses occupied the new building with his firm, it would be of a professional nature, such as medical clinic, etc.

One neighbor said he had no objection to a professional building, including he would like it, but objected to the rest of the tract being re-zoned, fearing another type of business might locate there.

Peanuts Wilson explained that Everett Boulware was wanting to buy a lot he owns on West Highway, between the used car lot and new business building, for a "nice eating place."

Several neighboring residents objected, stating fears of trash, noise and late operating hours.

Wilson said Boulware proposes to build a brick building, where all the eating would be inside, and protect the area with a solid fence and hedge on both sides of the fence.

He pointed out that lots on both sides of the proposed site have businesses, and no one would ever want to build a house between them, just because it is zoned single family residence.

Alderman Joe Singer said early information the council received was that the proposal was for another drive-in type business, and that was why it was turned down.

The council asked that Boulware appear at the next meeting, that members might hear directly from him on the proposal, indicating they would support re-zoning if what

Wilson told them was correct. **OTHER BUSINESS** 

Council members again took up the subject of the drainage ditch south of West Highway between Park Plaza and Foley Addition.

At an earlier meeting, problems from standing water, insects, and weed growth were brought up by property owners wanting to know if the city would correct the situation.

Following a study made by a soil conservationist, City Administrator Gene Britton said the only feasible recommendation was to fill in the holes where the water stands, sod it and keep it mowed.

Mayor Johnny Crawford told property owners in the audience that there was just so much the city could do financially, and they would do as much as they could, which included following the conservationist's recommendations.

A lengthy discussion was held with the members of the Planning and Zoning Commission, who were asked by Crawford to attend the meeting. Mainly, discussion centered around re-zoning to allow for progress, as well as taking into consideration what land was more usable for business than for homes.

A new study of the city is in the making for some time in the future.

During a portion of the meeting. set aside to hear suggestions from citizens on possible expenditures of Revenue Sharing money for the coming year, John Sibley asked that





The truth in the case is simple and beautiful. Hell in most cases simply means the grave. This must be evident even to the unlearned English reader who considers the following passages:

1. "The mighty ... are gone down to hell with their weapons of war, and they have laid their swords under their heads" [Ezek. 32:27]. This could not be the popular hell. The supposed ghosts of wicked men do not take swords to hell with them. But the bodies of great men in ancient times were accompanied to the grave with the weapons they used in their lifetime: and this is the fact referred to in the passage, which shows the hell spoken of is the grave.

2. "Thou will not leave my soul in hell" [Psa. 16:10]. Peter quotes this as a prophecy of Christ's resurrection from the grave [Acts 2:27-32]. With this meaning it is possible to understand it; but how is it possible to contemplate the idea of Christ having gone to the conventional hell?

3. Jonah, referring to his temporary burial in a fish, says, "Out of the belly of hell cried I" [Jonah 2:1-3]. The fish was a living grave to him, but the conventional hell is out of question.

4. "Thou Capernaum shalt be brought down to hell" [Matt. 11:23]. The overthrow and ruin of a city may be described as a bringing to the grave; but a city cannot be pictured as going down bodily into a fiery hell; or as experiencing a mental state.

5. "The sorrows of death compassed me: the pains of hell gat hold on me" [Psa. 116:3]. David here speaks of death: and the grave is its natural associate. David could not mean that the flames of hell had begun to scorch the man after God's own heart.

6. "My church: the gates of hell shall not prevail against it" [Matt. 16:18]. The gates of the grave close against Christ's people at their death; but they "shall not prevail". because he will open them at his coming. Christ's people are never inside the gates of the conventional hell, on any theory.

7. "I [Christ] have the keys of hell and of death" [Rev. 1:18]. Applied to the grave, this is intelligible, for Christ is the

# Trustees are called to emergency meeting

School trustees were notified yesterday morning of an "emergency meeting" for 5 p.m. that day.

A school spokesman explained that topics would be discussed which could not be held over until the next regular meeting, June 14.

The four-item agenda included: approval of sale of building trades house; discuss policy to require teachers to attend college in summer; approve Region 9 contract agreement for next year; and discuss purchase of lawn mower for football stadium.



Every city council has its problems, but this one seems to have more than its share.

One of the major problems now facing our council is re-zoning. There appear two reasons for the

problems, one is that the drafter of the city's comprehensive plan was idealistic; the other is neighbors of re-zoning areas.

An earlier council adopted the comprehensive plan's suggested area for zoning of commercial and industrial tracts. Though the council had to have somewhere to start, the author of the plan failed to take a number of things into consideration. One was the future condition of many downtown buildings, which fail to attract new businesses in that area. The plan apparently figured on having a city with one central business location, surrounded by all homes. Therefore, all areas other

Though the city's tornado alarm never sounded, a lot of people still went to the cellars Friday night.

Threatening clouds boiled overhead for more than two hours, but all over the immediate area were under the careful watch of members of the local police, volunteer fire department, as well as county and state peace officers.

A take cover siren was sounded in neighboring. Wichita Falls and Sheppard AFB, when a funnel was sighted over Memorial Stadium in the southwest part of the city, but it apparently never touched ground until it was about a mile east of the air base, traveling northeast.

A tornado was sighted on the ground between Mankins and Holliday, about the same time the funnel was reported over Wichita Falls, but no damage was reported. Numerous funnels hanging from clouds were reported to the south and west of Iowa Park during the storm.

that major thoroughfares, such as the expressway and the old highway, are better suited for business than for residences. Property along such streets are too expensive for homes, builders contend.

People also like to trade at more convenient places in their neighborhood, rather than driving a mile or two to a central business location.

So this brings a problem to those already living in such areas. They don't want a business next door or across the street, and this is understandable. They built with the understanding that the neighborhood was to be for homes only.

Who gives and who takes in such a situation? Usually, if the objections are headed by the government, and the land is not re-zoned, it's the property owner who ultimately carries the burden.

A person with a valuable piece of property, on which no one would likely ever want to build a home, must continue paying taxes and maintenance, without ever realizing anything from it.


It's a very heavy problem, but certainly not one of Iowa Park's alone. Every community goes through it.

But there's one point I'd like to bring out. We've got the entire community to think about in these situations, not ourselves exclusively.

Businesses of any type not only bring in, but produce, additional taxes for the city. And the lack of tax revenue due to lack of businesses here is being shouldered by homeowners.


In many cases, homeowners who are complaining about a business locating in their neighborhood are the same ones who have complained loudly about recent tax increases on their homes.

It is argued that no individual should suffer for the good of the community. But is it correct for a community to suffer for the good of one individual?

A DPW representative is not required to visit the facility. However, if a complaint is received regarding violations of minimum standards or allegations of child abuse or neglect, a DPW representative will then come to the home and talk with the operator. Also, visits may be made to the home as part of a statistical sampling.

Registration of family homes also offers some benefits to the community, providers of care, parents and children in care. DPW keeps lists of all child care facilities in each community. These lists are available to parents seeking child care.

The Department will also provide consultation services to providers on nutrition, health, equipment, discipline and other aspects of child care. All family homes are on the DPW mailing list for the day care newsletter which contains current information on what is happening statewide in day care.

"If someone refuses to become registered," said Mrs. Hardin, "they will be subject to the Child Care Licensing Act of 1975. Those in violation will be referred to the county or district attorney for legal action."

The Licensing Act provides for a civil penalty of not less than \$50 nor more than \$1,000 for each day of violation, as the court may deem proper. It also provides for a criminal penalty of a Class B misdemeanor for operating a child care facility or child placing agency without a license; or a Class C misdemeanor for persons placing a public advertisement for an unlicensed facility.

# Time for pecan tree spraying

#### By DON D. DECKER

**County Agent** The predicted dates for spraying pecan trees in the control of the pecan nut casebearer is May 28 through May 31. These spray dates are based upon moth emergence reported by Virgil Woodfin at the Iowa Park Research Center. Timing of control measures for the casebearer is critical. The spray must be applied after eggs are deposited on the tips of the pecan nutlet. but before the tiny worm

enters the small pecan. Growers can "double check" for the casebearer by examining the tips of the pecan nutlets the latter part of the week. The eggs are white in color and about the size of a small pinhead. Usually the eggs are deposited on the brown tip of the nutlet.
