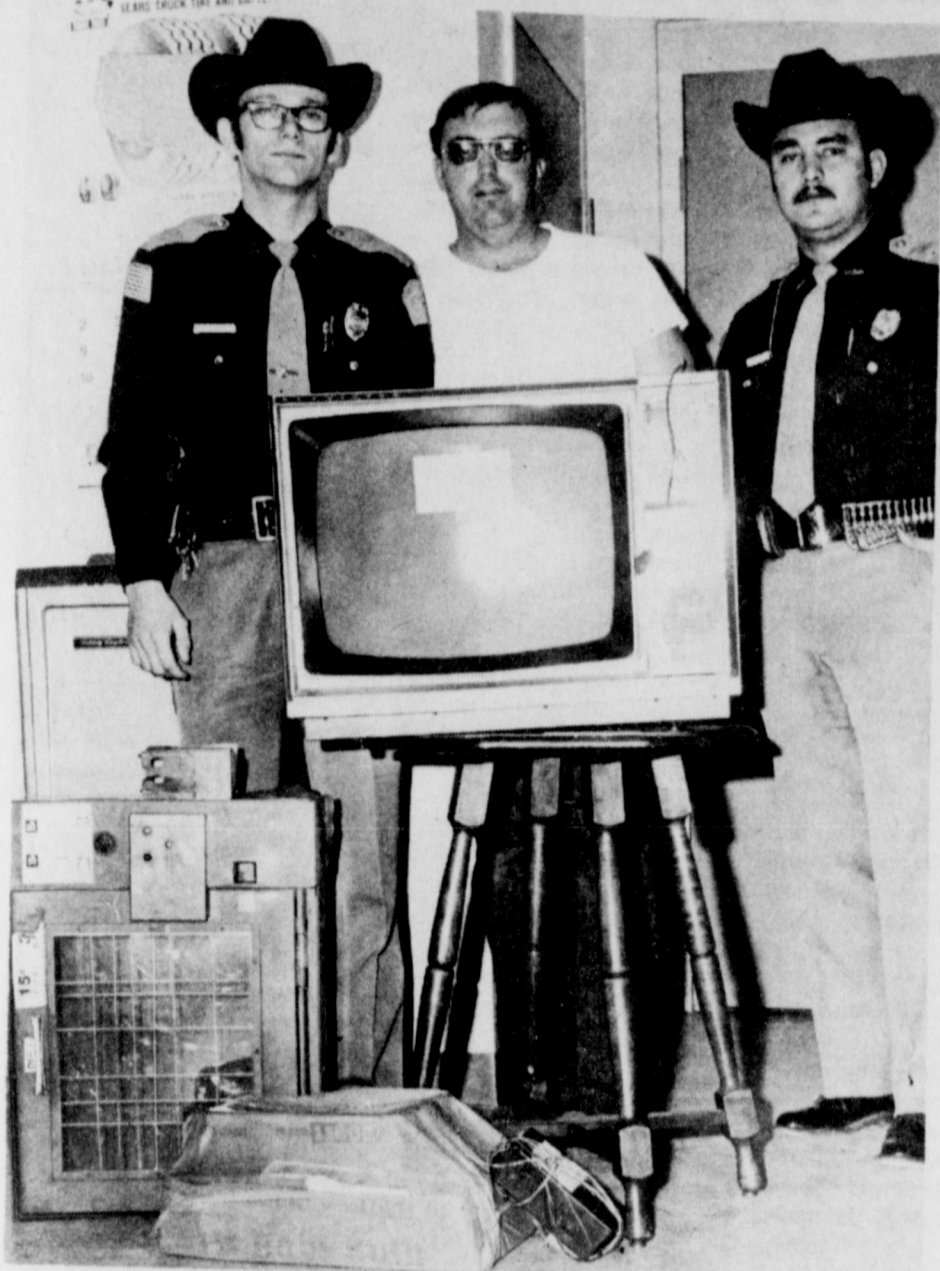

## Arrests clear burglary spree

A Wichita Falls man and an Iowa Park juvenile have been apprehended by police in connection with several burglaries here.

The Wichita Falls man, Ricky Larry Logan, 23, was charged twice with intent to commit theft by burglary of a building. Bonds on Logan were set at \$2,000.

The identity and proceedings against the Iowa Park youth are protected under juvenile laws, although it was learned he is a 16-year-old Iowa Park school dropout.

The case began developing last Thursday night when Iowa Park police asked the two suspects to come to the police station for questioning.

Police said they had observed the suspects hauling bicycles out of town. They admitted to bicycle thefts and other thefts during Thursday night's interrogation.

They also admitted taking pay telephones from the junior high gymnasium, high school football stadium, youth center and Woodbriar Apartments.

A color television and table, CB radio, newspaper vending machine and a large quantity of candy and cigarettes were recovered from Logan's Wichita Falls home.

Two stolen bicycles were recovered from Wichita Falls pawn shops.

On Saturday Iowa Park police officers waded into an irrigation ditch south of Bradford School and recovered two pay telephones from the muddy water.

The two suspects also admitted last week's theft of Carl Catlin's pickup

truck which was found crashed into a creek bottom a half mile south of Old Iowa Park Road on Horseshoe Lake Road.

After admitting the thefts, the suspects were jailed here overnight after being informed of the rights by Justice of the Peace Virgil Hill.

They were processed Friday at Wichita County Courthouse.

In other police activity, officers here received a report Tuesday from James L. Loving of 900 Fourth, that three vehicles had been attacked causing an estimated \$500 worth of damage.

Police said windshields of two vehicles had been broken and a radio antenna had been ripped off a third vehicle.

Glen Phillips of 713 Coleman told police Monday his billfold had been stolen from the dash of his pickup truck. Contents of the billfold included eight credit cards and cash.

Mrs. Virginia Darlene Turman of 405 E. Aldine told police Friday that someone had entered her home and taken two checks, one for \$20 and the other for \$19.36.

## Hawks continue search for win

Iowa Park's Hawks are not entirely unlike the proverbial man crawling in the desert, searching for water; except the Hawks are searching for a win on the gridiron.

Winless in their five outings of 1977, and with only one victory since 1974, the young Hawks are trying to figure some way to get into a column other than one for losses.

But the route is rocky, and this week the boulder is no smaller. Iowa Park travels to Weatherford tomorrow evening.

The Kangaroos, who reportedly represent the largest enrollment school in the conference, one which could qualify for AAAA classification, are 4-1 for the season, and 1-1 in loop play.

Weatherford dumped Brewer 26-6 in the opener, Burleson 7-0, Granbury 9-6, and then opened Dist. 4-AAA play with a 26-12 victory over Mineral Wells.

The 'Roos fell 48-14 last week to high-flying Brownwood.

However, the score fails to give an indication of the game. Weatherford racked up 279 yards against Gordon Woods' Lions, but scored both their touchdowns in the third period. The 'Roos "held" Brownwood to 296 yards rushing, and allowed 59 more passing.

Mainstays in the Kangaroo offense are quarterback Darwin George, quarterback who raced for a 68-yard

# Elderly given exemption

A \$3,000 tax exemption for elderly residents of the Iowa Park school district was approved by the board of trustees Tuesday night.

However, the exemption will not go into effect until the 1978 taxes are billed. It is too late for the 1977 billing, which went into the mails about three weeks ago.

Trustees approved the exemption for residents of the district who are 65 years of age or older.

Prior to the vote, Supt. Faris Nowell said "Bill (tax assessor/collector Steger) and I wholeheartedly recommend the exemption."

Steger pointed out that the exemption program would cost the district some \$18,000 annually, but said Cryovac's plant expansion would more than offset the loss.

Cryovac, Steger reported, is the district's second largest tax contributor this year, and next year, when the

expansion is completed, will become the largest.

"They (Cryovac officials) are very receptive to the idea and would like to see the exemption given. You've never found any people more cooperative in tax work than Cryovac," Steger stated.

"What it amounts to is Cryovac is paying for their exemptions," commented Jesse McCullough. Trustees voted unanimous on the issue.

A motion by Roy Boutwell to hire an additional second grade teacher for Kidwell did not come to a vote, failing to receive a second.

The trustee had requested at last month's meeting that a close watch be kept on enrollment of that grade, where enrollment ranges from 29 to

31 students per room. Boutwell said he felt no room should have more than 25 in the second or first grades.

The additional teacher would have cost approximately \$7,500, which would be paid out of local funds, failing to qualify for more state funds.

Enrollment in the entire school system is now 2,002, up from the 1,989 reported last month, Nowell reported. Largest increase is in the high school, where 770 are in classes. It's a record.

A breakdown of enrollment indicates 10 are in early childhood classes, three in special education, 61 in kindergarten, 137 in the first grade, 149 in the second, 122 in the third, 126 in the fourth, 144 in the fifth and 133 in the sixth.

At the junior high, 169 are enrolled

in the seventh grade and 178 in the eighth. There are 213 in the ninth, 204 in the tenth, 178 in the eleventh and 175 seniors.

### OTHER BUSINESS

Trustees voted to purchase three citizen band radios to be used in school buses, in case of emergencies on road trips. Brackets will be mounted in all the buses, so the radios can be moved from one to another. Cost will be \$210 for the radios, which will be checked out to the drivers, who will be held responsible for them.

Approval was given to raise state mileage rate to 18 cents per mile, and also to hire Daresse Cotton to do the school's printing.

A lengthy period was devoted to reviewing one of the chapters in the new policy handbook.

## Inflation hits crime

The cost of crime -- or at least the cost of being caught and convicted -- is on the rise.

Persons who have been convicted of traffic violations or criminal misdemeanors in Iowa Park Municipal Court already are aware of the fact.

Until a month ago a \$2.50 state tax was tacked on fines imposed on wrongdoers convicted in municipal court here and other Texas courts.

As a rule of thumb, Iowa Park Municipal Judge G.A. Benesh has been handing down \$25 fines to persons convicted of such crimes as running stop signs and public intoxication. The state tax brought the average cost of a conviction to \$27.50.

But as a result of House Bill 451 passed by the last session of the Texas Legislature, court costs increased another dollar Sept. 1, bringing the average violator's fine and court costs to a total of \$28.50.

The additional dollar per fine was earmarked by the legislature to go into the newly-created Law Enforcement Officer Standards and Education Fund which is expected to generate an additional \$686,805 for the Texas Commission on Law Enforcement Officer Standards and Education during the coming year.

"The newly-created fund does not provide for any one specific program; rather, it may be used to fund any portion of the commission's programs," according to the office of State Sen. Ray Farabee.

At least part of the commission's \$1.5-million budget will be spent on education of law enforcement officials, Farabee said.

## City looks to county, state

According to votes taken during their regular meeting Monday night, members of the Iowa Park city council are going to the county and state for help.

Aldermen voted to seek more financial support from the county for the volunteer fire department, and from the state for traffic control devices on the old highway.

Following a discussion on participation in a new fireman's pension fund program, during which it was brought out that the department was going to cost more money than in the past, a suggestion from the audience that the county help pay the costs was made.

Richard Logan, vice president of the Iowa Park Volunteer Fire Department, pointed out that the county government was getting a lot of benefit from three departments, and paying very little for it.

He said the Wichita Falls paid department will not go outside the fringe of that city, and estimated that 80 per cent of the fire coverage of the county comes from volunteer departments, mainly Iowa Park, Burkburnett and Electra.

Though the county has provided a rural fire fighting truck to each of those departments, Logan suggested the county might participate in cost of benefits for volunteers, such as insurance.

The department officer emphasized that the members would continue going wherever it was called, regardless of county financial participation. It was also pointed out that the county line was no obstacle, whenever the department receives a call for help.

In accordance with the agreeing aldermen, Mayor Johnny Crawford named Chief Bud Thompson to head a local committee, which is to meet with the Electra and Burkburnett departments and cities, for discussions which would lead to a meeting with the county government.

Thompson is to name members of his own committee.

### TRAFFIC SIGNS

The council approved a resolution

which calls for four-way stop signs to be installed on the old highway, formally known as Loop 370, at Johnson Road, Yosemite and Victoria.

The resolution will be forwarded to the State Department of Highways, which maintains the thoroughfare.

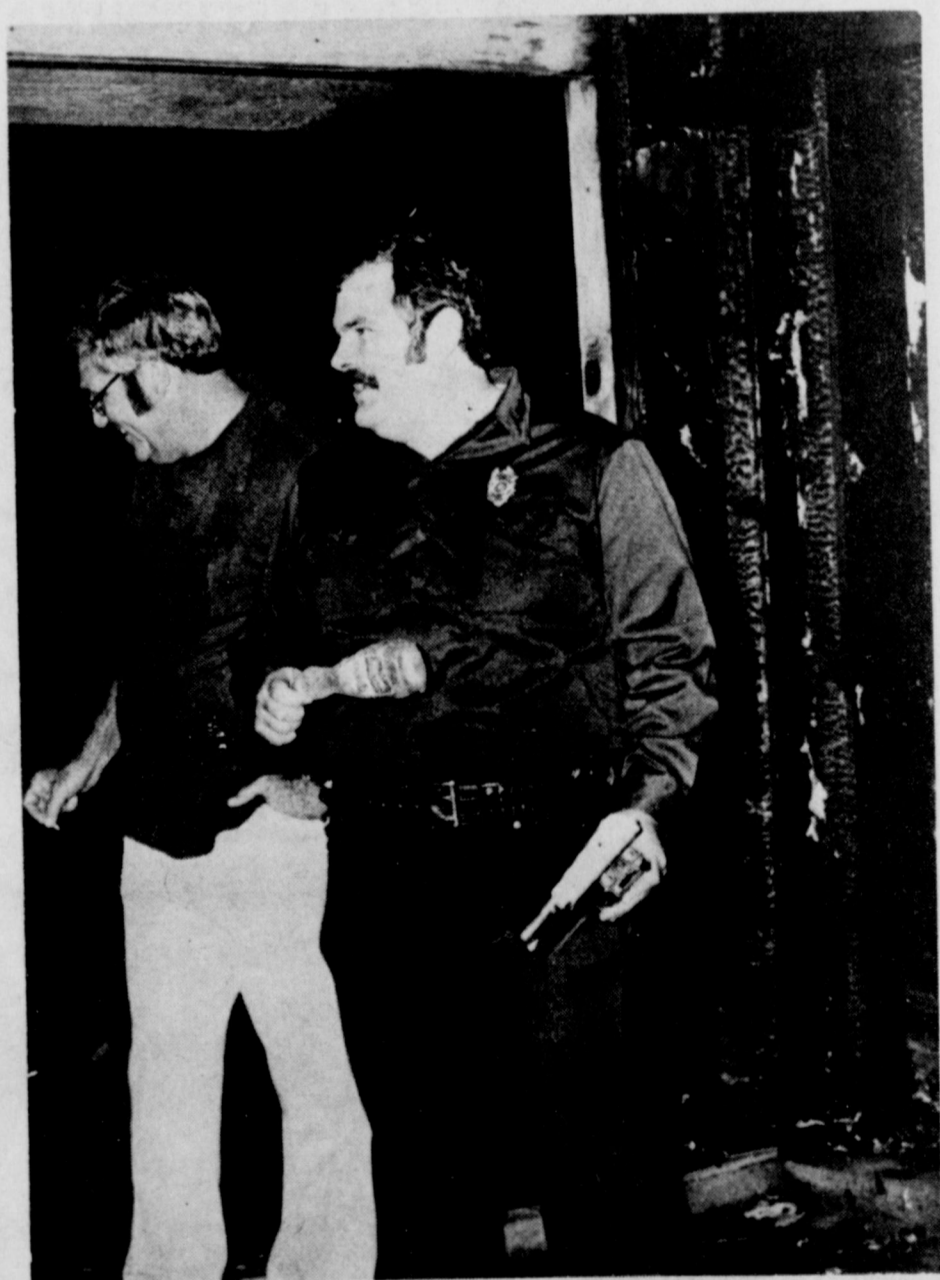
It was brought out that the signs are a stopgap, and that the city ultimately intends to go as far as Austin, if necessary, to obtain traffic control lights, such as were once at Wall, Yosemite and Victoria.

In addition, the resolution requests flashing lights be installed at a school crossing at Glenda Drive and Loop 370, to reduce speeds during school

crossing hours. Also passed was a suggestion from the Traffic Safety Council to install a four-way stop sign at Cash and Hawthorne, and a stop sign at First and Magnolia.

In other business, the council approved installation of a two-inch water line to Bogan Acres. Members stated they would not consider a larger line until a plat for development of the acreage is provided and approved.

Members approved the sale of an old police car to James Gilly, who bid \$350.

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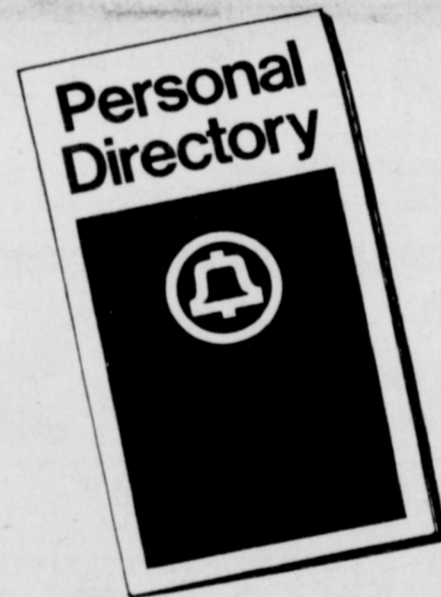

I felt like the pet that's chained up in the back yard, with the food bowl just inches out of reach, and starving to death.

Dolores and I went to Dallas last weekend. I thought part of the trip was to watch the Texas-Oklahoma football game in the Cotton Bowl. But I was wrong. I had assumed, incorrectly.

We had accepted two different invitations in the city for the weekend. One was to participate in a salute to the Texas Press Association, on Friday night, by Texas Power and Light. Then Saturday, we participated in the ribbon cutting ceremony to officially open the State Fair.

But, like I said, neither had tickets for the game. Nor were there any available, for less than \$50 each.

So we sat at a table under the shade of a tree near the east entrance to the stadium, and listened to the game over a radio someone had next to us.

Dolores came up with a couple of gems, as she often does.

"First time I've ever sat on the 50 yard line to listen to a radio program." And that one didn't have any mirth to its tone.

At one time during the game, an ambulance raced up to the entrance, and after a few minutes a woman was carried out on a stretcher.

With a gleam in her eye, Dolores turned to me and told me to run over there before they leave and "see if I can have her seat."

We weren't by ourselves, however. There may have been 50 people at the tables in the area where we sat, listening to radios. Others were sitting and lying on the grass around the stadium, by the hundreds, listening.

One group, apparently from Oklahoma, of about 10 persons set up their listening post right on the steps of the stadium entrance. They were so involved, and apparently disappointed at trailing in the score, one man got into a fight with a passer-by. He missed the most of one quarter, while police were talking to him.

Downtown Dallas is no place to be on a Friday before the big game. We stood out front of the Baker Hotel for just three or four minutes during the parade of fans, and were missed by about three feet by a full bottle of beer, apparently dropped from a window high above. No one was hit

by it, fortunately. It would have shattered a shoulder or split a skull, had it not missed a mark.

You hear about various measures of energy. There was enough human energy consumed, in walking up and down the sidewalks of Commerce Street, and cars driving and honking, to have produced energy enough to heat and light the entire city of Dallas a full month, just that one night.

I don't know what it is about the T-O football game that gets people to do what they do. There's not enough money to hire those same people to walk as many miles, as many hours, as they did.

The Battleship Texas could doubtlessly have floated in all the beer that was consumed by those walking that night!

There are all kinds of experiences, good and bad, people need to fulfill their lives. You know, like shouting at your mother-in-law. The T-O weekend in Dallas isn't always the best and most entertaining for you, but you'll never forget it!

**Parkey's problems continue**

Two days after being arrested and charged with conspiracy to distribute marijuana, former Iowa Park resident Dr. Paul Parkey was indicted Tuesday by a federal grand jury for allegedly receiving and concealing stolen cattle.

The federal grand jury, meeting in Wichita Falls, returned a two-count indictment charging Parkey with receiving and concealing 62 head of stolen cattle about March 1 transported from Oklahoma to Texas.

Second half of the federal indictment charges Parkey with receiving and concealing about 200 head of cattle stolen about March 20. The cattle allegedly were moved from Texas to New Mexico.

Parkey, a Vernon Physician, had been indicted earlier by a Wilbarger County grand jury for his part in an alleged cattle theft ring.

Two days earlier, on Sunday, Parkey was arrested after law enforcement officers recovered about 40 pounds of marijuana in a rural

area north of Vernon.

Parkey was arraigned Monday before U.S. Magistrate Gene Richie on charges of conspiracy to distribute marijuana.

Bond was set at \$50,000 and a preliminary hearing was scheduled for next Wednesday.

Parkey was arrested in his automobile at a Vernon intersection about 9 p.m. Sunday.

Three large plastic bags of marijuana were recovered from a rural cache north of Vernon in a field near the Hinds Community.

Involved in the operation were Wilbarger County Sheriff's Department, Department of Public Safety narcotics agents and federal narcotics agents.

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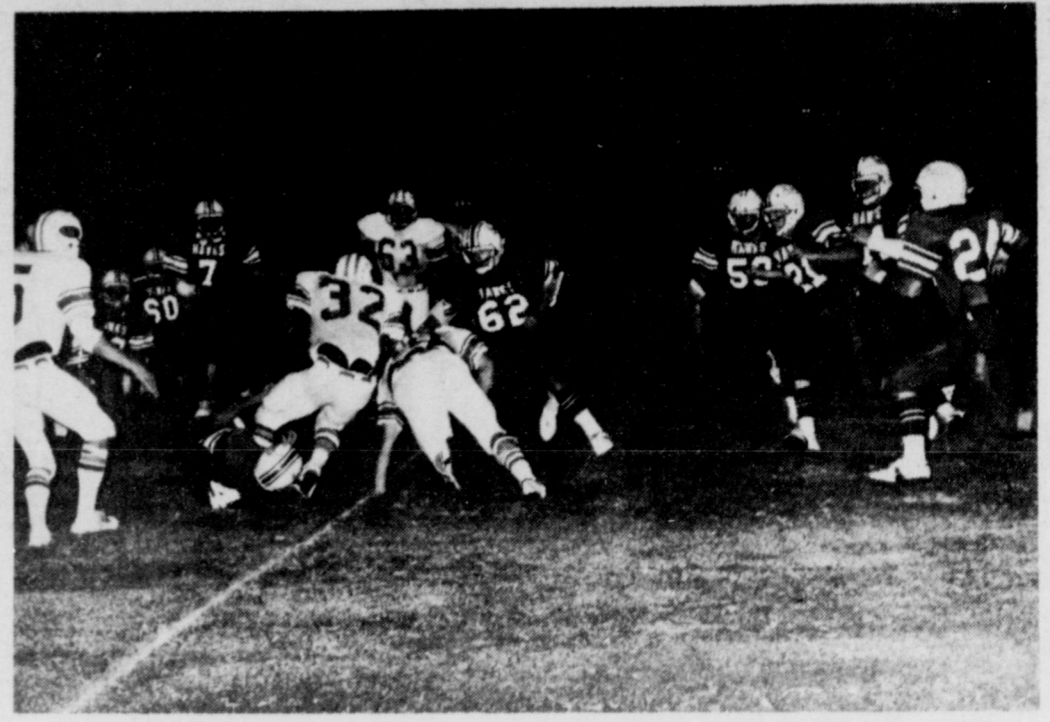
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HAWK DEFENSE closes in on Burk Burnett back during homecoming tilt.

# Burk spoils homecoming for young Hawks, 35-0

Although the defense supplied several opportune turnovers the Hawk offense just couldn't get off the launch pad Friday night when Burk Burnett spoiled Iowa Park's homecoming 35-0.

The Hawk defense had one of its better nights, hauling in three interceptions and recovering two Bulldog fumbles.

But on the other side of the statistician's notebook the Hawk offense was shackled to only 11 ground yards and 29 yards in the air.

Hawk quarterbacks David Wright and fourth quarter stand-in Bruce Holder combined to pass the ball 26 times. While receiver miscues shared some of the blame, Wright was able to find his mark twice and Holder completed the only other successful Hawk aerial.

The homecoming loss marked Iowa Park's second District 4-AAA defeat of the year.

Despite the fact that the Hawks accumulated a four-yard deficit as their first series, good fortune seemed to be in store midway through the first quarter when a 50-yard Bulldog touchdown was called back because of an illegal

procedure flag on the visitors.

But instead of eating up all those yards in one gulp, the Bulldogs came back for three quick first downs on a drive capped by a five-yard TD romp. The PAT failed.

Following Burk's kickoff, the Hawks again were unable to move the ball and were forced to punt for the second time of the night. Hawk Ron Taylor, who averaged 39.3 yards for the night, placed the Bulldogs on their own 33.

Despite two flags for 15 yards each, the Bulldogs found enough running room up the middle to keep the drive alive. Then the Bulldogs pulled off a textbook example of "the bomb" by scoring again on a 55-yard aerial attack. The PAT was good and the Hawks were behind by 13 at the end of the opening stanza.

A glimmer of hope came Iowa Park's way a dozen plays later when Hawk Mark Puder recovered a fumble when Burk bobbled a punt return giving the Hawks possession 31 yards deep into the Bulldog's backyard.

Andy Sitgraves and Kip Fuller were shut down on the ground. The only bright spot in the series was when Gary Blackerby snagged a

Wright pass, one of five attempts in the drive, for a 10-yard gain.

A few minutes later Keith Hillard hauled in a stray Bulldog pass. During the otherwise unsuccessful series Wright nailed Richard Dietrichson for a 10-yard gain. The Hawks were forced to punt, but Blaine Horton turned around and snagged another interception for the home town boys.

Horton's interception gave the Hawks possession on the Bulldog 30 with a skimpy 16 seconds showing on the clock for the half.

Wright was able to toss the ball four times before time ran out, however, none of the passes were completed.

An even more explosive Bulldog offense emerged after the half, and with less than a minute gone in the third quarter Burk found daylight and scored on a 57-yard sprint. The PAT was good.

The Hawks had their hands on the ball three plays until Wright was intercepted giving Burk possession on Iowa Park's 33.

Four plays later Burk scored on an 18-yard run, and the PAT was good.

Iowa Park's spirits were lifted when Hillard returned the Burk kickoff 50 yards, but Coach Pat Tone's birds just couldn't squeeze out a first down.

Burk came back to score on a 20-yard run, but a flag was thrown on the play and Iowa Park's Hillard and Burk's Bob Baily were sent to the sidelines by officials.

Asked why the two had been kicked out of the game,

a game official replied, "Rooster fighting."

Burk ended its scoring of the night on a two-point conversion.

The Hawks had two more

bright moments in the final period, once on a fumble recovery by Horton and again when Sonny Cook hauled in an interception.

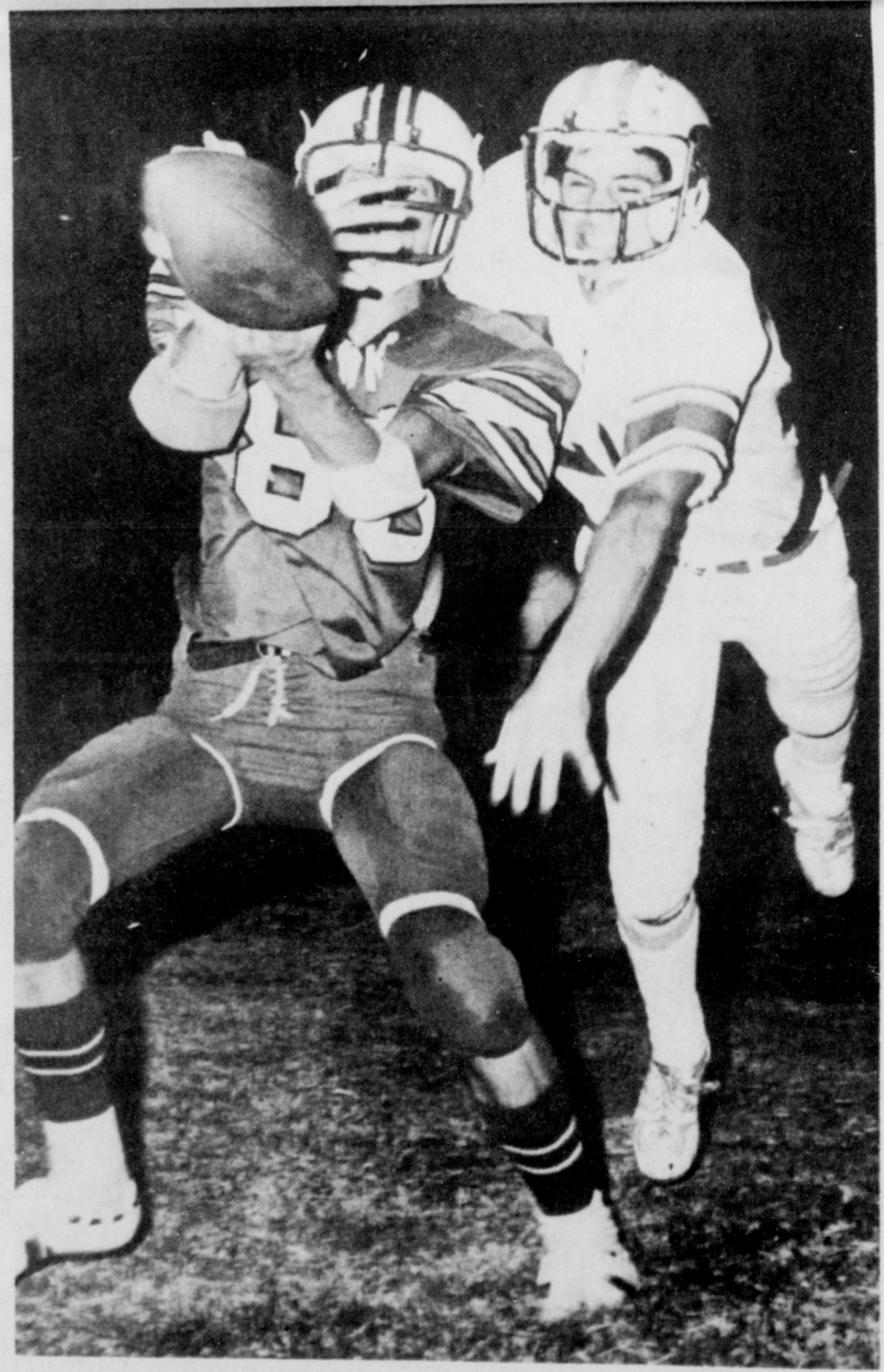
Both times the Hawks were

## Hawks drop homecoming game to Burkburnett

Things are looking bleak for Iowa Park football. The Hawks suffered more than a homecoming loss Friday night to Burkburnett. Two more starters have been hit with injuries. Senior offensive guard Mark Puder could be out for the year with a knee injury as he did not stay suited up for the second half. Senior middle guard Randy Gibson will play but will be hampered by severely bruised ribs.

Things started out bad for the Hawks and got worse. On the first play from scrimmage quarterback David Wright's pitch-out intended for tailback Andy Sitgreaves went wide and Sitgreaves had to fall on the

loose ball for a ten yard loss. Sitgreaves, with poor blocking all night, was the leading ground gainer with 20 yards on 13 carries. Wright who lost seven yards trying to run with the ball was also dropped for a minus 20 yards in sacks. Kip Fuller and Scott Hutson made up the rest of the running attack. Fuller picked up 11 yards on eight carries with Hutson carrying once for three yards.

The passing was also unsuccessful in picking up only 28 yards. Wright connected on only two of 18 passes picking up 21 yards. Bruce Holder was one out of five for seven yards. Richard Dietrichson was the leading

receiver for the Hawks hauling in two passes for 16 yards. Gary Blackerby was the other Hawk receiver catching one pass for 12 yards. All of the Hawk receivers either dropped the ball or it was over thrown. Two Hawk passes were intercepted as Wright and Holder threw one each.

Two areas of Hawk play improved. The Hawks punt ing game and their young defense.

Ronnie Taylor, a sophomore, replaced Jeff Nolan and averaged 36.3 yards per punt. Taylor was forced to punt eight times as the offense could only pick up four first downs in the game, three of them coming in the second half.

The Hawk defense was led by senior cornerback Keith Hillard. Hillard helped stop two Burkburnett drives, one coming on an important interception and then on a key tackle. Keith also returned a kick-off 55 yards taking the ball at the Hawk 12 and returning it to the Bulldog 41. Hillard was thrown out midway into the third quarter for allegedly fighting.

Other standouts for the Hawks include Blaine Horton with an interception and a fumble recovery. Sonny Cook also picked off a stray Bulldog pass. Puder before leaving the game fell on a fumbled Bulldog punt. One thing to note though is that they could not capitalize on any of these mistakes.

The Bulldogs looked like they were ready for the Hawks. On their first play from scrimmage Burks fleet tailback rumbled 51 yards for an apparent touchdown.

An illegal procedure call on the line of scrimmage nullified the play. That did not seem to get their spirits down. Three plays later the Bulldog fullback went over from the nine. They kept this up all night and gained 334 yards on the ground and 78 yards through the air.

Unlike the Hawks, Burkburnett capitalized on the two interceptions and a muffed punt by Sitgreaves.

The Hawks had one sustained drive early in the second quarter but it was stalled as two important third and fourth down passes from the 28 fell incomplete.

The Hawks are now 0-4 on the season and 0-1 in district. They travel to Weatherford next week.

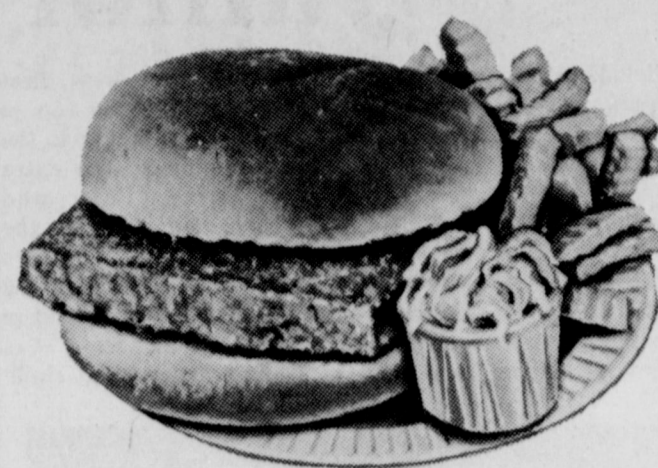

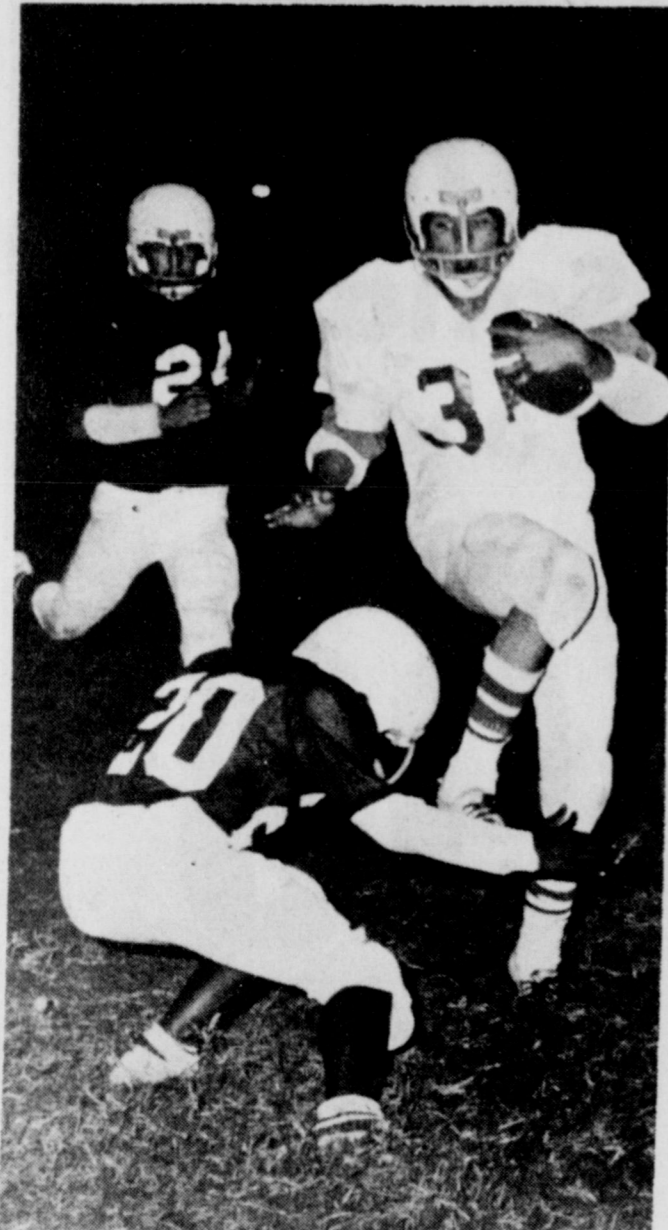

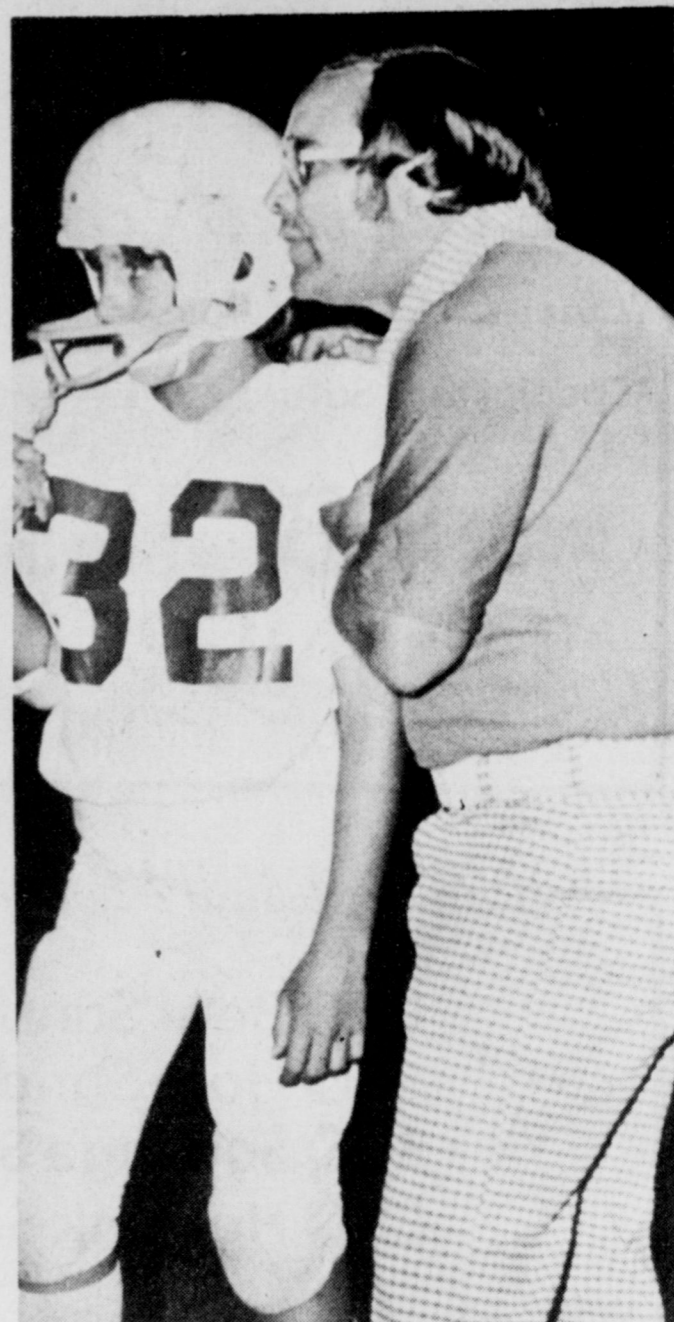

## School to seek bids to build band hall

Coe said Reinsch's choice and the only logical site of a new band hall would be east of the resource room.

In other action Monday night the board gave the

green light for preparations to be made to hold an open house of new school facilities. The open house is expected to be held Nov. 27.

Brackeen reported Mrs. Betty Park had contacted him concerning use of school facilities for some type of musical benefit to help raise money to purchase a "Jaws of Life" rescue equipment for Archer County.

Mrs. Park said \$3,100 had been earned toward the total purchase price of \$5,500.

The board decided to let Coe handle the request.

The board also decided to allow Coe to apply for

federal money available which could be used to pay for paving of a new parking lot at the school. Coe said \$43,000 in federal money is available.

The board approved a \$200 bid from James Lynch for an old school bus.

The board also approved a statement of philosophy and goals.

Although he had not been placed on the agenda, Glenn Wood approached the board with a complaint about students being bruised from spankings.

The board took no action after its discussion with Wood.

With expenses totaling \$161,814, the Holliday City Council approved its projected 1977-78 budget at Tuesday night's regular meeting.

Prepared by City Sec. Evon Carter, the proposed budget was accepted without changes and with the support of the full council. The budgetary period runs from July 31, 1977 through July 31, 1978.

Total income for the city was estimated at \$163,485 with \$86,906 coming from the general fund \$76,579 coming from the water department.

Expenses are expected to total \$161,814 with water department expenses projected to total \$75,499 while \$86,315 will be spent from the general fund.

The budget shows the city will have \$1,671 in contingencies.

In other business Tuesday night the council accepted the bid of Bill Bates Chevrolet, Inc. of Iowa Park for a new pickup truck for city crews. The bid approved was \$3,918.81 for a 1978 six cylinder Chevrolet half ton truck.

Other bids were submitted by Shaw Motor Co., Murphy Brothers, Moore Ford and Longhorn Chevrolet.

Glenn Wood appeared before the board to discuss building a new fire station on the Old Iowa Park Road. No action was taken on the issue.

Linda Willis asked the council how residents could judge the weather bad enough for them to place their trash containers near the street instead of in the alleys, which sometimes are impassable during wet weather.

Councilmen told Mrs. Willis it would be an individual judgment. They instructed Junior Akers, who is head of garbage collection for the city, to check both front yards and alleys for trash cans during questionable weather.

The council also discussed trash at Foodworld, water pumps, a gate to the sewer plant and voted to pay monthly bills.

The council concluded the meeting with a 30-minute executive session with city patrolman Dennis Rees.

Earlier in the meeting councilmen made remarks about Rees logging gas line used, the skimpy number of tickets he had written and his patrol habits.

No action was taken as a result of the executive session.

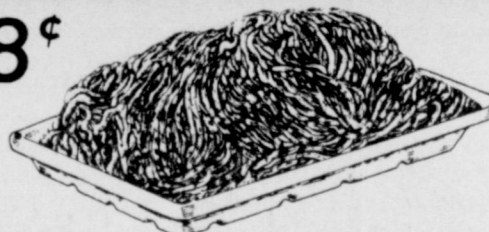

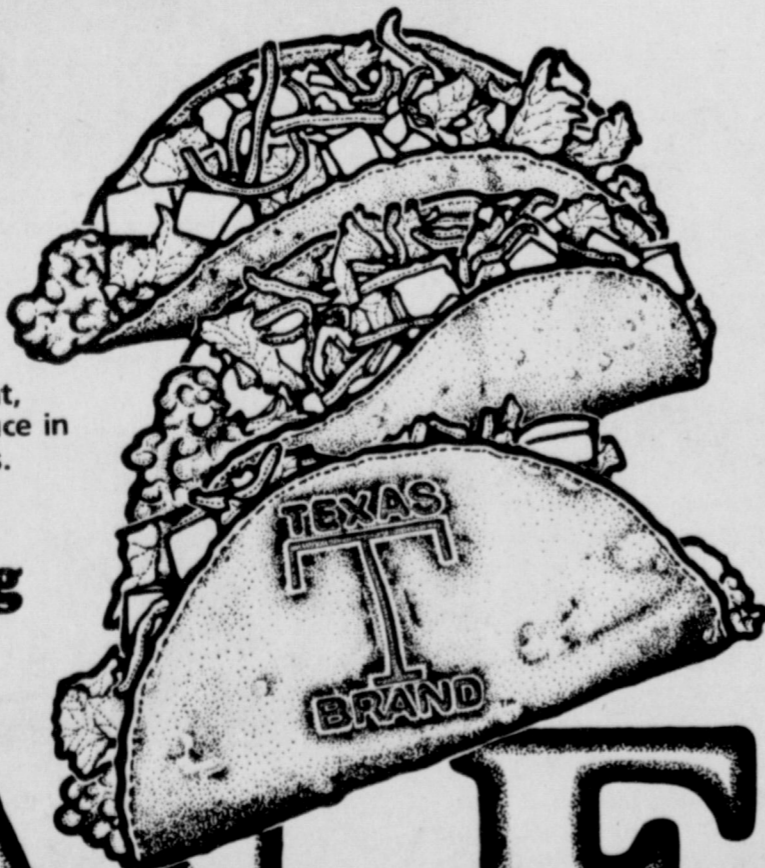
