Agencies funded by the United Way in Iowa Park include the Friendly Door and the Rec Center.



New voting system used in election

Seven proposed amendments to the Texas Constitution will not be the only issues at stake

Tuesday. Another election of sorts will help decide the method by which Wichita County voters cast their

ballots in the future. This year the standard 14 inches by 22 inch balot will be replaced by cards measuring 3 inches by 12 which will be fed

into Vote-A-Matics. The ballot card will be fed into a slot on the machine, and voters will mark their decisions by punching holes by corresponding alternatives.

It's all very simple, but for those who fear they might punch a wrong hole in their ballot, the system allows room for mistakes.

If a voter incorrectly punches his card, all he must do is ask the election judge for another card.

"They can have up to three cards," according to Jerry Padgett, assistant county clerk. After voters have marked their ballots, they will be asked

to reply to a questionnaire which will quiz them on whether they enjoyed the new voting machine, was it easy to use, would they like Wichita County to use such a system in future elections and

age of the voter. Wichita County Commissioners Court is expected to use the questionnaire as a basis of their decision whether to buy the

The county is renting the system for \$3,850. Purchase of the entire option -- including voting machines and a computer to count the cards, would run about \$135,000, Padgett said.

True test of the system's effectiveness will come on Tuesday night when election judges report to Wichita County Courthouse to feed their ballots into the computer for counting.

The computer can tabulate 600 punch cards per minute, considerably faster than individually counting the old, bulky paper ballots.

"A 20 per cent turnout is what we're looking for," Padgett predicted, explaining Wichita County has 60,000 registered

Since the low voter turnout is predicted, persons in Iowa Park's Precincts 32 and 33 both will cast ballots at the ASCS office here. Although a single polling place will be used, ballots for the two precincts will be kept separate.

Precinct 32 voters will have access to five of the voting machines, and four machines will be available to avoid a bottle neck of voters in Precinct 33.

Voting hours will run from 7 a.m. until 7 p.m. Tuesday.

Elsewhere in the area, voting machines will be set for use at Valley View School in Precinct 34, at the Community House in Pleasant Valley for Precinct 60 and at the Kamay Community Hall in Precinct 35.

Absent any public office races

Amendment No. 1 would change the court of criminal appeals from a court consisting of four judges and a presiding judge to a court consisting of eight judges and a presiding judge. The proposal would authorize the enlarged court of nine judges to sit in panels of three judges for the purpose of hearing cases with two judges constituting a quorum and the concurrence of two judges necessary for a

Arguments for Amendment No. 1 are that immediate unburdening of the court of

criminal appeals is a necessity to achieve speedy justice, and that the proposal provides the most efficient and economical method of relieving the pressure on Texas' system of appellate review.

Arguments against the first proposal come from some authorities who believe the expansion of the court cannot solve the case load problem and favor two levels of review for criminal cases by providing for intermediate appellate review of criminal cases.

Amendment No. 2 would authorize the Veteran's Land Board to issue and sell an additional \$200-million in bonds. The additional \$200-million in bonds or obligations authorized would extend the maximum amount of bonds or obligations to the state for the Veterans' Land

Fund from the existing \$500million to \$700-million. Also, the unmarried surviving spouse of a veteran who died in the line of duty would also become eligible to apply for purchase of a tract through the board.

Primary argument in favor of the second proposal is that in order to continue the program and to extend its benefits to those veterans who were eligible under the program but for whom money was unavailable for a loan because of the fund's depletion, it should be approved.

Surviving spouses should be given the same privileges of acquiring land for themselves as has previously been available

only to veterans. Those against the second proposal claim the federal government already provides

Time is running short for wheat growers who are thinking about trying Carby ne for chemical control of wild oats. Carbyne is a selective herbicide which gives approximately 85 to 90

percent control of wild oats, provided the application is made at the right time.

Timing of application is critical. The material must be applied while the wild oats are in the two leaf stage. It won't work in either the one leaf or the three leaf stage. The wild oat plant develops a leaf every 4-5 days. If a wild oat plant has 11/2 leaves on Monday, it may have 21/2 leaves by Friday, thus making it too old to spray. This means daily inspections are required as soon as the wheat comes up. Dr. Allen Wiese of the Bushland Research Center says the wild oats are usually ready to spray about 1-11/2 weeks after the wheat comes up.

The Carbyne is applied at the rate of 3 pints per acre. This represents a cost of \$6.60 per acre plus the cost of application. I am interested in establishing a demonstration using wild oat control chemicals. I can make arrangement for the chemicals with the grower making the application. We will need to leave a check plot in the treated field. Any



PUC ruling to affect local rates

The Texas Public Utilities Commission (PUC) yesterday approved a system-wide rate increase of 15 percent for Texas Electric Service Company.

TESCo had requested an increase of 23.6 percent, which would generate

an additional \$79.1-million revenue for the firm. The PUC increase reduced the new income to \$44-million annually.

At the meeting of the Iowa Park city council last week, members

passed an ordinance setting rates here which would allow an 8.3 percent increase in rates. This will be changed due to the PUC ruling, but at what time is not now known. The council does not have anther meeting scheduled until Nov. 14.

Proposed Amendments generous benefits for veterans. incarcerating persons who have and compensation of veterans is not been tried or convicted as well as incarcerating persons on the basis of a past conviction for which they have already been punished.

Amendment No. 4 would authorize the legislature to provide for tax relief for cultural, historical or natural history resources -- regardless of ownership -- as means to encourage preservation.

Tax relief for these resources would contribute significantly to their preservation, according to proponents.

Opposing arguments are that the proposal would erode the tax bases of school districts and local governments, and that special tax treatment for one group would be inequitable and discriminatory and would result in shifting a greater tax burden to those who are not granted such exemptions or relief.

Amendment No. 5 would authorize producers of poultry, livestock and other raw agricultural commodities to form associations and collect assessments on their product sales.

Supporters say the amendment would benefit all producers of a particular commodity who decide to establish a board and levy the assessment.

Arguments against Amendment No. 5 claim it would take money out of the hands of the individual producer who could better conduct his own research and market development.

Amendment No. 6 would give the legislature power to authorize state and national banks to exercise banking and discounting privileges and other privileges which are incidental to banking by use of electronic terminals at remote locations.

Arguments in favor of the proposal are that electronic fund transfer terminals would provide

the consumer with a convenient optional method of payment. A consumer would have a choice of paying cash or by check, credit card or electronic fund transfer. Routine business and retail transactions would be speeded up and paperwork and mailing costs would be reduced. Insufficient funds to cover benefitting the merchant and saving the customer from a potential overdraft charge.

Opponents says the cost of installing a network of electronic fund transfer terminals would probably be passed on to the consumer, raising prices. Electronic fund transfers would be recorded instantaneously while checks often take several days to clear. Mixing the two systems would complicate the balancing of checkbooks and lead to inadvertent overdrafts.

Amendment No. 7 would change the name of the State Judicial Qualifications Commission to the State Commission on Judicial Conduct and would change the membership of the commission to include four citizen members instead of three and add one justice of the peace.

Arguments for the change say the legislature and the electorate created the commission and established a method of disciplining judges which provides due process of law for officeholders. Discipline by the commission and removal from office by the supreme court on recommendation by the commission is more economical and a better use of manpower than impeachment.

Opposition says judges are elected to public office and a position of public trust by the people and expansion of the power of the commission and the supreme court to discipline and remove judges undermines the will of the electorate.

a federal rather than state responsibility. Another argument is that the program was designed to benefit veterans, not their families. Amendment No. 3 would allow

a district court to deny bail to a person accused of a felony committed while he was on bail for a prior felony indictment or to a person who has been previously convicted of a felony and is accused of using a deadly weapon in the commission of a second felony.

The amendment would prevent career criminals from taking advantage of the time between indictment and trial to commit additional offenses while on bail, is a primary argument in favor of Amendment No. 3. The proposal also would eliminate the danger to the public which exists when a person with a felony record who commits a subsequent felony involving a firearm is released on bail.

Chief arguments against the amendment is that the purpose of releasing a defendant on bail is to preserve the presumption of innocence while ensuring that he will appear for trial. The proposal would provide for

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Final two minutes fatal; Mineral Wells edges Hawks

A nip-and-tuck contest that seemed to be shifting favorably toward the Hawks took a sharp, ill-fated turn during the fading minutes here Friday night as the Hawks choked down a 28-12 loop loss to Mineral Wells.

Only on the scoreboard did the Hawks appear dominated, bouneing back in the second and third quarters to overcome the biggest chunk of a 14-point deficit built by the Rams early in the game.

It was two interceptions in the final 11/2 minutes that proved fatal to Coach Pat Tone's birds, who dropped to 0-8 on the season as they fought unsuccessfully to crawl out of the District 4-AAA cellar.

Good fortune came to the Hawks at the outset when Terry Daniels, who went both ways as quarterback and defensive back, surfaced with a Ram fumble on the second play of the night.

The Hawks were unable to sustain a drive and were forced to punt.

Ten plays later with half the first quarter remaining the Rams staged a 73-yard drive that ended on a 20-yard TD toss from Odes Mitchell to Melvin Ray.

Ray booted the PAT and the Rams pulled out ahead from Mineral Wells' 43. 7-0 with 5:49 showing in the first stanza.

AN ORDINANCE REGU-LATING THE COLLEC-TION AND DISPOSAL OF TRASH AND GARBAGE, DEFINING CERTAIN TE-RMS, AND PROVIDING A PENALTY FOR VIOLA-TION THEREOF.

BE IT ORDAINED by the City Council of the City of Holliday, Texas.

I. DEFINITION

1.01. The term "premises" as used in this Ordinance shall be taken to mean business houses, boarding houses, offices, theaters, hotels, restaurants, cafes, eating houses, tourist residences, vacant lots, and other places within the city limits of the City of Holliday, Texas, where refuse, either garbage or rubbish, accum-

1.02. The term "standard users" as used in this Ordinance shall be taken to mean any standard single family unit residence in and of the City of Holliday, Texas.

1.03. The term "business and commercial users" as used in this Ordinance shall be taken to mean any premises which conducts a standard business or commercial activity in and of the City of Holliday, Texas.

1.04. The term "industrial users" as used in this Ordinance shall be taken to mean any premises which is actively engaged in the business of manufacturing, processing or otherwise constructing goods or materials or any form of mineral development in and of the City of Holliday, Texas.

1.05. The term "refuse" shall be interpreted to mean all waste, including garbage and rubbish.

1.06. The term "garbage" as used in this Ordinance shall mean any putrescible waste, except sewage and body waste, including all meat, vegetable and fruit refuse, and carcasses of small dead animals and dead fowls from any premises within the city limits.

1.07. The term "rubbish" as used in this Ordinance shall mean tin cans, bottles, papers, tree limbs (which shall be cut into lengths not exceeding 3 feet), etc., from any premises within the city limits.

1.08. "City Health Officer" as used herein shall mean the City Health Officer of the City of Holliday, Texas, or his authorized agent.

II. DUTY OF ALL USERS 2.01. It shall be the duty of every person, firm or corporation owning, managing, operating, leasing or renting any premises, any place where garbage or rubbish accumulates, to provide, and, at all times, to maintain in good order and repair on any said premises, a portable container or

shall be made of any material not easily corrodible, rodent and fly proof, with a tight-fitting lid which shall not be removed except when depositing or removing the contents of the receptacle, and with handles on the sides, and of sufficient capacity and in sufficient numbers to accommodate and securely keep all the garbage and rubbish that may accumulate between collections; provided, that each such container shall have a capacity of not less than 20 gallons nor more than 30 gallons. Provided further, that there shall in no instance be a total capacity of more than 120 gallons on any one premises. Provided further, all containers shall be kept clean and free from accumulation of any substance remaining attached to inside of container which would attract or breed flies, mosquitos or any other insect. No filled container

all users to place the daily accumulations of garbage and rubbish in the container or containers as required above, and it shall be the duty of every user placing garbage in any such containers to eliminate as far as possible all water and liquid from such garbage and to securely wrap garbage in paper before placing same in such container. Provided further that all containers shall firmly fixed in a stationary position with tops thereto firmly fixed to each container so as not to allow the contents of said containers to be turned over and spilled upon the ground.

ulations of rubbish, such as tree limbs, paper boxes, and scrap lumber which cannot conveniently be placed in the containers required under this Ordinance shall be gathered together and tied, or staked in compact bundles and placed in a location easily assessible for the collector. Such collection will require an assessed fee over and above the normal tax for garbage collection service. A reasonable amount of material, such as scrap lumber and fire wood, may be stored on the premises but it shall be raked and stacked 10 inches above the

2.03. All ordinary accum-

2.04. The City of Holliday, Texas, shall collect from the standard users of the City not less than once weekly and from the business and commercial users and the industrial users of the City on a regular basis as contracted by each individu-

containers, for refuse, which al user, all garbage and rubbish; provided it shall be the duty of any person in possession or control of any premises to place the containers as required above, in a location easily accessible for the collector as directed by the City Health Officer. Provided further that all collections, unless exception be granted by the City Health Officer, shall be in the alley immediately behind each and every user.

III. Exclusions to Garbage

Service 3.01. The places of excessive accumulations of garbage and rubbish, such as for fowl, may be excluded from the service provided by the City Garbage Department and such accumulations shall be removed and disposed at the expense of the owner or person having same in charge, provided, that the owner or persons having such accumulations in charge shall secure from shall exceed 100 pounds in the City Health Department a written permit for removal 2.02. It shall be the duty of and disposal of same. Said permit shall be issued only after a said Health Officer has satisfied himself that the licensee is capable of complying with the requirements of this Ordinance. The permit may be revoked by the City Health Officer when deemed necessary to the

public welfare. 3.02. Heavy dead animals, such as cows, horses, and mules, shall be removed and disposed of at the expense of the owner or persons having same in charge and by the method directed by the City Health Officer.

3.03. Heavy accumulations, such as brush, broken concrete, ashes, sand or gravel, automobile frames, dead trees, and other bulky, heavy materials, shall be disposed of at the expense of the owner or person controlling same under the directions of the City Health Officer.

3.04. Manure from cowlots, horse stables, poultry yards, pigeon lofts, and other animal or fowl pens, and waste oils from garages or filling stations, shall be removed and disposed of at the expense of the person controlling same in the manner by the method directed by the City Health

IV. Prohibitions

garbage or rubbish or any refuse material in any street or alley within the city limits thereby. or the disposal of such refuse at any place within the city limits, except as DAY OF AUGUST, 1977. previously directed by this Ordinance or except at the City Disposal Ground, or at such other places as may be

directed by the City Health Officer, is prohibited.

4.02. The meddling with refuse containers or in any way pilfering, scattering contents or junking in any alley or street within the city limits is prohibited.

4.03. The burning of any garbage, rubbish or any kind of junk or waste material is specifically PROHIBITED AND MADE UNLAWFUL by this Ordinance within the city limits of the City of Holliday, Texas.

4.04. The collection of garbage or rubbish or any kind of junk within the city limits is prohibited except as provided for in this Ordinance.

V. Cost of Service 5.01. There shall be charged, assessed and collected from each residential premises within the city limits a monthly amount for each standard user. The business and commercial user will be taxed and so charged an amount equal to the standard user multiplied times the proportionate excess over and above the standard user. The industrial user shall contract directly with the City for the garbage collection service.

5.02. The City Council shall, from time to time, establish the standard users' rate and so declare such rate by resolution. Said resolution to be made a part of this Ordinance and, for all intents and purposes, be declared one and the same. VI. Violation

6.01. Any person violating any of the provisions of this Ordinance shall be deemed guilty of a misdemeanor and, upon conviction thereof, shall be fined in any sum of not less than Ten (\$10.00) Dollars nor more than Two Hundred (\$200.00) Dollars, and each day that any such person shall violate any other provision of this Ordinance shall constitute a separate offense and be punishable as such.

VII. Enacting Clauses 7.01. This Ordinance shall be cumulative of all other sanitary ordinances or regulations of the City of Holliday, Texas, unless in conflict with the terms of said ordinances and regulations, in such case the terms of this Ordinance shall

7.02. That if any section, paragraph, sentence, clause, or phrase of this Ordinance be declared unconstitutional 4.01. The placing of or invalid for any reason, the remainder of this Ordinance shall not be effected



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


