# Council approves system to improve trash problem

Iowa Park City Council hopes it has found a solution to the omnipresent problems created by its current method of collecting garbage.

Monday night the council voted to purchase trucks and containers necessary to convert the city to a containerized garbage collection system. The new system could be in effect by March or April and will eliminate the use of aluminum garbage cans.

In the wake of several months of study, the decision was made Monday night after more than an hour's debate.

Alderman C.A. Hicks surfaced as the chief antagonist early in the debate, however, he voted in favor of the conversion, making it a unanimous council endorsement.

City Administrator Gene Britton outlined the primary reasons for adopting the modern technique of collecting residential and commercial garbage.

A containerized system would eliminate most of the trash-related complaint calls received by city hall, Britton said.

"Dogs cannot turn over and scatter trash, containers reduce fly and rodent problems and the volume of waste that can be deposited in a

container allows us to postpone collection during bad weather, reducing the damage to alleys caused by the trucks when it is wet," Britton said.

"The two primary disadvantages are a person may have to cross the alley to deposit trash, and in those areas with no alleys, the containers must be set in the front yard," the city administrator pointed out in his recommendation.

But Hicks said he saw several discrepancies in the proposal.

"The people ought to have a voice. We've been going along without it for 100 years. Ninety more days isn't going to make that much difference," Hicks said in his bid for the citizenry to decide the issue during the next regular municipal election.

"Do you want to ask them if they want to continue the sanitation department at the same time?" Mayor Johnny Crawford countered.

Hicks also questioned the cost of instituting such a system.

Over a five-year period, the mayor said, the containerized system should cost the city \$387,000. During the same five years it would cost the city \$419,000 to continue collecting garbage by the current method.

"We gotta do what's best for the entire town," said Alderman Joe Singer.

The people of Iowa Park elected the city council to make such decisions, the mayor added.

Obviously searching for support, Hicks indicated there was a man in the audience who could well represent the average Iowa Park resident.

Asked his feelings on the proposal, Virgil Woodfin replied, "I'd go for it." He said he had relatives in Amarillo who like the containerized garbage collection system utilized in that Panhandle city.

When the mayor asked for a vote on the issue, it was a unanimous decision to adopt a containerized system.

"Mr. Hicks, I certainly appreciate your support," Crawford said.

The council approved the bid submitted by EMCO. For \$174,150, EMCO will supply the city with two

trucks and 700 containers.

A truck can be operated by one man, who from the truck cab, will be able to manipulate the mechanism to pickup and dump the large containers which will come in three-cubic-yard and 1 1/2-cubic-yard sizes.

There will be a 90-120 day delivery time, and the council asked the mayor and Britton to investigate for the best type of financing available.

In other action Monday night the council celebrated the completion of its new meeting facilities which also will serve as the meeting place for boards and commissions and the municipal court.

City Attorney Mike Hubbard said the new facilities were emblematic of the current council's consciousness in municipal operations.

"This room will lend itself to the dignity of these meetings," Crawford said.

The council voted to extend for 90 days its lease contract with Carl Catlin concerning his cement facilities, and approved a lease with the Iowa Park Recreational Activities Club for the old youth center.

Although it was not an endorsement, the council voted to allow Bill Guthrie to approach city employees concerning cancer insurance.

The final plat of Block 169, Original Townsite, was approved.

Resignations of Mrs. Dean Miller from the Parks Board and Dr. Erwin Soell and Tom Neely from the Planning and Zoning Commission were accepted.

The council appointed A.L. Emils to fill the Parks Board vacancy. Replacements to the planning and zoning Commission are to be made by the mayor. The council will review the appointments at a later date.

The council accepted the resignation of Jim Greg from the police department.

Although there were no recommendations to fill the police vacancy, the council decided to allow Britton and the mayor make an appointment to ease the department's load during the holidays. The council will take action on their selection when it meets Jan. 9.

The council voted to hire Biggs & Matthews engineers to study the feasibility and expense of extending sewer service to older parts of the city.

Aldermen voted to ask for bids on a street paving machine, and approved budget adjustments.

The council also discussed problems with water leaks and sewage disposal system.

## Pop music to be included in Christmas band concert

Several selections of pop music will be incorporated into the Christmas concerts of Iowa Park junior high and high school bands scheduled for 7 p.m. tonight in the high school auditorium.

Under the direction of Mark Cartwright, the junior high band will perform "Winchester March," "Windy," "The Gospel Train," "Still, Still, Still," "Saint Nicholas Suite," "The Christmas Suite," "Little Drummer Boy," and "Three Christmas Carols."

The high school band, under the baton of David Mooney, will perform "Summer of '42," "A Motown Portrait," "Tribute to Bacharach and David," "Westside Story," "Sugar Sugar," "The Parade," "Little Bell Fantasy," "Rudolph the Red," "Winter Wonderland," and "Cantique de Noel."

All four of Iowa Park's junior high and high school bands and choirs will be featured in concert at 7 p.m. Tuesday at the MSU-Burns Fantasy of Lights display in Wichita Falls.

## Testimony gets underway in missing grain case

Testimony from farmers and a former employee were heard Monday morning in a Wichita Falls federal courtroom where Henry C. Johnson of Iowa Park is facing charges of violating federal grain storage and transportation laws.

As the trial entered its third day, chief prosecutor Asst. U.S. Atty. Ron

Eddins said he could not estimate how many more days of testimony would be heard by the five woman, seven man jury.

Eddins said he had possibly 30 more witnesses to place on the stand before relinquishing to Howard Martin, H.C. Johnson's defense attorney.

H.C. Johnson is charged with

interstate transportation of stolen grain. He also is charged with aiding and abetting his missing brother, Robert Johnson, who reportedly fell from a fishing boat and drowned Jan. 3 in the Gulf of Mexico.

Eddins is trying to prove farmers were cheated out of their grain by the Geronimo Elevator Co., owned by

H.C. Johnson, and Robert Johnson Grain and Molasses Co., owned by the missing brother.

Defense attorney Martin, however, is arguing the two firms are separate entities and should not be considered together.

Testimony from two witnesses may prove damaging to H.C. Johnson.

Bridwell Meeks, former accountant for Robert Johnson Grain and Molasses Co. testified Tuesday that the two companies essentially operated as one.

Wednesday morning the prosecuti-

on called William Ryan Kelly of Olney to the stand. Now employed by a convenience food store in Olney, Kelly said he was hired by Robert Johnson in 1973, but that he had worked for and been paid by both companies.

Kelly said in 1976 he kept books at Holliday and Pankin Center for grain handling facilities of Robert Johnson Grain and Molasses Co. Kelly said he also worked for Geronimo Elevator Co. at Eads, Colo.

Similar stories were told Wednesday morning by eight Oklahoma

farmers, who had taken their harvested 1976 wheat crops to Geronimo Elevator Co. facilities at Grandfield, Geronimo and Cookietown, Okla.

Most of the farmers called to the witness stand said they had never been paid for wheat placed in warehouse storage through Geronimo Elevator Co.

Ironically, it was a year ago this month that area farmers began their unsuccessful quest for money owed them by the Johnson family grain operations.

## Trustees approve airconditioners

The Iowa Park school board Tuesday evening approved bids to aircondition four classrooms at Kidwell Elementary, made some personnel changes, and were told of the district's finances "I think you are in good shape."

Iowa Park Airconditioning was low bidder to place units at Kidwell, and thus complete the cooling of every classroom in the five-campus system.

The bid was \$4,996, of which half will be paid by the school and the balance by the Kidwell Parent-Teacher Association. The only other bid on the project was \$5,140 by a Wichita Falls firm.

Trustees accepted the resignation of Beverly Parker, who has been girls' junior varsity basketball coach at the high school. Sharon Winstead was hired to replace her in class, and

Ron Moore assumed her coaching duties, with a salary adjustment of those funds which had been allocated to Mrs. Parker's coaching salary.

Seven employees were hired, all to be paid by federal funds through the Title VI program. They are Rosanne Clark, Sherri Pryor, Pamela Pitts, Dalton Gent, Cindy Smith, Wilbert Allums and Gayle Patterson.

Accountant Nayland Smith reviewed the audits of the past year and a three-year period which was required by the Texas Education Agency.

Concerning the past year's audit, Smith said there were two areas where he could not give a qualified approval, but neither was serious nor was there any loss of funds.

The areas concerned coding problems, and keeping current records on fixed assets.

He pointed out that one major improvement was noted, that being that the depository, State National Bank, had consistently maintained adequate pledges to cover the school's highest periods of deposits throughout the year.

"I think you are in good shape," he told trustees of their financial position.

Reports were given by Mrs. Bob Dawson, on the school's Right to Read program, and by Tom Venhaus, on the computer assisted instruction program, which will be continued until the Christmas holidays.

Trustees approved purchases to be made from \$2,846 released by the federal government under Title IV. They include two 16 mm projectors, library books, and audio visual cassettes.

The January board meeting was changed from the 10th to 17th due to conflict with a scheduled educators' conference.

In two other reports, it was pointed out that 46.4 per cent of the current roll taxes were collected, and 79 per cent of the students ate at the cafeterias during last month.

Iowa Park police are investigating the alleged theft of a billfold from a locker at Iowa Park High School.

Anthony York told officers he thought his billfold was taken from a gymnasium at IPHS last Friday.

Absent his driver's license and \$35 in cash, York's billfold was found later at Seymour Highway and Inwood in Wichita Falls.

Police received a report Saturday from C.H. Bradley that exterior Christmas lights had been stolen from 621 W. Clara.

Jimmy Miller reported last Thursday the theft of soft drink cases from the yard at 411 W. Ruby.

"The Message of Christmas" was the theme of a devotion contributed by Mrs. Wilbert Wynn.

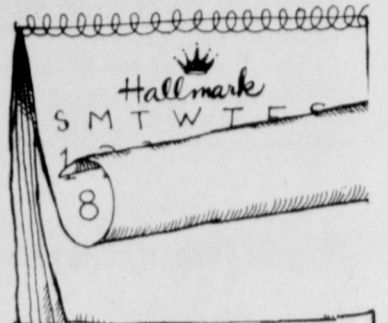

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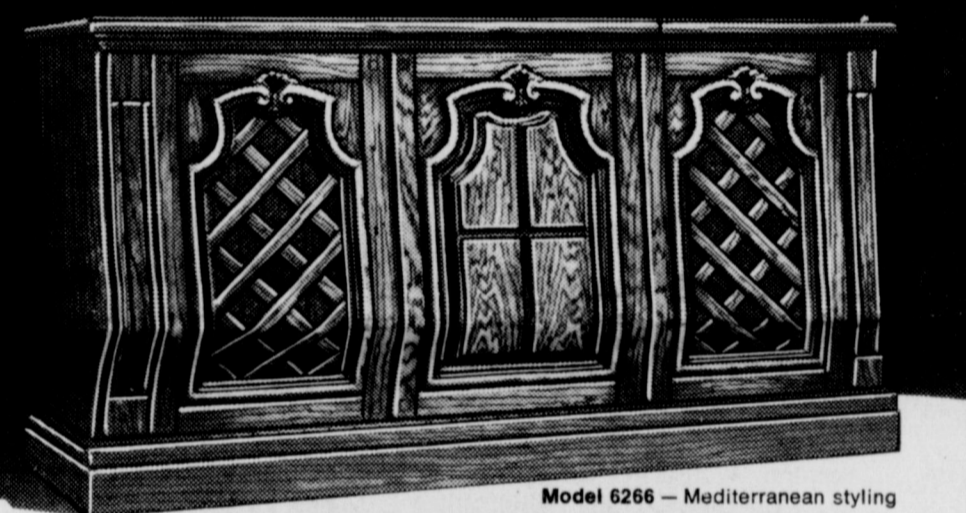
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## Playlet highlights Tuesday UMW meeting

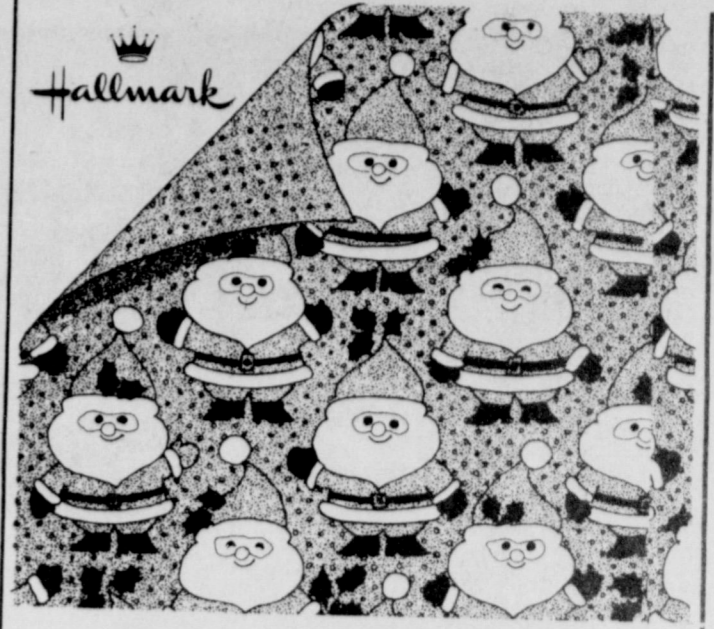

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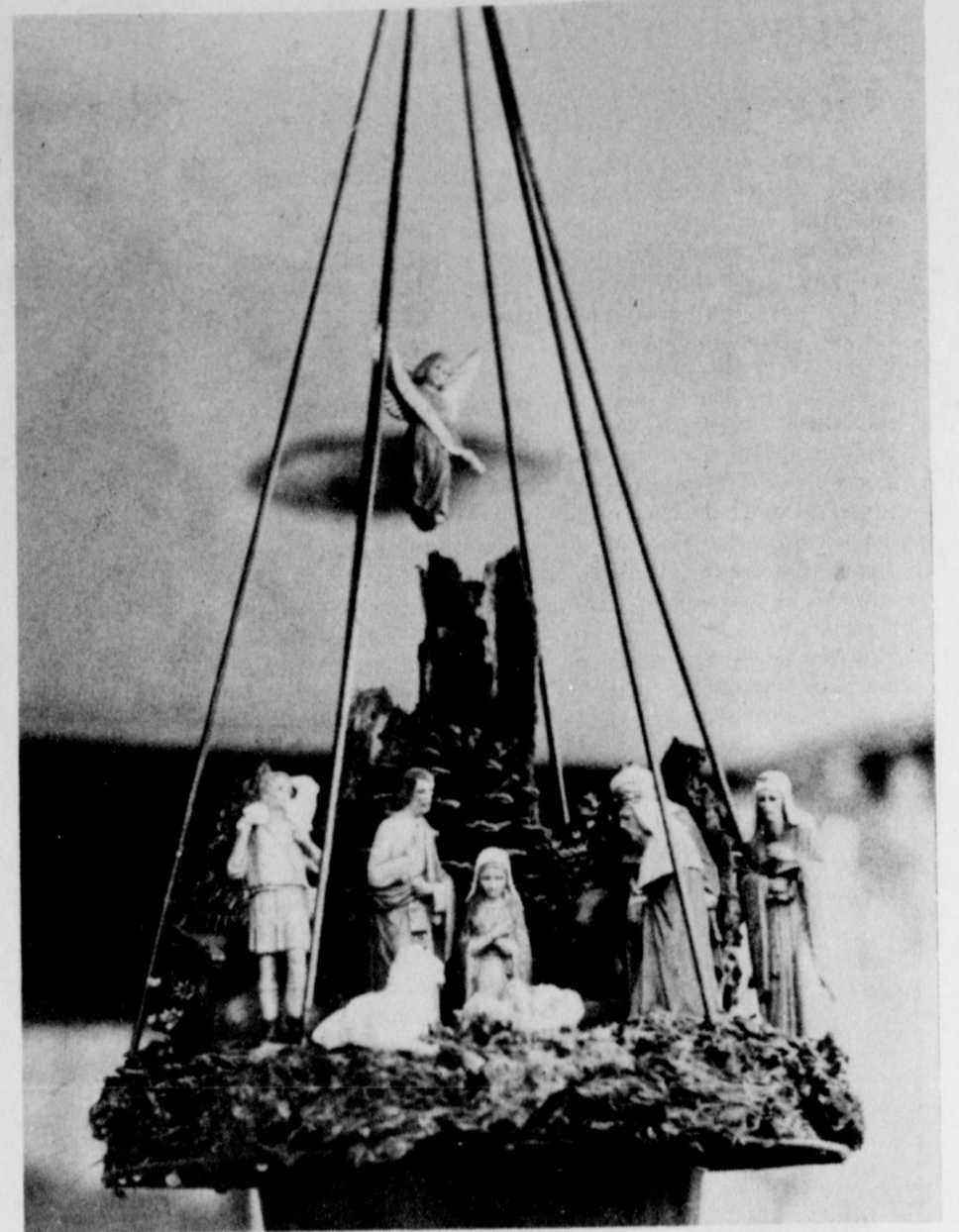

Visiting the homes will be somewhat like a symphony where a different theme is discovered in each place with each harmonizing to make a beautiful melody. The homes on the tour are those of Messrs. and Mmes. O.N. Newman, G.R. Rusk, Bill Bates and Joe Singer. Refreshments will be served at the Singer home.

Today, we crack the door to each home just a wee bit to give only a hint of the holiday beauty and happiness within and to encourage visitors to open the doors wider where they will be greeted by the host and hostess and invited to journey through Christmas wonderland.

The den of the Newman home was chosen for the focal point of decorative interest for this story. The deer theme is predominant

and has given opportunity for use and display of the antlered animal figurines collected by their daughter, Stacie. The fireplace area is enough to delight visitors beyond measure. Garlands of cedar caught up with lush velvet bows swag above the mantel. A Spanish theme is depicted in the hearth appointments which include Spanish wrought-iron containers, wooden candlesticks brought from Mexico combined with velour birds, fruits, nuts, pine cones and boxwood. A Spanish treasure chest filled with pine cones is an interesting addition to the hearth

decorations. In one area a large gold papier mache deer set apart with a spray of fruits and nuts commands interest as it wanders through a woodland scene. The tall blue spruce tree is spotlighted in the area exciting interest with its red and crystal ornaments which include discs, jewelry, bells and prisms.

At the Rusk home, it was again difficult to get far away from the tree and fireplace. A western theme is noted in decoration for the flocked green spruce tree that touches the ceiling.

Here again, Judy, the Rusk daughter, had first choice in dressing the tree. She chose to use novel burlap cotton sacks filled with cotton bolls, checked gingham baskets holding berries, embroidered burlap cornsilk dolls dressed in gingham, wooden horses, birds and red and green twinkle lights.

The fireplace mantel is centered with a wicker basket holding spruce, pine cones and ceramic Wise Men figurines. Garlands of boxwood extend from the central decoration to large red candles encased in crystal globes at either end. A captivating topiary tree

brilliant and cheery with birds and velvet ribbons and bows is at one extremity of the hearth.

The Bill Bates home has also been decorated to make the season brighter for those who enter just as the other three on the tour. 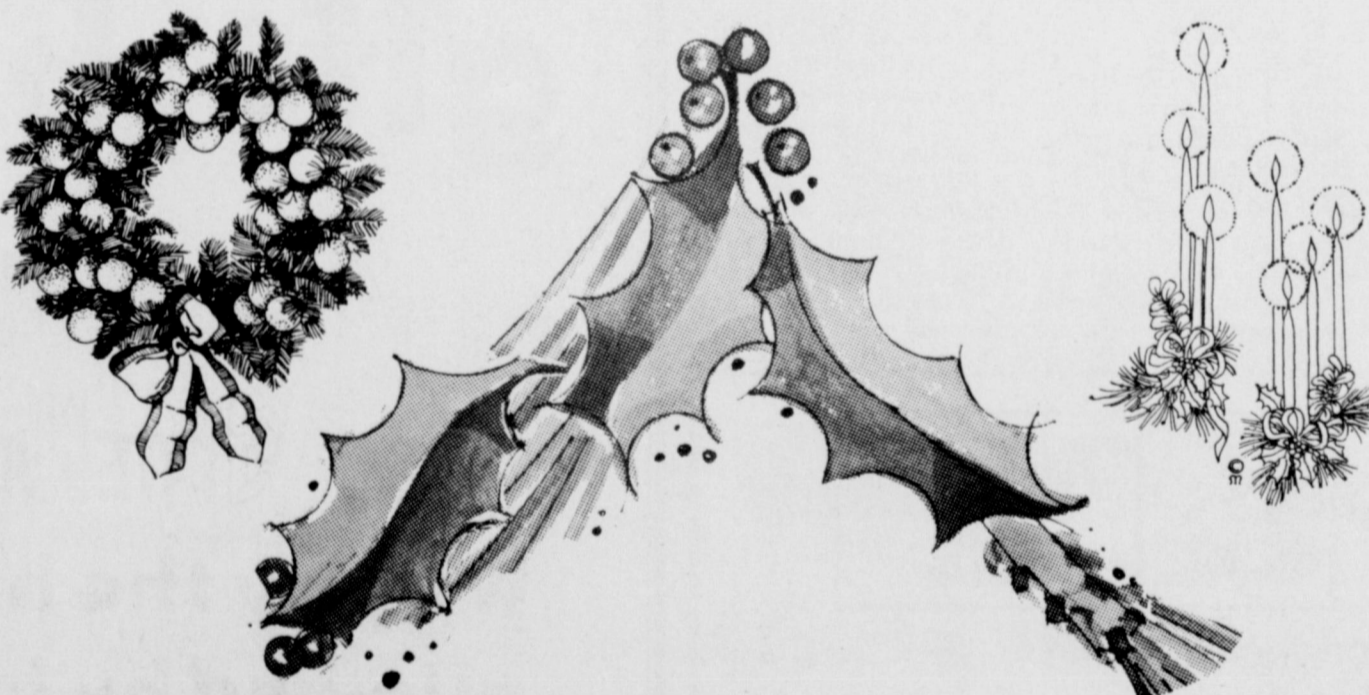

In the dining room, the antique table is the cynosure of interest with its centerpiece, which is a gold and crystal epergne featuring gold cherubs at the base lifting a crystal bowl highlighted with red votive candles, holly and fruit. The stairway leading to the upstairs, reminiscent of Victorian days is swagged with boxwood and red velvet bows.

At the Singer home, two manger scenes picture the birth of Christ nearly 2,000 years ago when the angels sang the first hymn of praise, "Glory to God in the highest and on earth, peace, good will to men". The first scene is on a table in the living room and consists of figures that have become a tradition in the family's Yule decorations.

The other nativity scene which is unique because of the materials used in construction is hanging in the greenhouse and visible through the windows in the game room. The miniature scene features hand-painted Italian figures including the Baby Jesus, Mary and Joseph, Wise men and animals, flower pot covered with spaghnum moss to give a rough texture apropos to conditions under which Jesus was born.

Each room in the Singer house has a tree and the large tree in Joe's office rising above a winter village is complete in the most minute detail. It alone should be an incentive for people to visit their home. The plantation tree decorations which lend themselves to antique farm house life include red and white checked bows and apples, gingerbread houses and men, popcorn garlands and plastic icicles.

There is nothing pessimistic or goulish about putting one's business into shape in case of death. It is, in fact, an act of kindness and assurance.

There are a thousand and one things to be done, when a loved one dies, and a will is only a minor part of such preparation, though extremely necessary.

A scholar once said, "Some men are born to greatness, some achieve greatness, and some have greatness thrust upon them."

I think Slim Willett would have liked that statement. He was a country-western performer and song writer whose hit tune, "Tool-Pusher from Snyder" topped the country-western record charts in the early 1950's.

Among the many songs Slim wrote was a "pop" tune that his record producer and most of his friends said was, "just not commercial." He stuck the song in a trunk along with other material he had written and forgot about it.

Shortly after Slim's success with "Tool-Pusher" a Louisiana promoter marketed a product called Hadaacol. The patent medicine soon became a household word and had an important effect on Slim's life. He didn't take the stuff - he wrote a song about it.

At least, he wrote a song about a town that was named after the patent medicine. It was a West Texas oil boom town that decided to call itself Hadaacol Corners.

A record company agreed to produce "Hadaacol Corners" and asked for a song for the "flip side." Slim decided to use the tune everyone said was "just not commercial."

"No sense in wasting another hit tune", Slim reasoned.

When the record was released he headed for Hadaacol Corners. Slim was amazed. The local citizenry weren't playing "Hadaacol Corners", but the song on the other side of the record. A short time later, radio, television and recording star Perry Como picked up the song from the "flip side", recorded it and sold more than

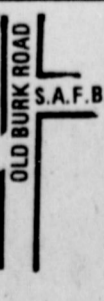

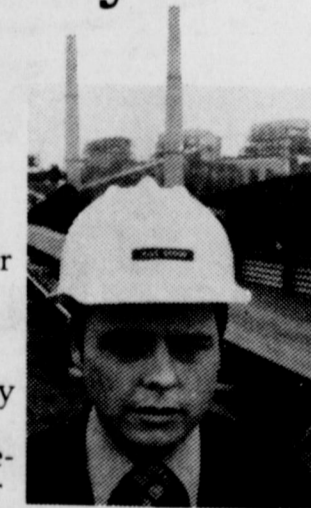

Roll dough very thin on lightly floured cloth-covered board. Cut in 2" squares; place on baking sheet. Place 1 t nut mixture in center of square and top with another square of dough. Press edges together with floured tines of a fork. Bake 15 to 20 minutes or until lightly browned. Cool completely. Sprinkle with confectioners sugar. Makes about five dozen cookies.

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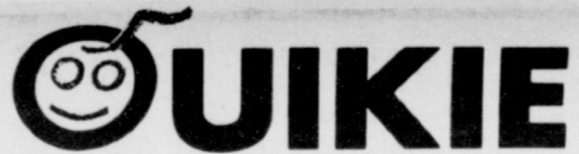

The council also decided to advertise for applicants for general maintenance workers and a new water superintendent. Present

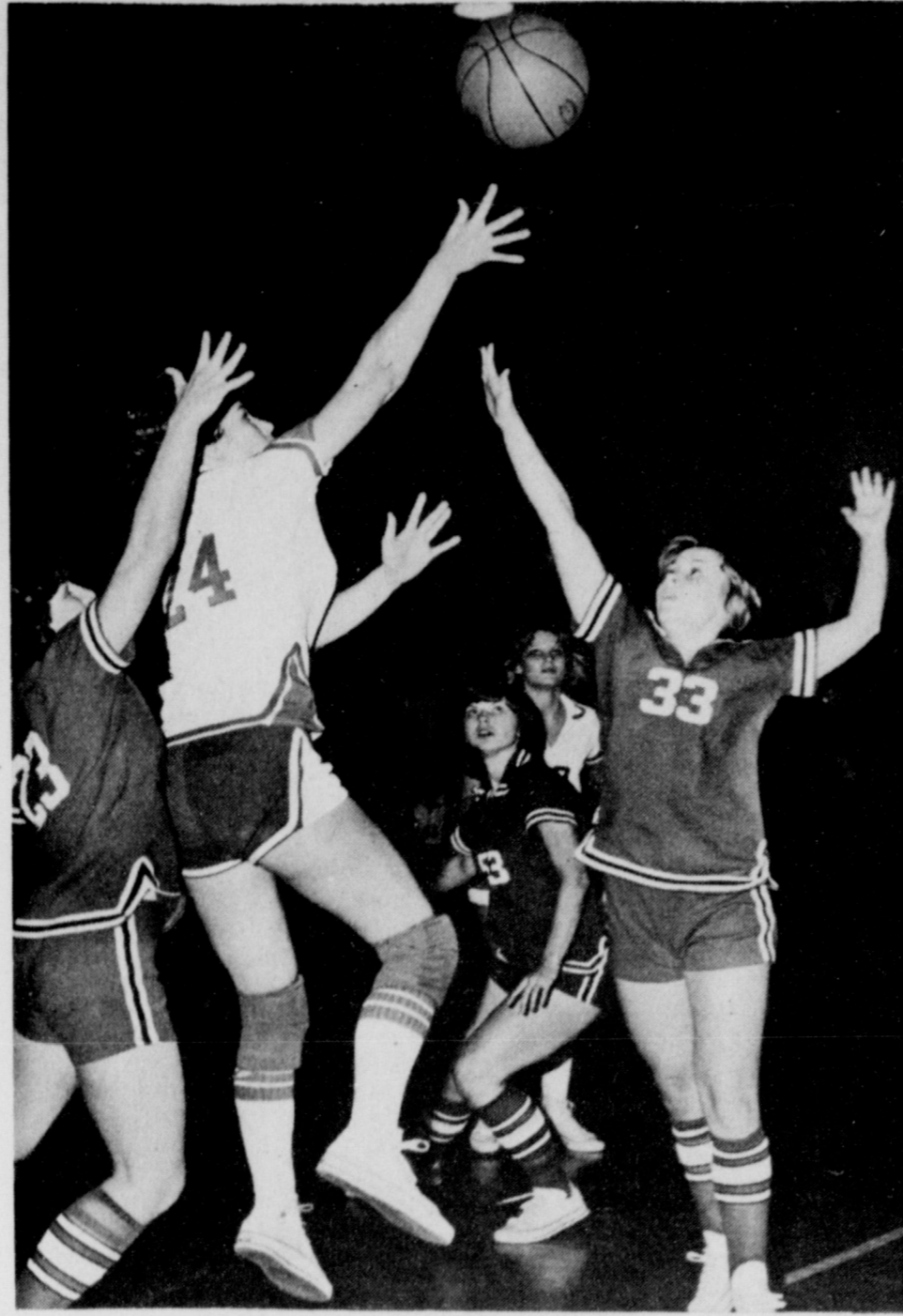
water superintendent is Hershel McDaniel.

Iowa Park Junior High seventh grade boys are matching the record of their big brothers, the Hawks, in that they are still undefeated through six games this season.

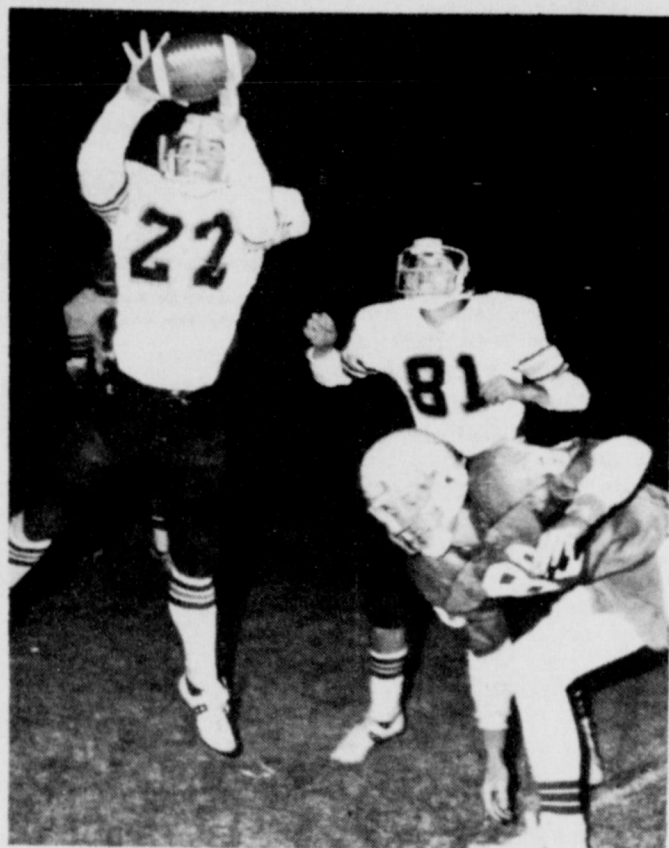
