# Campaign ends Saturday

Clean Up Week in Iowa Park will climax Saturday when youths and volunteer adults wage their annual war against litter which has collected during the past year along roadsides, vacant lots and on and around city parks and recreational areas.

Co-sponsored by the Chamber of Commerce and City of Iowa Park, the annual event has never failed to produce tons of cans, paper, wood scraps and thousands of other items, which is carted off to the dump grounds where it belongs.

Volunteers are asked to report at the Chamber office at 8:30 a.m., from where they will be dispatched to areas for cleaning. The effort will end at 12 noon.

Free soft drinks will be served to the

workers through the morning.

Youth organizations and individuals have been asked to volunteer their efforts for the campaign. Volunteer adults are urged to offer their services to help oversee the youths and transport them, according to Bob Hamilton, campaign chairman.

As groups are dispatched to specific areas, they will be issued plastic bags in which to put the debris. The filled bags will be left along side roads and await pickup by crews of city workers.

"We need all the help we can get for the campaign," Hamilton said, "because we plan to work only three and a half hours this year. It will take all we can get to do the job in that period of time."

## 11 students to compete in region meet Saturday

Eleven Iowa Park High School students will be competing in the regional meet this weekend on the campus of North Texas State University.

Nine of the students qualified for the regional in literary events, while the other two are in track and field events.

Competition in the literary events will be held Saturday morning in the business administration building, starting at 8:15 with informative speaking, journalism at 8:30, number sense and shorthand at 9:00, slide rule at 10:00 and typing at 12:00.

Entered from Iowa Park are Weldon Beall and Carl Raines, journalism; Jeff Paine and Steve Arrington, slide rule;

Julie Latimer and Denise Bohannon, typewriting; Annette Leath, shorthand; and Kenny Franks, number sense.

Both Hawk thinclads, Jack Gilmore and Daryl Frazier, will be returning to the regional for their second consecutive year. Gilmore is the District 4-AAA champion in the 440-yard dash and Frazier was runner up in the high jump.

Gilmore will be competing in the preliminaries of his specialty at 4:15 p.m. Friday, where 10 will be competing for nine positions in the finals which will be held at 2:45 p.m. Saturday.

The senior runner has turned in a 50.9 clocking as his best performance of the season, but Coach Don Flippin says he

must get under 50-flat to qualify for the state meet.

Frazier, a junior, has a high jump best of 6-6, but was beaten at the district meet when he could clear no higher than 6-5. It was his first defeat of the season.

All classes, AAAA through B, will be jumping Saturday afternoon, starting at 12 noon.

The regional meet, for literary and athletic events, is one of four held over the state this weekend. This region covers all the area from Vernon on the west, Waco on the south, and the state borders with Oklahoma and Louisiana.

## Three bicycles are stolen here

Iowa Park's supply of 10-speed bicycles was lowered by three over the weekend, as three were reported stolen to the city police department.

Chief Raymond Dixon said the three were all reported missing Monday from 129 James Drive, owned by Karl Durham, 1008 Fourth, owned by Lonnie Price, and 807 Vogel, owned by Russell Allen.

Dixon did not discount the fact that thefts of expensive bicycles could possibly be the action of a theft ring. Several bicycles taken earlier this spring were found in a barn, possibly supporting the theory they were being held for pick up and transport.

Several items were stolen from a mobile home at Cottonwood Trailer Park, according to a report filed Saturday.

Owner Roger Matthews was out of town when a neighbor found the door to the home standing open. A later check found the following items missing: a Winchester Model 94 rifle with scope, valued at more than \$100, numerous silver and half dollars, a single strand pearl necklace, a diamond clasp and a zipper bag.

Nancy Dressler, 1611 Douglas, reported to police Monday that a license plate from her car, GFY-611, had been stolen.

About 9:30 p.m. Saturday officer Joe Ross stopped a pickup in town being driven without tail lights. Questions of the operator led to admission that the 14-year-old Wichita Falls youth had taken the vehicle from a neighbor's place without permission. He had four other youths with him, ranging in age from eight to 14, all from Wichita Falls.

The boys were turned over to their parents and were to appear before the County Probation Department in Wichita Falls.

Lee Ann Childers, daughter of Mr. and Mrs. Roy Childers, and Carl Watson, son of Dr. and Mrs. Earl Watson have been selected the Outstanding Girl and Outstanding Boy of Iowa Park for 1974 and will be honored and presented with plaques at the 23 Study Club's luncheon today. The naming of Outstanding Teenagers of Iowa Park has been a project of the club since the 1962-63 club year.

Each year in late winter members of the youth committee distribute nomination forms to different organizations in the city and churches and to interested individuals, giving them the privilege of nominating young people that they deem worthy of the honor; however, the club does not nominate anyone. A deadline is given for the return of the nominations and when the committee receives them, they are sent to three noted educators of the area to judge.

Dr. Arthur Beyer, Department of Biology at Midwestern University, has been the key judge for several years. Working faithfully with him have been Mrs. M.K. Anthony and Mrs. J.C. Porter, teachers at Wichita Falls High School. Members of the 23 Study Club's youth committee for the current year are Mrs. E.F. Soell, chairman, Mrs. Rollins Woodall and Mrs. L.E. Brooks.

Dr. Beyer told the committee that judging was extra hard this year because of the excellent nominations submitted. Other young people recommended for the honor were Shelia Watson, Barbara Curry, Phyllis Smith, Carlett Kyle, Jody Frazier, Jaye Nipper, Susan Teel, Franklin Lunsford, Kenny Franks, Bob Auld, Gary House, David Collins and Jack Shaw.

Lee Ann Childers was valedictorian of the junior high school class and ranks number one in this year's senior class, according to the information in one of the nominations. She was presented the Outstanding Youth award by Epsilon Sigma Alpha when she was in the eighth grade.

This year, as a senior in high school, she has been named one of the school's Outstanding Teenagers of America and the Outstanding Senior Girl during the Iowa Park Optimist Club's Youth Appreciation Week. She was chosen Farm Bureau Queen of Wichita County and District and was first runner-up at the Texas State Farm Bureau contest in 1973.

She is a four-year member of the concert and stage bands, a two-year member of the mixed choir. She is historian of the National Honor Society. When she was a freshman she was chosen for the annual staff. She has served as business manager, assistant editor and editor for the Hawk annual and also the high school newspaper, "Hawk Squawk."

During her sophomore year, she was named Who's Who in biology, won several honors in the Midwestern Science Fair and rated Division I in UIL brass quartet at State level.

When she was a junior she was made a member of the National Honor Society, earned the Who's Who award in history and Spanish and third

She is a blood donor for the American Red Cross. She is an active member of First United Methodist Church where she attends church and Sunday School regularly, participates in youth activities and is a member of the youth choir.

She has done baby sitting, worked at English Pharmacy, Treasure City and Luby's Cafeteria. She is in charge of buying the groceries for the family and prepares the evening meals. She plans to attend Midwestern University to further her education.

One of the high school teachers who nominated Lee Ann stated, "I can recommend her for the Outstanding Teenage Girl for 1974 without reservation. She is efficient, preserving, has high moral standards and high mental capabilities, is modest and wholesome."

Carl Watson also has a diversity of talents and interests including church, Boy Scouts, school, sports and his work. He is president of the National Honor Society and served as an office assistant one year.

## Million Dollar Bike Ride set for May 4

The third annual ESA Million Dollar Bike Ride for support of St. Jude Children's Research hospital will take place on a new theme this year, "A Bicycle Built for Two." It will dramatize local rides being held throughout the nation, including one scheduled for Iowa Park Saturday, May 4.

The riders from Iowa Park will ride north on FM Road 368 for 10 miles where riders from Burk Burnett and Iowa Park will meet, be checked and then return to their cities. Riders from the two towns will be competing in friendly competition in an attempt to raise the most funds as they "Ride for the Lives of Little Children." The Iowa Park ride will begin and end at Pace Park, 1st and Clara, starting time will be 8 a.m.

Nationally, an ESA couple will pedal a "Bicycle Built for Two" from Memphis, Tenn., home of the St. Jude Children's Research Hospital, to Beverly Hills, Calif., home of the hospital's founder, Danny Thomas. This 2,500 mile cross-country trek will take two months.

St. Jude Children's Research Hospital, founded in 1962, is the largest childhood cancer research center in the world in terms of number of patients and treatment successes. Basic clinical and research findings and accomplishments developed at St. Jude are freely shared with physicians and research scientists throughout the world, extending the benefits of its work beyond its own patients to children, parents and society

Not all the chapters will meet Saturday. Some will choose a more convenient day soon, according to Wayne James, Executive Director of the Ex-Students Association.

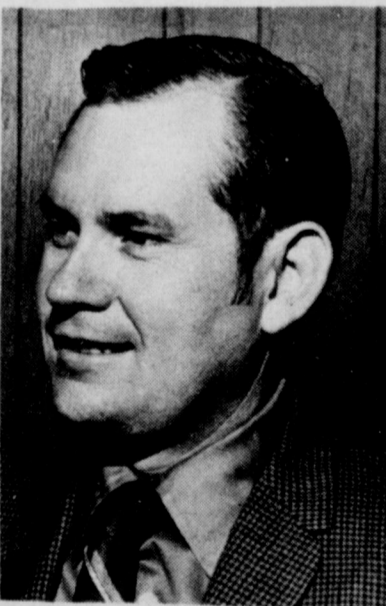
In addition to the chapter meetings, there will be numerous gatherings of Tech Exes in homes throughout the nation.

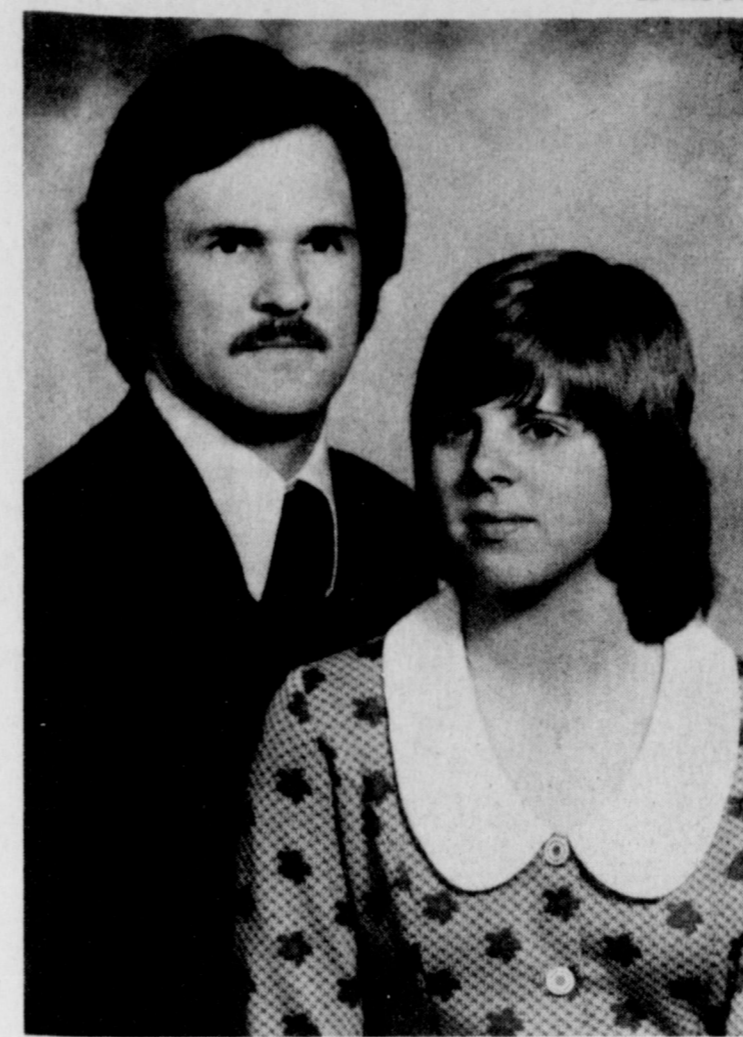

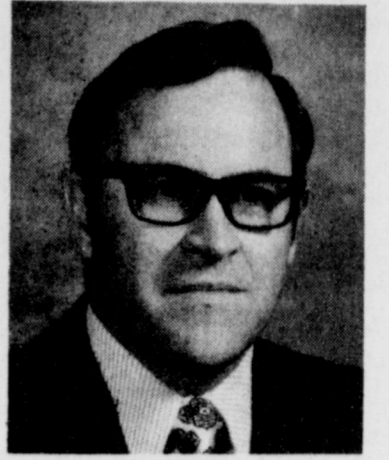

Mrs. Collier is in charge of the office at the Wichita Livestock Auction where her husband is co-owner.

She is president of the newly organized Cowbelles, an organization of women who are interested in promoting the sale and use of beef. She and several of the members plan to be in San Antonio this weekend to attend the state convention of The Cowbelles. The ladies set up an educational exhibit at the recent Farm Expo and served Beef Cookies which made a hit with the Expo visitors.

Mrs. Collier has served as a 4-H leader for the past nine years and has led projects in electricity, civil defense, sewing and gardening.

She recently completed a project with the 4-H members, on the study of beef processing and preparation.

Two of the Collier sons, Stuart and Troy, are still enrolled at Rider High School where they were 4-Hers, and are now active in FFA work, and have received numerous awards for their activity. The older son, Benny, attended Tarleton State University and is now living at home and is in business with his dad.

With four men in the household, and frequent guests, steaks are a favorite item on the menu at the Collier home on the Seymour Highway.

The recipe for beef cookies and Neal Collier's original recipe for beef stew are ours to share this week.

### BEEF COOKIES

Blend:  
2 cups brown sugar  
¾ cup shortening

Add:  
2 Eggs and beat well

Add:  
½ cup buttermilk  
2 teaspoons vanilla

Sift Together:  
2¼ cups flour  
½ teaspoon soda  
½ teaspoon salt

Combine dry ingredients with batter. Stir in 1 cup crushed potato chips, and 2 cups ground beef (roast beef cooked and then ground, or in blender). Drop by spoons on cookie sheet lined with foil paper. Bake about 8 minutes at 400 degrees or until lightly browned.

One of the favorite foods of our friends and family at our house is my husband's stew. I have persuaded him to share with you his original recipe.

### NEAL'S STEW

2 medium size potatoes  
1½ cups elbow macaroni  
2 #2 cans mixed vegetables  
1 #2 can stewed tomatoes  
2 cups cubed cooked left-over roast beef  
¾ cup ketchup  
2 teaspoons worcestershire sauce

½ teaspoon salt  
½ teaspoon pepper  
Dehydrated or fresh onion to taste

Dice potatoes and boil in water until tender. Cook macaroni at the same time until done. In large stew pan put cooked potatoes, cooked macaroni, mixed vegetables, stewed tomatoes, cooked roast beef, ketchup, worcestershire sauce, salt and pepper and onion. Add one cup water and simmer 30 minutes. Bouillon cubes may be used for seasoning, and more water added for thinner stew.

### CHEESEBURGER PIE

1 pound ground beef  
½ cup evaporated milk  
½ cup catsup  
½ cup fine dry bread crumbs  
¼ cup chopped onion  
½ teaspoon dried oregano, crushed  
1 cup shredded American cheese  
1 teaspoon worcestershire sauce

Plain pastry crust  
Combine first 6 ingredients, ¾ teaspoon salt, and 1/8 teaspoon pepper. Prepare pastry to line one 8 inch pie plate. Fill with meat mixture.

Bake at 350 degrees for 35 to 40 minutes. Toss cheese with worcestershire sauce; sprinkle atop pie. Bake 10 minutes more. Remove from oven; let stand 10 minutes before serving. Trim with pickle slices, if desired. Serves 6.

### BEEF KABOBS WAIKIKI

2 pounds round steak, cut 2 inches thick  
1½ teaspoons dry mustard  
¼ teaspoon ground ginger  
1/8 teaspoon ground pepper  
1/8 teaspoon garlic powder  
6 tablespoons soy sauce  
3 tablespoons lemon juice  
3 tablespoons oil  
8 cherry tomatoes or chunks  
8 wedges green pepper  
8 whole mushrooms

Slice round steak into strips ¼ inch thick, and place in shallow pan or dish. Combine mustard, ginger, pepper and garlic powder. Mix soy sauce, lemon juice and oil and add this mixture to the seasonings. Mix well. Pour marinade over steak strips and allow meat to marinate at least 4 hours. Thread marinated steak strips on metal skewers, accordion-style, alternating cherry tomatoes, green pepper wedges or mushrooms between every second fold. Brush with marinade and place in broiler 4 inches from heat. Broil 3 minutes on first side. Turn, brown with marinade and broil 3 to 4 minutes on second side. 4 to 6 servings. Round steak may be chilled or partially frozen for ease in cutting the ¼ inch strips.

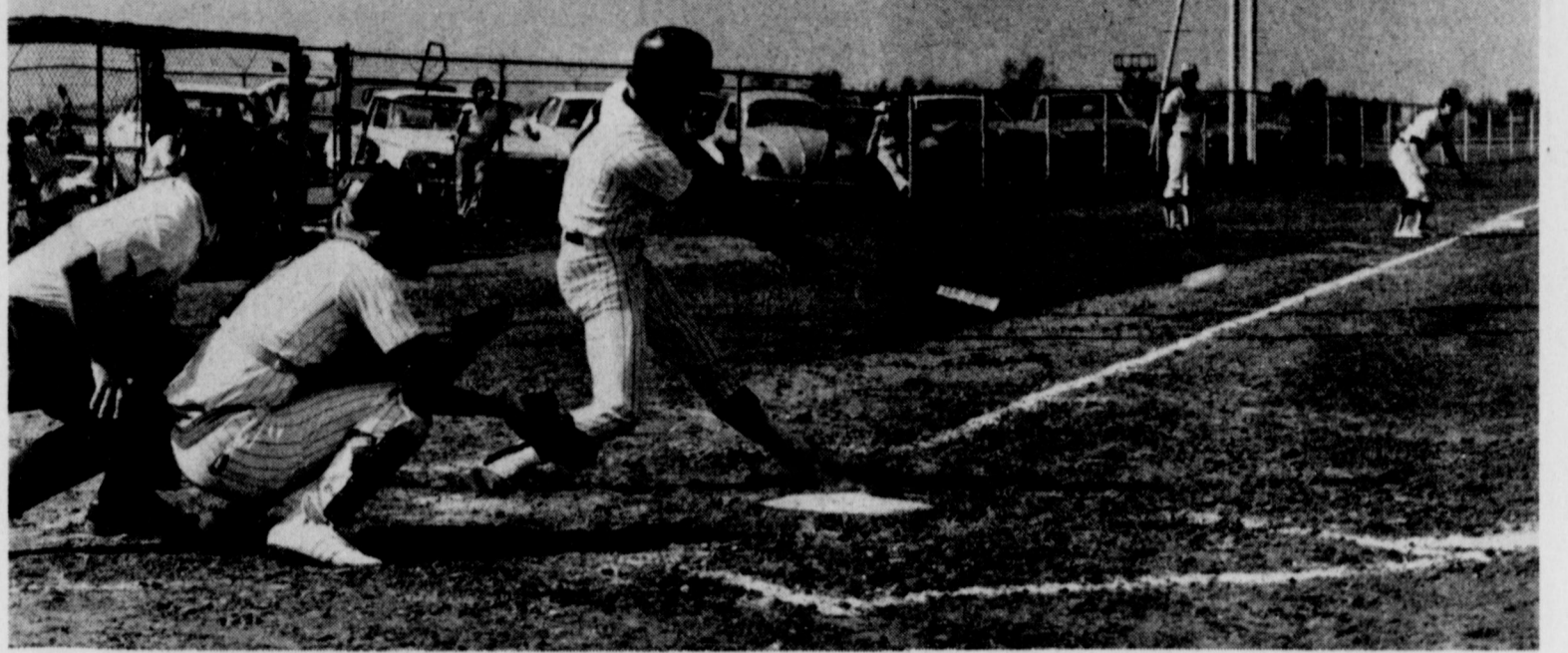

## Interest is increased

The U.S. Department of Agriculture has recently announced an increase in the interest rate of commodity loans to grain producers, effective with 1974 crop year loans. The increase from 5.5 to 7.25 per cent per year, will more nearly reflect the borrowing cost of the money to the Commodity Credit Corporation.

Warehouse and farm storage loan service fees have also been increased to reflect additional costs in processing commodity loans on grains. Warehouse storage loan service fees are increased from \$4 to \$6 per loan plus \$1 for each additional warehouse receipt over one.

Service fees on farm stored loans are increased from \$8 to \$10 per loan plus \$1 for each additional bin over one. These increases will also be effective with 1974 crop year loans.

Screwworms could reach record levels this year due to the unusually mild weather just ended unless livestock producers take special precautions. Livestock surgery is a primary reason for many screwworm cases and should be avoided. Animals should be inspected frequently, all wounds should be treated, and all worm samples should be sent to the Screwworm Lab.

A livestock marketing specialist for the Texas Agriculture Extension Service gives several reasons for the declining feeder cattle market in recent weeks. First of all, feeder animals were overpriced compared to fat cattle. Also, feeder cattle supplies were up, as reflected by a 17 per cent increase in the

January sales of cattle and calves at Texas auctions compared to a year ago. The price drop in the fed cattle market further weakened feeder prices.

Consumers deserve an explanation on the costs that make up the price of bread. Looking at a 47-cent pound-and-a-half loaf, here's the cost breakdown: Farmer, 8.5 cents; miller, 2.5 cents; baker, 28 cents, retailer, 8 cents. The baker's cost include such items as profit, transportation, advertising, overhead and packaging. The pound-and-a-half loaf contains a little less than a pound of wheat. For this loaf to cost \$1 as some bakers have recently speculated, the price of wheat to the farmer would have to jump more than 60 cents, or about \$30 a bushel, compared to a current price of \$4.58 a bushel.

Instead of staking and pruning tomatoes this year, you might like to use wire cages to support the plants. Caging rather than staking and pruning offers the home vegetable gardener several advantages, including less sun burn of the fruit, fewer disease problems and higher yields, all with much less work.

The cages can be constructed from concrete reinforcing wire, hog wire, or any other study wire mesh that has openings of at least four to six inches and is three-and-a-half to five feet wide. Cut and bend the mesh material into cylinders 16 to 20 inches in diameter, fasten the ends together and snip off the bottom rung so the cages can be pushed into the ground about six inches deep for support.

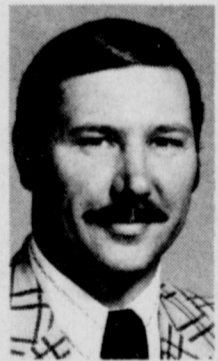

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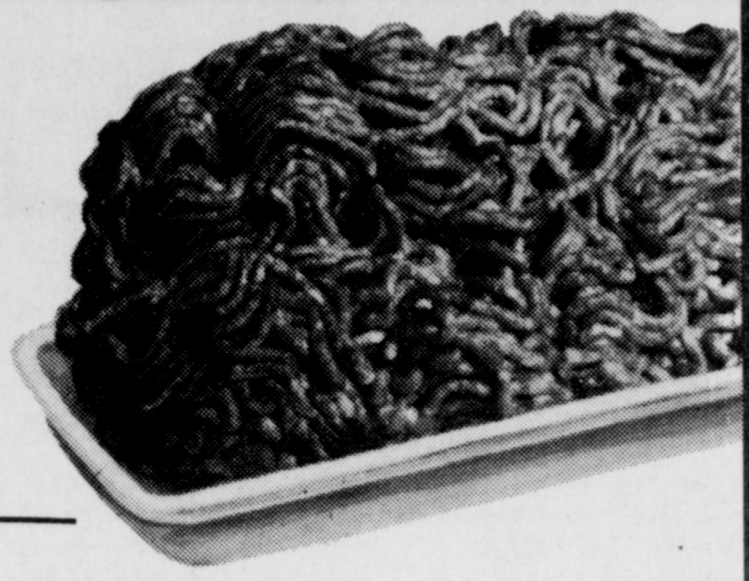

### MESQUITE MUSINGS

Without plants there could be no life on earth, yet this source of all our foods can also be poison for the unwary. Many plants are so common that we forget they are the source of powerful drugs and can prove fatal when eaten.

We have all been stung by a nettle or have known persons who became ill because of contact with poison oak, ivy or sumac. We know about the deadly mushrooms and allergy sufferers are familiar with the plants they must avoid.

Who would suspect that the lovely oleander bush contains a deadly heart stimulant so powerful that one leaf can kill a child. According to the National Safety Council, many people have died from eating steaks speared on oleander twigs and roasted over a fire.

Parts of some plants are edible while other parts are poisonous. The leaves of both the potato and tomato contain a mild poison and the tobacco plant contains the deadly nicotine which can kill a human quickly. We have eaten rhubarb pie made from the stem but did not know that the leaves of the plant were poisonous.

Some common house plants that are dangerous are the bulbs of the crocus and daffodils, the leaves of the poinsetta and elephant ear. Dieffenbachia, or mother-in-law tongue causes irritation of the mouth and tongue and loss of speech, for a time.

The seeds of the larkspur, bluebonnet and mistletoe are poisonous to humans as are the stems of the iris and the leaves and flowers of the lily-of-the-valley.

The Texas State Department of Health has issued bulletins on toxic plants and has warned the public to treat unknown plants with respect, and teach children to do the same. The outdoor season is too nice a time to be marred with tragedy caused by ignorance.

The attitude of Iowa Park residents, especially those in business here, must be at an all-time high. I give credit to the construction of Cryovac's plant as the major reason.

Nothing creates more enthusiasm in a community than the hustle, bustle of construction. And boy have we got it here: the 177,000 square foot plant itself; widening of Johnson Road south to four-lane; new homes all over the city with more to come in development areas; new streets marked; water lines being laid; and a new Little League baseball field . . . just to name a few.

Add to the capacity of construction the new faces of young families looking over the town and shopping for homes. Many of these are Cryovac people from other states who have been offered positions with the company here and are here to give our community a studied visit to see if they want to become one of us.

Without an exception, our visitors have said they liked what they saw, and the people with whom they've visited.

Iowa Park is going to gain in many ways from Cryovac's decision to build here. Among them are an increase in our retail and service business; broadening our tax base with an industry, supporting

businesses and new homes; and, possibly, the most important, some of the nicest people you'll ever hope to meet.

Approximately 2,000 people leave the city limits each day to go to work. This will be cut by at least 200 when the plant opens, and that means those who have been buying where they have worked, will be buying from local stores, more than they have been. ### Annual horticulture class sale is slated Saturday

The Ornamental Horticulture class of Iowa Park High School will hold its second annual plant sale Saturday, starting at 9 a.m.

Plants to be sold have been grown through the school year by students of the

vocational class during their two-hour daily periods.

"This is a clearance sale of all our plants," explained Jimmy Howell, class instructor.

Hanging baskets, 12 inches in size, which normally sell for \$10 will clear for \$7.50 and \$7.50 baskets will be sold for \$5. Baskets include Ferns, Geraniums, Jew, Grape Ivy, Dusty Miller and Begonias.

Bedding plants will be sold for \$1.50 per dozen. They include Petunias, Partulaca, Alyssum and Periwinkles.

Six-inch pots of Geraniums will sell for \$2, and four-inch pots will clear for 75 cents. Potted plants to be sold for \$1.25 include ivy, caeleus, begonias, copper plants, chenils, cratons and alauera.

Pepper and tomato plants will be sold for \$1 per dozen.

A free, five-inch begonia will be given away for a purchase amounting to \$5 or more, as long as they last, Howell said.

The school greenhouse is located at the corner of Highway West and Johnson Road.
