City hires tax assessor

The city council Monday night hired a man to update property appraisals for the tax department, and heard a report on monies to be spent improving highway right of ways during the next three years.

Council members discussed tax work needed in the city with W.F. Rainer of Wichita Falls, in a session prior to the stated council meeting of 7:30 p.m.

Then, during the meeting, aldermen voted to hire Rainer, at a per-hour rate of \$5. Rainer is retired and a former employee of the Wichita Falls tax department.

A representative of the Texas Highway Department, after explaining the 1973 Highway Act passed by Congress, told aldermen of expenditures to be made in the city during the next three years. The program is for cities over 5,000 population, he said.

The first portion of the program is already underway, in the improvement of surface and ditches on FM 368 in the southern portion of town. Future improvements include work

on FM 368 north, installation of a signal at the railroad crossing on Johnson Road, improvement Pacific from Alameda to West Highway, and improvements on Johnson, Wall, Aldine, Diamond, Washington, Yosemite and Third Streets.

street was originally designed as 100 feet wide.

Also approved was a proposal to place the dog catcher under jurisdiction of the chief of police, and to have B&J Electric install a new emergency siren.

The new siren will be placed at the city hall, and the present siren will be installed in the south portion of town.

City attorney O.N. Newman was delegated to work out an agreement with N.E. Guthrie Jr. on repayment of water and sewer lines he installed when developing Country Hills Estate.

Newman was given authorization by a 3-1 vote, with Lee Turner voting against.

Two issues were tabled for more study. One was a proposal to allow free dumping of trash at the city dump grounds by city residents, and the other was repayment of a three-year premium of \$791 for insurance coverage on the water tower at city hall.

J.V. Morton asked the council if it would consider extending sewer service to his home on Atlantic, explaining he was attempting to sell it and without sewer service he would lose as much as \$5,000.

Morton, who said he had been asking the city to provide sewer service to the house some 11 years, said he has been put off every time he requested the service.

Aldermen explained the city has financial priorities, and his prol one of them, but is down on the list from more pressing problems; but said it would be taken care of in the future.

Morton reminded the council he was not the only taxpayer in that area not being served.

School sells bonds, re-hires teachers

School trustees sold \$500,000 in bonds during Tuesday night's meeting, at an interest rate considered "very good" by the school's bondsman.

Also highlighting the meeting was renewal of contracts for all classroom teachers except one, who had tendered a letter of resignation.

The firm of Merrill Lynche Pierce Fenner and Smith Inc. submitted the low bid on the bonds, with an interest rate of 5.479809, which amounts to a net interest charge for the 25-year bonds of \$279,744.25.

Twelve firms bid on the bonds, including all the major banking institutions in the Dallas and Fort Worth area. Highest rate bid was 6.0012 per cent, from Fort Worth National Bank.

Aiding in attracting such low rates. all were below six per cent except one, was an A financial rating by Moody's Rating Service which was said to have saved the district at least \$25,000 in interest.

The bonds will be repaid at \$25,000 per year from 1977 through 1987, \$55,000 in 1988 and \$85,000 in 1989 and 1990. The district reserves the right to redeem any or all of the last three year's premiums in 1987.

All classroom teachers were recommended by their respective campus principals for re-hiring. And a year's contract was extended to each, except for high school head basketball coach Bobby Butler, who submitted his resignation. No reasons were given by Butler in his brief letter.

Butler will complete the school year.

All teachers in the West Wichita Cooperative were also given one-year contracts, with the exception of City View, where teacher contracts are not considered until May.

Both band directors, David Mooney

and Greg Miller, were also given \$700 salary increases. Mooney, with the increase, now is paid \$2,000 annually above state pay scale, and Miller will draw \$1,500.

Various track surfaces will be studied before the board makes its decision, according to trustee discussion at the meeting.

*State proposed mileage for use of personal vehicles on school projects, from 12 cents per mile to 16 cents. The amount was raised two cents two years ago. Room perdiem was also raised from \$18 a day to \$22.

Correct address must be on driver's license

The Texas Department of Public Safety advises that all Texas drivers should examine their Texas drivers license to verify that the address on their license is correct. If his address is incorrect, it will be necessary to contact the local Drivers License Office as soon as possible.

It is a misdemeanor offense for not changing your address within 10 days after moving. This particular law is going to be enforced more strictly in the future. The procedure for changing an address on a license is to have a duplicate license made with a new picture and a \$1 fee.

The Drivers License Law, V.C.S. 66876, Sec. 20, states that whenever any person after applying for or receiving an Operator's Commercial Operator's or Chauffeur's license shall move from the address named in such application or in the license issued to him or when the name of the licensee is changed by

marriage or otherwise, such person shall within ten (10) days thereafter notify the Department in writing of his old and new addresses or of such former and new names, of the number of any license then held by him, and such person shall apply for a duplicate license as set out in Section 14.



Farmers may go for grain crop

Good soil moisture in Wichita County has boosted forage production on small grains. But some farmers are planning to forfeit spring grazing and shoot for a grain crop due to favorable grain prices.

Livestock should now be removed from small grain fields so that serious grain yield reductions do not occur. With grazing, the problem is normally not under-utilization of the small grain forage but overgrazing. Moderate fall and winter grazing usually has little effect on grain yields and may even prevent lodging and increase tillering.

Late grazing seriously reduces grain yields, due to removal of the plant's growing point, loss of accumulated nitrogen in the forage and decreased leaf area needed for vegetative regrowth.

If small grains have been grazed, the nitrogen content of plants has been reduced. So topdressing with nitrogen fertilizer should be considered to maintain acceptable grain yields, especially if soil moisture conditions are favorable at the time livestock are removed.

Managing small grains for be preferable. grazing and grain production requires timely decisions.

With the present moisture, good stands and anticipated market price for grain, the amount of nitrogen to topdress is an important decision. Evidence available would support the conclusion that topdressing phosphorus and potassium is of little value this late in the season.

Both the rate of nitrogen and time of application are important in obtaining satisfactory results. The rate of nitrogen to use must take into account (1) fertilization to date, (2) yield potential as affected by stand, soil moisture, grazing, and any other condition that can be expected to limit grain production.

Generally 30 to 60 pounds of actual nitrogen per acre should be considered for grain, using the low rate where nitrogen was applied last fall and no grazing, and the high rate where fall and winter grazing has been practiced. If the grain looks pale green and shows evidence of low nitrogen and the prospects look good, a higher rate may

For maximum benefits from topdressing, nitrogen

should be applied before tillering. Research data show that one way nitrogen increases grain yields is through increased tillering, hence seed heads.

> Common mistakes cost Texas farmers and ranchers additional dollars at income tax time. Among these are letting the tax accountant do it all, poor planning, failure to claim investment credit, poor record keeping, failure to watch tax changes, failure and soil and water conservation, and failure to deduct expenses for business trips.

The first step to a good cotton crop is planting quality seed. But good seed may be in short supply this year due to unfavorable harvesting weather in many parts of the state last fall. Cotton exposed to weather damage or stored in trailers, ricks or modules when it exceeds 12 per cent moisture will suffer a reduction in seed quality. High quality planting seed tolerates cold, wet soil conditions that cause seedling disease. Good seed also lated pasture production





In this day when so many refuse to do anything, except they be paid in the almighty dollar, we are grateful for persons who will volunteer for any kind of civic responsibility.



Does that sound familiar to you? It seems one doesn't have to live in Springlake, or Fort Stockton, or Abilene, or Marfa to have an opinion all his own. It appears all us West Texans share our common opinions. But the thing I liked about the WTCC survey was the optimism. Now remember, not all those surveyed were from oil-producing areas. Think about those who are in areas where the economy is based almost entirely on the cattle industry. But still, most were optimistic.

16. Shelving in auto shop and outside paint storage be provided. (\$300)

17. Partitions for restrooms in Auto Mechanics and Auto Body Shops. (\$100)

18. Recommend office equipment be purchased for high school counselors. (\$375)

1. Offer business machines for all students (non-vocational).

2. Better teacher-pupil ratio. 3. Recommend an additional counselor for high school, preferably a woman. (\$10,000)

4. Purchase of chairs to eliminate seating problems. (Choir \$250)

NOT FEASIBLE AT THIS TIME

1. A screening program for selection of students in ornamental horticulture and agriculture coop. (Pending criteria set by administration.)

2. Recommend that teachers have more input into the scheduling of elective courses with respect to number of students assigned, individual students, etc.

3. Obtain equipment to meet instructional needs. (Driver training \$42,000)

4. Partition between clothing lab and cooking lab. (\$300)

5. High school and junior high vocal teachers be allowed to team teach. (Music)

6. Purchase of needed teaching aids for all grades K-12. (Music)

7. Proper sound proof rehearsal and practice rooms to be provided. (Music hall \$250,000)

8. Proper storage facilities to be provided for all schools. (Music)

9. Have permission for more performance during school hours so long as the students keep work up for other subjects.

10. Organize the music program K-12.

11. Advance a testing system to determine student progression. (Music)

Chamber adds more awards


Inclusion of two more recognitions which will be made at the annual banquet were approved Monday at the monthly meeting of the Chamber of Commerce board of directors.
