Iowa Park voters took seriously last Saturday the word that they could vote for the proposals they like and against those they had objections to.

The 770 who cast ballots definitely want bonds issued for improvement of water and sewer facilities here. And just as definitely they refused to okay the proposals street improvements, for a swimming pool, for a new city hall, and for a library building.

Bonds authorized to be sold will total \$600,000, but the word is that federal and state aid will cut the cost to us down to about \$497,500.

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Hawk Stadium to Be Dedicated

A project which was only a hope less than a year ago, will be dedicated this Friday night just before the Graham football game kick-off. It's the Hawk Stadium, home of the 1969 Class AA State Champion IPHS Hawks!

Sponsored by Hawk Boosters club and backed by practically every business firm and family in this area, Iowa Park has dug a hole in the new high school campus, planted bermuda grass, built concrete seats to accommodate 5000 fans.

Through generosity of officials of Midwestern university, Hawk boosters have hauled in light fixtures, fences, press boxes, concession stands and ticket booths to give IPHS one of the best football facilities in the state.

Commenting editorially Tuesday evening, Sept. 15, the Wichita Falls Times had this to say:

"The spotlight for community achievement is turned on Iowa Park for its athletics stadium project."

"Needing a stadium befitting the championship football teams the high school has been fielding and the interest of citizens in other competitive sports, the people of Iowa Park decided the only way to accomplish their objective would be through a do-it-yourself project."

"That decision is now fully vindicated in the virtually finished 5,000-seat concrete stands that will be in use Friday night at the first home game for the season of the Iowa Park Hawks, defending class AA champions."

"Contributions, donations, discounts, volunteer labor and borrowed equipment have each had a role for many months in bringing the stadium into reality and a source of pride for thousands of citizens who had some part in the project."

"A stadium has been built, but it stands as a monument to something that is even more important to small cities (in size only) like Iowa Park—community spirit and endeavor willing and able to meet the challenges of survival and growth by marshalling all of the resources needed to get a civic job done."

"This time it was a stadium. Next time it will be some equally high priority project."

Lester Brooks, program chairman, introduced Ralph Harvey III, owner of Texoma Fertilizers of Iowa Park. He discussed the problems of modern farming and revealed that present day agriculturists need vast acres and much money to operate at a profit.

He is particularly concerned that the ingredients of a large loaf of bread bring only three cents to the farmer and require 33c or more of the housewife's food budget.

Pres. Norman Mayes announced that First Vice-President Bill Steger will move up and replace him when he moves this month to Snyder, Texas.

Mrs. Daniel York, membership chairman, said the drive for members would begin Sept. 14. Her slogan for the year is "One parent per child."

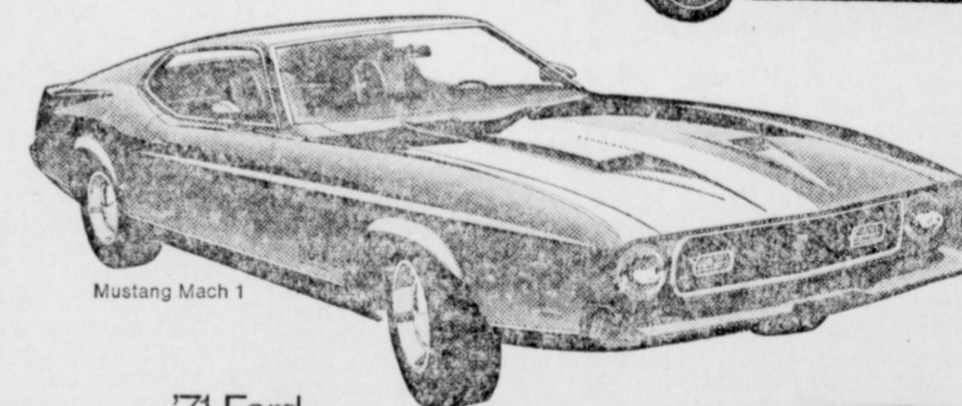
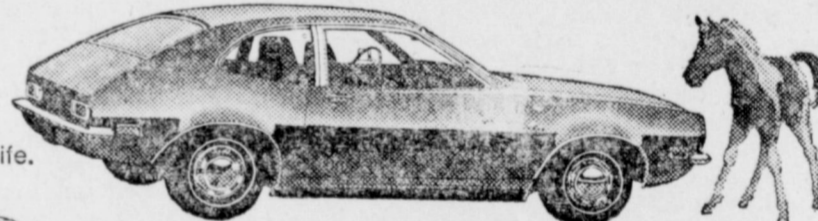
