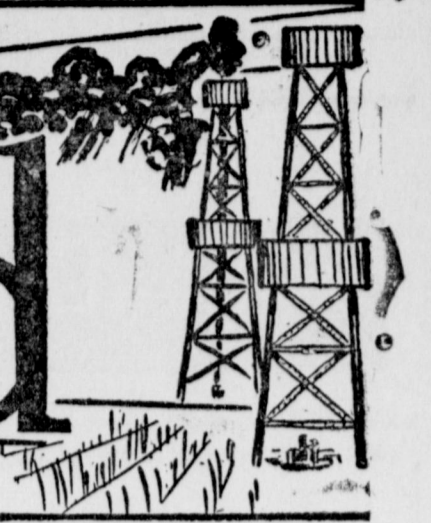

Fire Prevention Week Oct. 4-10

Fire chief Charles E. Thompson and President Raymond Schroeder of Wichita County Farm Bureau urge area folk to pay special heed to observance of National Fire Prevention Week Oct. 4-10. "We ask that everyone develop good fire safety habits including care with matches and smoking, good housekeeping to rid the home of rubbish; and proper use of electrical fuses, appliances and extension cords," Buddy said. He added "Fires killed more than 12,100 persons and cost more than \$2.4 billion in USA last year." Schroeder said the fall and winter months are the most vulnerable times for rural fires. "When fire occurs on rural property, the damage is three to six times greater than in the average city fire," he added. Farm Bureau has two programs designed to curtail fire losses. The county unit co-operates with Texas Farm Bureau in sponsoring the attendance of local volunteer firemen to the annual training school each summer in College Station. More than 800 have attended under FB sponsorship the past seven years. Farm Bureau also pays \$75 to fire departments for fighting rural fires on Farm Bureau insured property. County Farm Bureau also sponsors a graphic 45-minute fire prevention demonstration. More than 150 were given before school, civic clubs and other groups during the past school year. Almost 25,000 fire extinguishers have been sold to Farm Bureau members as a continuing program of rural fire protection.

4-H Club Emphasis

Wichita county's more than 900 4-H members are having a celebration this week. And they aren't the only ones, according to Mrs. Dee James, assistant HDA, and Gary Griffith, assistant county agricultural agent. Local 4-H'ers are joining more than 76,654 Texans and nearly 4 million others throughout USA in observance of 4-H Week, Oct. 4-10. Members will participate in activities all week to tell the public about the Head, Heart, Hands and Health program and recruit more volunteer leaders, recognize the support of parents and honor 4-H friends. Theme of the observance is "We Care." Young people between ages 9 and 19 may belong whether they reside on farms, in towns, cities or suburbs. Those of all cultural and economic backgrounds are welcome too. County 4-H Council is heading the special week-long observance.

IPHS 20 Hirschi 7

Last Thursday night in Wichita Falls the Hawks continued the state's longest winning string by blasting the Hirschi Huskies 20-7. The Mean Green had put their 18th straight victory in the record books! This game was the first Hawk tilt on artificial turf, and the scene was something to behold! It was a hard fought game and the Huskies notched the first points on the scoreboard. Iowa Park kicked off and held Hirschi and forced them to punt. Varness put the ball high in the air, Jeff McDonald fumbled his catch and the eager blue clad Huskies pounced on the ball at the Hawk 31. The Huskies unleashed Darrell Jackson, listed at 160 pounds, who runs like a 200-pounder, 7 straight times. He finally scored from the 2. Ross booted the PAT and the mighty Hawks trailed 0-7. Hirschi kicked off and Jackie Perkins returned to his 45 for good field position. McDonald and Steve Webb alternated ripping good gains out of the Hirschi line. Ten plays later from the 5, QB Greg Frazier faked a handoff and rolled left to score. Steve Catlin's PAT try was blocked by the inspired Wichitans. Mr. Jackson had time remaining in the first quarter to run the ball four times for 12 yards before the teams changed goal lines. Beck doing the signal calling, the Blue moved downfield. They made four first downs and only some great defense by Chuck Buikema and Steve Watson and Webb stalled them. Facing a fourth and 13 play from the Hawk 24, Coach Glen Johnson ordered a field goal play. Koss tried, but it was no good. The Hawks roared back with McDonald scampering 25 yards on the first play. Webb got 6 more and Jeff picked up 2 tough yards. Frazier then kept and rolled outside for 19. McDonald made 2 more hard yards as the Huskies tried to key a linebacker on him. Watson took the pressure off with a 9-yard gain and then McDonald picked up 11 more to the 3. Jeff scored on the next play, to put the Hawks in front 12-7. A run for the 2-point conversion failed to hit paydirt. The Hawks kicked off and allowed Hirschi to run 3 plays and punt. With only seconds left on the clock before halftime, Frazier tried a pair of long passes. At intermission, the Hawk band put on a stirring display of formation marching and provided some fine sound including a bell solo which pleased the 7500 people in the stands. Hirschi's Big Blue band also gave a fine performance and had a good sound. The Hawks came out after half-time with a changed defense that completely dominated the game. In the first half our boys were expecting a Wishbone-T offense with many option plays. Hirschi QB Joe Goodman, who was injured and did not play, runs it well. But the Huskies were forced to go with Ted Beck, who has not run that formation, so they went to the Winged T, which features the handoffs and pitchouts without the option running by the quarterback. The Hawks played with a tight spaced line and stopped Hirschi cold. The Blue managed only one first-down the entire half. The talented Hawk defense kept Hirschi inside their own 30-yard line except for three plays the entire second half. Varnell's kick hit a Greenie and the Huskies recovered. They got to the Hawk 45 before they had to kick. Iowa Park scored early in the fourth quarter. They had marched

from their 25 to the Hirschi 47, when McDonald broke through the left side, danced sharply back to the right against the flow of the defense, and raced all the way to a score. Webb ramed left tackle for the 2-point play and the Hawks had their 20-7 margin. Later the Hawks moved to the Hirschi 19 where a fourth down fumble killed that scoring opportunity.

Bulldogs, Beware

Coach Bill Froman thinks he has his best squad in his tenure at Boomtown, and he hopes to have the 'Dogs ready for the Hawks. They have a fine QB in Slayden and a good end in Rick Reasoner. 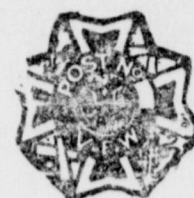

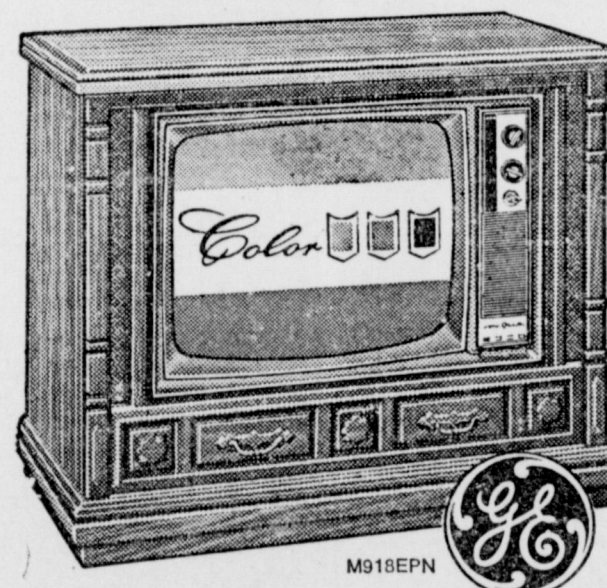
