1955 Mothers March On Polio Scheduled Monday, January 31

The 1955 March of Dimes in Iowa Fark will be Monday night, Jan. 31, at 7:00, along with other communities of this count.

That evening hundreds of mothers in the area will start the march on polio at exactly 7:00 when street lights will be turned on and the fire siren will sound as a signal the march is on. Families who wish to contribute are asked to turn on their porch lights or place a lighted candle in the front window as a signal and invitation to the marching mothers to stop at their home.

Rollins Woodall has been appointed by Ikard Smith, county campaign chairman, as Iowa Park chairman. He has asked the Epsilon Sigma Alpha sorority to assist with the fund drive, Mrs. Malcolm Mills, ESA president, has appointed Mrs. W. A. George to serve as chairman

of the group. Polio is the national and state project of ESA. Mrs. Mills reports: "The ESA has contributed more time and money than any other service organization in the world toward the fight against polio."

Mrs. Mills and Mrs. George at tended a kick-off luncheon Tuesday at the YMCA in Wichita Falls, when details of the 1955 March of Dimes were announced by Mr. Smith.

In 1954, Wichita county contributed \$42,000 in the January campain and another \$5,000 in the emer gency drive. Last year was Wichita Falls' heaviest year for polio cases, reaching epidemic proportions, ac cording to Dr. A. W. Pierce, county medical adviser. Last year 26 cases were reported.

There has been some confusion concerning new rules placing farmers under Sociay Security. Farmers who are self-employed cannot begin payments on their 1954 income, but will be required to do so on their 1955 income.

To clear up misunderstandings on this matter, the Farm Bureau program committee has secured a representative of the social security Pennington Family office to appear on Family Fur Night, Thursday, Jan. 20, and an swer questions. Special emphasis will be placed on seasonal workers.

Several changes affecting farm ers and ranchers have been made in the 1954 Code of Internal Revenue. There is no change in the filing date for farm income tax returns with the exception of those filing estimates for 1955. Farmers electing to file their returns and pay in full must have them in the mail in time to reach the Dallas office by January 31. Farmers filing estimates must file by January 15 and have until April 15 to file their

Under the new law, your son or daughter under 18 can now earn any amount over \$600 and still be claimed as a dependent by you provided you pay for more than half of their support. An example of this occurs when 4-H and FFA youngsters win more than \$600 in prize money and put it in savings or reinvest it. Dad is still their sole support.

For the first time, farmers are allowed a deduction up to 25 per for soil conservation practices made in 1954. Should the amount expended by the farmer amount to more than 25 per cent, then this amount may be carried forward to the following year and the years thereafter. Any amount less than the 25 per cent must be listed as to the actual expenditure for soil conservation. Any farmer electing to take this deduction must continue to do so unless granted permission to change by the Secretary of the Treasury.

An allowance for deduction of child care for working mothers up to \$700 is now being made. This deduction may be made only on a joint return with the exception of widows and if the joint gross income does not exceed \$4500 and for children under the age of 12, Again \$600 will be allowed.



WICHITA VALLEY GOING TO GRASS"

Census figures compiled by Fred Parkey, manager of Wichita county water improvement districts, show that a total of 21,885 acres of crops were irrigated in the Wichita Valley in 1954. This is an increase of 1,197 acres over the previous year. Largest increases were in pastures and alfalfa, Total irrigated grasses were 5,748 acres, or 26.3 per cent of the whole irrigated acreage. Increase over last year was 23.6 per cent, which points definitely toward a growing livestock and pasture program for the Val-

With relatively cheap land and extremely low-cost irrigation water, I think this trend is in the be among the most intensive livestock areas in the Southwest. Perhaps we are already moving that

Dairying has made an increase in the past few years and, if certain marketing problems can be ironed out, will continue to expand.

Feeding projects in both cattle and sheep will multiply as more farmers recognize the possibilities for growing feed and forage as well as pasture crops in the Wichita Irrigated Valley.



Garrison said, "A lot of car owners are apt to be mighty unhappy three months from now, because they won't be allowed to operate on the streets and highways without the approved inspection sticker."

The longer motorists delay, the longer will be the waiting line at inspection stations as the April 15 deadline approaches. The state's nearly 4000 inspection

stations will be able to handle inspection of some 21/2 million vehices which have not been checked without waiting in line, provided owners begin taking their cars in without further delay.



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Mankins Church Men And Women Organize Meditations

A construction foreman was about to cut down a fine oak tree near a famous old Texas ranch house, when the owner stopped him: "You can go around it, over it, or not go at all," said the rancher. Today the tall oak stands proud

and unharmed between two special poles that carry electric llines well above its majestic crown. It stands as a symbol of the strength, love and loyalty of a man intent upon leaving to posterity a heritage rich in natural beauty and value.

There is far too much wanton destruction of trees in the wake of progress-so called. The state highway department is usually careful to preserve and protect trees where possible. Often not so much thought is given along country roads and by utility companies. Many property owners destroy trees unneces-

I am 100 per cent for improved pastures, but some of the grassland along our highways I cannot enjoy for thinking of the woodlands that were destroyed in order to get a little more grass for the cattle.

When I say destroyed, I mean literally that, for in many cases the trees were piled and burned, thus robbing the soil of untold tons of valuable organic matter. In many cases trees have done a marvelous job of preserving soils that man has mismanaged. They should not be removed unless and until man is ready to do a better job of maintaining and improving the soil than the trees have done.

Trees hold the soil in place, keep it cool with their shade, protect and improve it with their fallen leaves. They break the wind and cool and humidify the atmosphere. They provide beauty and give comfort to man and beast. "Woodman. spare that tree"-at least until you are sure your cause is more worthy. LET'S PLANT MORE TREES

Not many kinds of trees grow satisfactorily in the Wichita Valley region of Texas. This is due to unfavorable soil and climatic conditions. Soils have a high Ph and are often saline, which prohibit the growth of many desirable trees and shrubs. A fungous disease known as root rot is sure death to ature and dry, windy atm conditions are unfavorable for many types of trees and shrubs.

The situation is not hopeless, as many examples will prove. It is a matter of selecting only the most hardy species and then giving special attention to location, planting

Hardiest of large growing ornamental trees for this area are American Red Cedar and Chinese Arborvitae. Best of the smaller ornamentals are Pfitzer Juniper and various types of arbor-vitae such as Berkman's Golden, Baker Pyramid and Bonita. With special care, certain broadleaf evergreens can be grown withreasonable success. These include Nandino, photinia, pyracantha, Waxleaf ligustrum, amoor privet and others.



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
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
