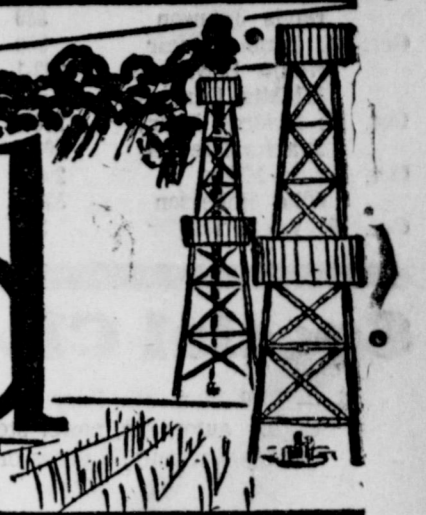

IPHS 70 Bowie 0

The high flying Hawks of mean green fame showed the Rabbits they were "in the stew" last Friday night when they took the opening kickoff and marched down to the four, where All State Tail back Jeff McDonald fled into the end zone. The Hawk kick was no good and that was about all they did wrong the whole rainy evening.

The field was in good condition and the footing although slippery never became treacherous.

Bowie, plagued with fumbleitis all through the game, lost the wet ball on their third play and Greg Anzell grabbed it. Watson and Webb pounded the frail Bowie line and Webb notched the second tally on a 5 yard run. QB Greg Frazier passed for the 2 points, and IPHS led 14-0 with some of the fans still trying to find a dry spot.

Bowie again ran three plays and punted. Webb made a brilliant return but a 15-yd. penalty nullified his effort and put the Hawks in possession on their own 6. A few plays and 84 yards downfield Steve Watson got the call and raced 10 yards for TD No. 3. The quarter ended with score 20-0.

In the second quarter Bowie could not move and their bare-foot kicker punted the Hawks deep in their own end of the field. The Green was unstoppable and drove out to Bowie's 34. Webb took a pitch-out and slogged his way to paydirt. Again Bowie could not get going and had to punt.

Operating with the No. 2 unit Richard Blair raced 48 yards to score and added a two-point conversion for a 34-0 score. The half ended with that score.

The rain was heavy and it was really wet by this time. Both band directors decided it would be too rough on band equipment to put on a halftime show.

At start of the third quarter the coaches had our future Hawk stars in the game. They forced a punt. Steve Catlin, Jimmie Green and Blair moved the ball toward paydirt but were thwarted by penalties. Then Lee Dawson made a fine run on a reverse and Bowie gave up another 15 yards for pulling the face mask. Blair rammed over from 9 yards away.

Bowie had three plays and then kicked. Blair ripped off 20 yards. Catlin passed incomplete. Blair made 18 more and Catlin flipped a 7 yd pass to Lee Dawson for the score. Score by now was 46-0.

Bowie fumbled on the first play after the kickoff. Tony Lee covered the ball on the Jackrabbit 33. Iowa Park was penalized on the first two running plays and Anzell was stopped inches short of first down. Bowie ran three plays and the third quarter ended.

Bowie kicked and Morgan returned to their 41. Anzell was at quarterback with Tony Lee and Bobby Morgan forming the I: They moved to the 19. Tony Lee took a handoff and scooted into the endzone. Anzell passed to Jerry Burkhardt for the 2-point. Now he score was up to 54-0.

On the second Bowie play, our Henry Sutton hit the QB as he tried to pass and Burkhardt caught the ball and raced to Bowie's 23. Bowie stiffened against our younger lads and James Frazier just couldn't hold Anzell's pass. Bowie took over and bobbled again with Sutton gaining possession on the Bowie 19. Anzell reversed for 17 yards and then scored on a keeper. Jackie Perkins, who had told the coach he was cold and needed some exercise, came in and ran for the two points to make the score 62-0.

Our short kickoff gave the ball to Bowie on their 35. They finally crossed the 56 into Hawk land for the second time in the game.

REASON DICTATES KEEPING BAN AGAINST OPEN SALOON

We heartily agree with the expressions of opinion found in the following editorial published in Wichita Falls Times on Oct. 8:

"Let us reason together—bring the issue down to its simplest basic point—on proposed constitutional amendment No. 2 appearing on the Nov. 3 general election ballot. It concerns the open saloon or liquor by the drink question confronting the electorate.

"When legalized sale of intoxicating beverages returned to Texas after the repeal of national prohibition, the open saloon did not. The amendment which Texans adopted in 1935, repealing state prohibition, authorized the sale of intoxicating beverages but specifically prohibited the open saloon.

"That prohibition against the open saloon has represented progress in the effort to control and regulate the availability and use of alcohol in dealing with the myriad and sad problems which drunkenness and alcoholism create.

"What the voters of Texas are being asked to do by those who advocate support of the amendment is, in actuality, an effort to liberalize liquor law regulations and increase the availability of intoxicants in a modern version of the old open saloon.

"The basic issue thus is narrowed down to whether there should be a liberalization of liquor laws. It is an issue on which each voter can base his decision on reason and rationality and make a logical conclusion.

"The move to liberalize liquor laws is in the same boat with that to liberalize curbs on marijuana. It is part and parcel of the same movement to liberalize laws on criminal activities or on pornography.

"The result of such liberalization could only be to put gears in reverse, to slip backward.

"The Times is convinced that reason will lead voters of Wichita County, this area and the state to halt the inroads of liberalization. It will lead them to mark their Nov. 3 ballots one way:

"AGAINST 'Repeal of the prohibition against open saloons found in Section 20 Article XVI of the Constitution of the State of Texas.'"

Boosters Briefed on Equipment

Monday night President Hoyt Watson introduced Gene Gibson, sales representative for Brotherton and White Sporting Goods, who told Quarterback members about the equipment used by the Hawks in a football game.

Gene showed most of the new things that have come out this year, including some headgear that is designed to keep boys from getting their nose hurt as well as to protect their head. He said it costs the school about \$200 to equip each boy for practice and games.

Gibson answered questions fired at him about equipment and costs.

He told how it is used by high schools, first the Varsity, then the Junior Varsity, then B team and so on down the line until it is no longer usable.

Sam Fairchild won the two tickets to the Breckenridge game.

Coach Watkins then took over and explained it is easy to get the Hawks mentally prepared for a game because all know that each squad member is going to get to play instead of only 13 or 14 boys. He said this makes preparation for each game easier since a boy knows he will get into the game and will work hard to be ready.

Breckenridge, our opponent this Friday, came under discussion next, and Watkins said they have a large team composed mostly of sophomores and juniors. He said Breckenridge requested the films of the Burk and Hirschi games because those teams held us best.

Tommy said he is preparing the Hawks for a lot of stunting and blitzing by Breckenridge.

The Buckaroos have a 2 won and 4 lost record, but Watkins said they led in 5 of those games statistically in both offense and defense. Fumble and penalties have hurt their scoring.

Quarterback Mark Fambro, No. 10, has averaged 15 passes per game. He leads the offense that includes Ronnie Langford, No. 20, 160 lb. playing tailback; and Rodney McCollum, No. 31, 175 FB. And there is Rocky Holland, No. 24, at wing back.

Their ends on offense are Mike Loggains, 174; and Monte McIntire, 175 Raymond Harris, 218 lb. tackle is their biggest man on offense, while No. 72 Mike Peeks at 220 lb. heads the defense.

The Buckaroos use the same offensive formations as the Hawks and exploit the talents of both QB and TB. Sometimes they go into T formation and on some plays they use a close WB in the backfield.

They run blasts, sweeps and FB plays well.

They use a Dallas Pro defense with a Front 4, three linebackers and four deep men. Occasionally they go into an Arkansas Monster Man defense with Charles Graham playing the Monster.

Remember to drive carefully on your way to the game and back to Iowa Park.

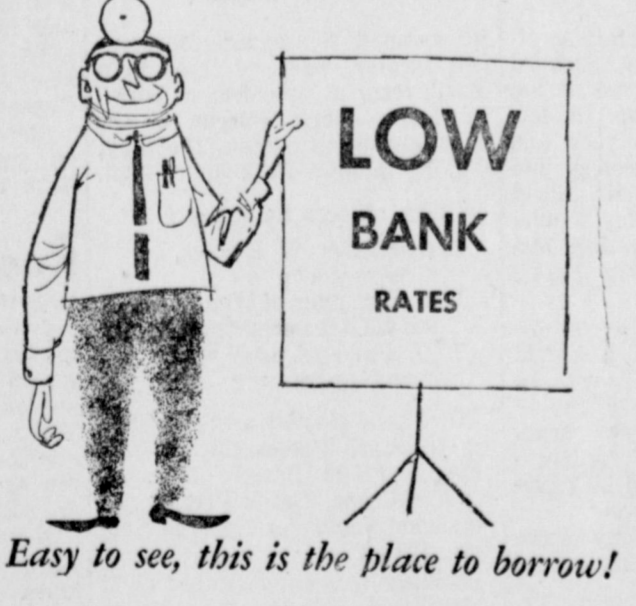
