> "When legalized sale of intoxicating beverages returned to Texas after the repeal of national prohibition, the open saloon did not. The amendment which Texans adopted in 1935, repealing state prohibition, authorized the sale of intoxicating beverages but specifically prohibited the open saloon.

> "That prohibition against the open saloon has represented progress in the effort to control and regulate the availability and use of alcohol in dealing with the myriad and sad problems which drunkenness and alcoholism create.

"What the voters of Texas are being asked to do by those who advocate support of the amendment is, in actuality, an effort to liberalize liquor law regulations and increase the availability of intozicants in a modern version of the old open saloon.


