## Safety Circus

More than 1200 children enjoyed constructive entertainment at the high school auditorium here Wednesday, when Ernest Presley, a special representative of the International Association of Chiefs of Police, presented the "Safety Circus" in a double showing—one at 9:30 and another at 1:30.

Pupils and teachers from the following groups were in attendance: Valley View, Bradford, Kidwell, the five classes in Special Education, and Adams Kindergarten pupils.

The Safety Circus features 10 highly trained dogs who perform a variety of stunts showing the children how to avoid accidents. Though it is entertaining, its purpose is to encourage youngsters to play, walk, ride bicycles, and exercise respect for authority for the sake of safety.

More than 5,000,000 children in 48 states have seen the show. All expenses are borne by the American Trucking Association, and there is no commercial in the showing.

The response of the 1200 students here was most enthusiastic.

## Schools Get Free Lunch Program

Iowa Park Consolidated Independent School District administrators have long recognized the need for helping meet the nutritional needs of students. Well-balanced lunches are served each day. Since some families find it difficult to pay full price, the district has made plans to provide lunches free or at reduced price to the children whose family are not able to pay full price.

Copies of an application form were sent home to parents this week. Additional copies may be obtained at the principal's office. The completed application signed by an adult member of the family should be sent to the principal of each school attended by children in the family. Applications will be reviewed promptly and within five days the family will be notified as to the decision made. All information provided on the application will be held in strict confidence. Decisions will be based on the following income scales:

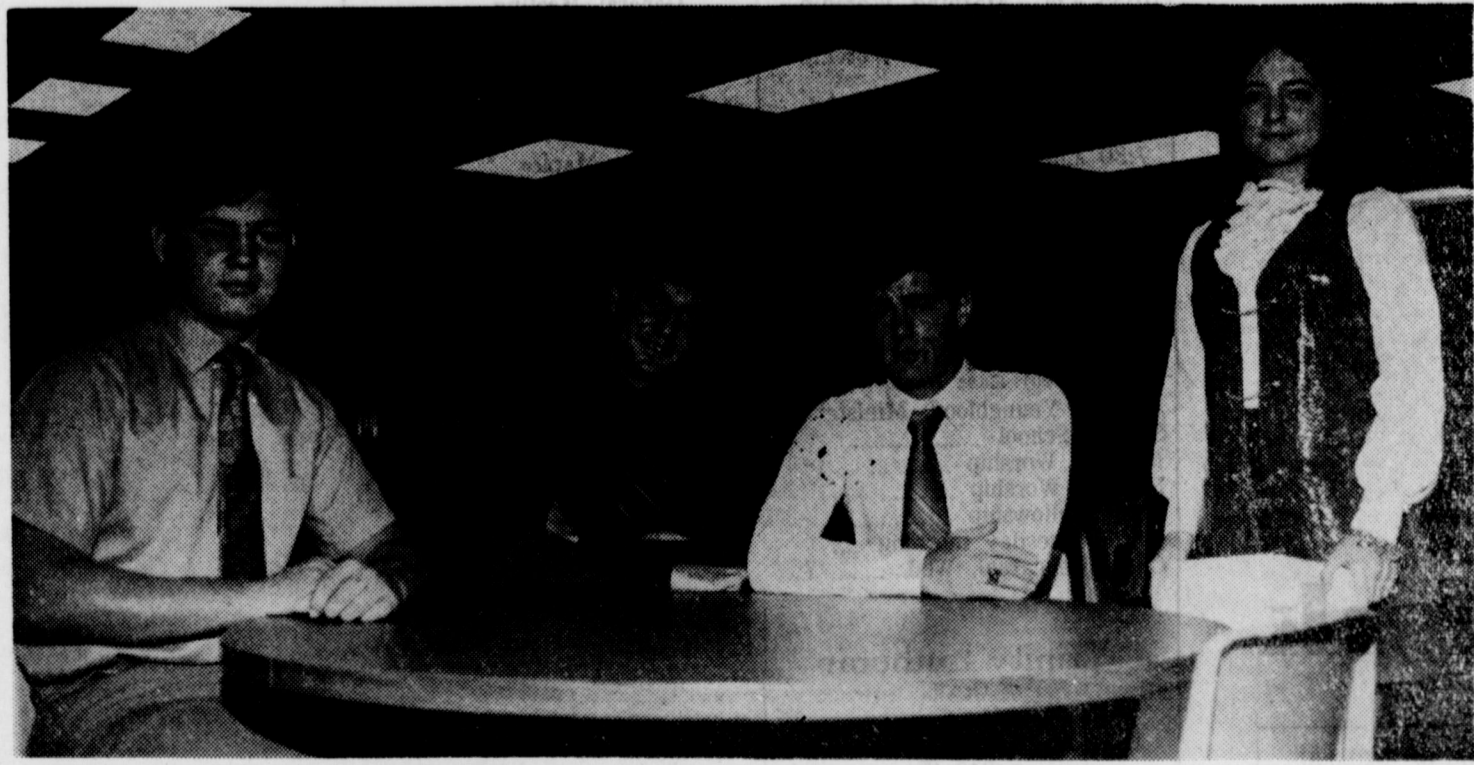
Local units represented were Bradford and Kidwell of Iowa Park, Hardin - Burk Burnett, and City View of Wichita Falls.
